DEBTS OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.
MEXICO TO ASSUME THE AGGRESSIVE TOWARDS US.

WASHINGTON, July 22—Noon.—Attorney-General Williams to-day transmitted to the Acting Secretary of State, J. C. B. Davies, his official opinion in the case of Carl Voght, a Prussian citizen, charged with murder, arson and robbery committed in Brussels, and a fugitive in the United States. The question submitted to the Attorney-General was: "Can the German Government rightfully demand the surrender of the fugitive under the treaty of June 16th, 1852?"

The Attorney-General says that the only point in controversy appears to be the following: Whether or not, according to the true intent and meaning of said treaty, the crimes committed by Voght, in Belgium, were committed within the jurisdiction of Germany. The Attorney-General, in a lengthy opinion, reviews all the facts in the case, and concludes as follows: I have carefully read the elaborate opinion of Judge Blanchford, upholding the jurisdiction in this case, transmitted in your letter; but, with deference and regret, I am compelled to dissent from his views. They do not appear to me to be sound in principle or sustained by authority. Able writers have contended that it was a reciprocal obligation upon nations to surrender fugitives from justice, though now it seems to be generally agreed that this is a matter of comity; but it is to be presumed that where there are treaties upon the subject, that the fugitives are to be surrendered only in cases and upon the terms specified in such treaties. Conformably to what is above stated, I make a negative answer to your question.

WASHINGTON, July 22—Night.—The entire debt of the District of Columbia is officially stated at \$9,336,781.
A private letter received here by a prominent official from Mexico says that the Mexican government has decided to assume an aggressive position towards the United States on account of the McKensie raid on the Rio Grande and it is not feared that any efforts of retaliation will be the result. The truth is, the Mexicans are dealing very tenderly with that question and the punishment McKensie inflicted on the treacherous rascals engaged in the depredations on the Rio Grande, is not regarded so much offered against the international law as some would have it appear.

NEW JERSEY.
SAD ACCIDENT TO A PARTY OF EXCURSIONISTS.
TWO MEN DROWNED.

ATLANTIC CITY, July 22—Night.—Through the carelessness of some of the excursionists of the German Independent Congregation and Harmony Singing Society a sad accident occurred here at 10 o'clock to-day. Rudolph Kittner, of Philadelphia, and Joseph Bush, of Camden, while bathing ventured out about a half mile and in attempting to return were carried to sea and drowned. Chas. Smith of the same party in attempting to rescue Kittner became exhausted after grasping him and was only saved by the noble efforts and the superior abilities of the famous swimmer Boynton. After rescuing Smith, Boynton attempted to save Bush but was unsuccessful. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

ASTONISHING SUCCESSSES OF THE CARLISTS.

BERLIN, July 22—Noon.—Gustave Rose, the Chemist and Mineralogist, is dead.
VERSAILLES, July 22—Noon.—Jules Favre attacked the home-policy of the government and exposed and denounced the alliance of the Monarchists and Bonapartists. Great disorder followed by a vote of confidence of 400 to 270. This large majority, in favor of MacMahon upon the eve of the recess of the General Assembly, compared with the defeat of Thiers by 14 votes, is regarded as significant.

MADRID, July 22—Noon.—The crews of the Spanish men-of-war Almazra, Vittoria, Mendez, Nurez, Fernaldo and Catalico have revolted. The government proclaimed that these vessels are pirates, authorizing their capture on the high seas, and their treatment as pirates.

Decrees have been issued dismissing Gens. Contreras and Piedad, and removing civil Governor Cordova, Murcia, Penlevilla, Leon and Orense. Gen. Pavia has been appointed Captain-General of Andalusia and Estramadura.

Alicante has declared itself an independent Canton.
The motion to censure the government for declaring the crews of the insurgent Spanish frigates at Cartagena, pirates, was rejected by a vote of 110 to 90.

BARCELONA, July 22—Noon.—The person who attempted to assassinate Marshal Serrano, has been arrested.
BARCELONA, July 22—Night.—News was received here through the Carlists concerning the insurrection at Cartagena which throws additional light on the disaffection in the Spanish squadron in that port, which was made a subject of government decree and vote in the Cortes yesterday.

E. S. MILLS' WILL.

ESTATE ESTIMATED AT \$300,000.

New York, July 22—Noon.—A. T. Stewart made his will before sailing for Europe. It shows him to be worth \$100,000,000.

The real estate agents of Mr. Mills do not credit the suicide theory. Mills arranged with them the evening before his death for the completion of some buildings, and he was as cheerful as usual. His income from real estate which these agents manage is \$40,000 per annum. Regarding the Georgia bonds held by the institution, Secretary Rodman said to-day that various eminent New York firms held the Georgia bonds and that the Broadway Bank holds \$300,000 of them. He believes that the company will pay every dollar it owed to depositors without calling on the stockholders. The assets were reasonably good, though some of the securities were slow. The assets of the company amount to \$2,800,000; amount due depositors \$2,300,000.

The weather is clear and warm. It is stated that the Congressional Committee on Transportation have issued a circular to the State Granges of Husbandry throughout the country, asking them to appoint delegates to meet the Committee and furnish information on the subject, which they are investigating, and present the views of farmers of the different States, in regard to the defects and abuses alleged to exist under the present system of transportation.

New York, July 22—Night.—The will of the late E. S. Mills was placed in the Surrogate's office to-day. It provides for the disposition of an estate estimated at \$300,000. All is left to his widow who is appointed executrix in conjunction with his son, brother and brother-in-law of the deceased.
