WASHINGTON, July 22-Noon.-Attorney-General Williams to-day transmitted to the Acting Secretary of State, J. C. B. Davies, his official opinion in the case of Carl Voght, a Prussian citizen, charged with murder, arson and robbery committed in Brussels, and a fugitive in the United States. The question submitted to the Attorney-General was: "Can the German Government rightfully demand the surrender of the fugitive under

the treaty of June 16th, 1852?" The Attorney-General says that the only point in controversy appears to be the following: Whether or not, according to the true intent and meaning of said treaty, the crimes committed by Voght, in Belgium, were committed within the jurisdiction of Germany. The Attorney-General, in a lengthy opinion, reviews all the facts in the case, and concludes as follows: I have carefully read the elaborate opinion of Judge Blatchford, upholding the jurisdiction in this case, transmitted in your letter; but, with deference and regret, I am compelled to dissent from his views. They do not appear to me to be sound in principle or sustained by authority. Able writers have contended that it was a reciprocal obligation upon nations to surrender fugitives from justice, though now it seems to be generally agreed that this is a matter of comity but it is to be presumed that where there are treaties upon the subjet, that the fugitives are to be surrendered only in cases and upon the terms

> BIARRITZ, July 22-Noon.-The person who attempted to assassinate Marshal Serrano, has been arrested.

BAYONNE, July 22-Night,-News was received here through the Carlists concerning the ir surrection at Carthagena which throws additional light on the disaffection in the Spanish squadron in that port, which was made a sutject of government decree and vote in the Cortes yesterday.

The Insurgents, after gaining control of the city, seized the Castello-a strong fort on the west side of the harbor, less than 1,000 yards from the entrance which it commands completely. This gave control of the two lower batteries on the shore at the mouth of the harbor. They hoisted the red flag of the Commune over the fortifications, and summoned the squadron lying in the harbor (the crews being in sympathy with the insurgents) and the vessels fell into their hands without opposition .-

The vessels thus taken by the insurgents are the Victoria, (iron clad of 24 guns;) Nunancia, (iron clad of 25 guns;) Petran, (iron clad of 40 guns;) Almaza, (screw frigate of 48 guns;) and steamers Fernando, El Cataligo, Ferral, and Blascon Garavay, not classified. The four vessels first named are among the finest in the Spanish navy.

ATTACK ON A TRAIN.

ROBBERY THE OBJECT.

THE ENGINEER KILLED. BUT THE PASSENGERS ESCAPE.

YANKEE KU-KLUX.

CHICAGO, July 22-Night,-A special dispatch from Des Moines gives the a milder type. following account of an attack on a train of the Chicago Island & Pacific Railroad, last night: The train left Council Bluff at 5 P. M., with four coaches and two sleepers in the rear, the sleepers being filled with a party of aristocratic Chinese, on their way to New England colleges. There were also two baggage and express cars, in which was the through California mail and express matter, consisting of nearly \$2,000 in an express safe and three tons of Bullion. When about sixty-five miles West of Des Moines, at about 8 o'clock, at a sharp curve in an isolated spot, with no house within thirty miles in any direction, the train going about twenty-five miles an hour. the engineer, John Hafferty, saw a rail auddenly removed from its place, about sixty feet in front, and instantly reversed the engine and applied the air brake. When in the act of doing this, bullets came pelting into the engine like hail. The engine ran into the bank of a tunnel, overthrowing the engineer and the fireman, the former falling on the latter dead. could be found on his body. The fireman escaped unhurt. The train being very heavy, it ran about 100 feet and stopped. The baggage cars doubled and were badly smashed. As soon as the train stopped several large, athletic men, masked in full Ku-Klux style, appeared at the express car, in which was Conductor William Smith, Superintendent Royce, Express Messenger John Burgess, and three other persons. The robbers commenced to fire rapidly into the car and to yelli. "get out of there, damn ye." Bullets passed through the clothes of the Conductor and two grazed the Baggage Master on the side of his head. The inmates of the car jumped out to the rear under cover of half a dozen revolvers. Two of the robbers marched up and down the train, threatening to shoot any person who showed his head, and saying "get down out of sight, damn ye, or we will shoot ye."
