VIRGINIA CITY, NOVADA, May 24-Night,-Parties from the Spruce Mountains report that the Indians, after stealing lead from the smelting works, were traced to their camp, where a council was held, and mischief is evidently meant. The citizens are becoming alarmed and have formed a guard, but it has been found out that the Indians have purchased all the powder, leaving the settlers defenseless.
