SECOND ARRIVAL OF MEMONITES.

HEAVY IMPORTS THIS WEEK.

New York August 22.—Noon.— The weather, although cloudy, has the appearance of changing; rain fell all night.

The second company of Memonites from Crimea came by the Halsatia yesterday; they include eight families and fifty persons and, like their predecessors, are well-to-do, bringing about \$100,000 in gold. They start to-day for Elkhart, Indiana.

The building on Fourth avenue, owned by A. T. Stewart, erected for a hotel for single and widowed women, where they could live cheaply, will be devoted to other purposes, it being deemed impossible to establish a house such as Mr. Stewart proposed.

New York, Aug. 22.—Night.—This morning, while a number of men were pulling down a building at the corner of West Eleventh and Hudson streets, the walls fell in killing four men instantly, and wounding nine others to such an extent that death is looked for.

A civil suit has been commenced against Carl Vogt, by a relative of Chevalier de Bianco, who he is alleged, to have insured for the recovery of \$12,000 worth of property of the murdered man.

It was stated in the Sheriff's office to-day that Comptroller Green had sent word that he was making preparations to pay the judgment for which the furniture in the Comptroller's office and other city property were advertised for sale on Tuesday next.

This morning Michael Broadwick, while in a state of semi-intoxication, quarreled with his mother-in-law at 81 Carmine street. His daughter, fearing he might seriously injure her, called on her two sons, one of whom, James Broadwick, aged 19, rushed into the room and endeavored to take his father away from the poor woman whom he was savagely beating, when he turned on him with a large knife and stabbed him twice in the heart. He staggered and fell, but got up again and went up to the second floor and fell dead. The man's brother interfered and the father made a lunge at him and stabbed him nearly in the same place as he did James, but not fatally. At this point the police rushed in and secured Broadwick, who was perfectly mad with rage. The whole family resided on the fourth floor, were cartmen by occupation, and were almost always quarrelling. Broadwick had been drinking hard for some days, and at the station house professed to know nothing about the bloody deed.

THE TROUBLES IN PERRY CO.

CHAPTER SECOND OF A BOOK, THE FIRST CHAPTER OF WHICH HAS NOT YET COME TO HAND.

LITTLE ROCK, August 22.—Advices from Perry county state that after the constable's posse, who were endeavoring to arrest Morris and his party for their attack upon Mathews and the Supervisor's Court, had dispersed, Morris, with a crowd of about thirty men, entered Ferrville and took possession of the Court House, swearing they would kill forty men for the killing of Trice. Supervisors Price and Holmes, in fear of personal violence, left town, and are now in this city to lay the facts before the Government. They say it is unsafe for them to return without protection. It is understood that Adjutant-General Bishop will leave for the scene of disturbance in the morning. [This is the first we have had relative to these troubles.—Ed. JOURNAL.]

ANOTHER SLOW WATCH COLLISION.

THE MEETING OF THE TWO ENGINES.

THE DEATH OF THE BRAKEMAN.

SEVERE SHOCK TO PASSENGERS.

CINCINNATI, August 22.—Noon.—A collision occurred to-day on the Marietta and Cincinnati Railroad, in which three of the train hands were killed. The watch of the engineer on the freight train was a quarter of an hour too slow. Both the engineer and conductor of the freight train fled. The conductor has been arrested and a warrant has been issued for the arrest of the engineer. The passenger coaches are off the track, but the passengers are unhurt.

The Superintendent of the road will prosecute the engineer and conductor for murder.

CINCINNATI, August 22.—Night.—Passengers by the western bound train of the Marietta and Cincinnati Railroad, which did not arrive here till 1:40 this morning, bring in the main contradictory accounts of the collision near Montgomery station with some additional particulars. The Hillsboro and Lovell and accommodation train left Montgomery station on time, and the freight train bound from Chillicothe to this city was behind time. It is said the conductor's watch was 15 minutes slow, and in addition intimated that the engineer, with whom he had some hard words at Lovell, said he would get him into difficulty before he got to Cincinnati. At any rate the freight train started out and the two trains met on a curve. Both engines reared upwards and stood almost erect. The baggage cars following the passenger coaches remained on the track but the shock to the passengers was terrible. Charles Rothel remained on the engine with his father, the engineer, and was crushed between the tire box and tender. The father ceased working apparently any serious bodily injury, but was so much moved by the excitement of the disaster that he came away from the wreck with a disordered mind. The brakeman in response to the signal to put down brakes was assisting the baggage master to wind up the brake when the shock came and both were crushed to death.

Walter Rhodes, the Express messenger, and his brother J. B. Rhodes, superintendent of Adams Express in this city, received injuries from which they died just after reaching Cincinnati depot this morning, making 4 deaths in all.

THE GREAT WEST.

AN IMPORTANT SUIT AGAINST RT. REV. THOS. FREELY.

LOVELY TIMES OUT WEST.

ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE GEN. JOE SHELBY.

RAILROAD TRAINS ATTACKED WITH THE VIEW OF ROBBERY.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—Noon.—John Murray Ryan, a suspended Priest of the Catholic Church, who has for some time been practicing medicine in this city, to-day commenced suit in the Circuit Court against Rt. Rev. Thos. Freely, Bishop of the Diocese, laying the damages at \$25,000. This claim is based on the allegation that the Bishop, in suspending him, acted despotically and irregularly, and not in accordance with the canons of the Church.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 22.—Night.—An attempt was made on Wednesday evening last to assassinate Gen. Joe Shelby, a somewhat celebrated Confederate General during the war, and cousin to Hon. Frank P. Blair. The General, with his two little boys, was driving from his residence to Hullville, when an unknown party fired into the carriage from the bushes, wounding him in the hip.

An attempt was made to-day to capture the Paymaster of the Hannibal & St. Joseph Railroad by the same man who robbed the railroad train some time since. The engineer saw the man obstructing the track and reversed the engine and ran back to Cameron. Another attempt was made on Wednesday night to run the train of the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad off the track, near Leavenworth, but without success. Several shots were fired at the engineer, and all the windows in the cab broken, but he escaped unhurt.

MARYLAND.

TWO NEGROES HUNG YESTERDAY.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 22.—Noon.—Two executions, both negroes, occurred in Maryland to-day. A few minutes past 7 o'clock this forenoon, Levin Palmer, thirty-five years of age, was executed at Towson, Baltimore county, for rape, and at Baltimore, shortly after 10 o'clock, James West, aged 23 years, was executed for murder.

EUROPE.

PRINCE NAPOLEAN ELECTED PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL GENERAL OF COISSICA.

AN ENGLISH STEAMER WRECKED IN THE RED SEA.

THE SURVIVORS IMPRISONED BY THE NATIVES.

PARIS, August 22.—Night.—Prince Napoleon has been elected President and Council General of Coissica, by a majority of 30 votes. In accepting the position he delivered an address to the Council, recommending that the proceedings be confined to matters of departmental interest.

LONDON, August 22.—Night.—A freight steamer from Singapore, for Shanghai, was wrecked in the Red Sea. The Captain and other officers and some of the crew were lost, and 35 who succeeded in gaining the land are prisoners by the natives.

LONDON, August 22.—Night.—The Times calls attention to an advertisement of Wright, Robinson & Steele, who offer systematic turf investments in connection with the English turf, and warns the public that these so-called letting agents are swindlers.

A rumor was current in this city, this forenoon, that the attempted rescue of the Bank of England forgers, Anstie, Bidwell, and their confederates, from Nowgate, had been discovered, and that the keeper who had been impured with is now under arrest. If the rumor is true the details of the affair are suppressed by the authorities.

The London Hour states that the German Government contemplates proceeding against Captain Werner who took two Spanish war vessels from the Cartagena insurgents. The question of trying Capt. Werner by court martial is understood to be now held in consideration by the German Cabinet.

MAISON, August 22.—Night.—The Cortes have authorized the prosecution by the tribunals of justice of nine Deputies who have been arrested for participating in the Communist and Cantonal insurrections.

Intelligence has reached this city that on the 16th instant an unsuccessful attempt was made upon the life of Don Alfonso, the brother of Don Carlos. The would-be assassin, whose motive is not stated, was taken and executed.

Advices from the North, which the Government deems trustworthy, report that the Carlist troops are discouraged and insubordinate.

ELECTRICISMS.

At Providence yesterday, Madeline won the Bennett challenge cup in 3 hours and 16 minutes. Madgie was 3 minutes behind.

The Chicago and Alton R. R. has offered \$1,000 reward for the arrest of conductor Bean.

The President has returned to Long Branch.

Scout Lewis, of Virginia, is reported quite sick and cannot take part in the pending campaign.

The first bale of cotton of the new crop, received at Memphis from Canton, Miss., was sold at auction yesterday. It weighed 369 pounds and was valued at \$100 and brought 41 cents per pound.

The Chamber of Commerce and City Council of Atlanta yesterday adopted resolutions endorsing the establishment of a line of steamships between Liverpool and Savannah, pledging their support to the enterprise.

PROBABILITIES.

WAR DEPARTMENT, OFFICE CHIEF SIGNAL OFFICER.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—For the Eastern and middle Atlantic States, partly cloudy and threatening weather during the night, followed by less clouds, with varying pressure and high temperature to-morrow. For the Lower Lake region and the Eastern portion of the Upper Lake region, increased pressure, lower temperature and generally clear weather, the winds continuing light and veering during the night, shifting to the North and East with increasing force on Saturday. For the Western portion of the Lake region and thence Westward to the Territories and Southwest to Missouri, slowly diminishing pressure, continued high temperature, with increasing Southeasterly to Southerly winds and slight cloudiness. For the Southern States, light variable winds, slightly rising temperature in the Mississippi Valley, less cloudiness, except on the coast, where light rains may continue.

The Fayetteville Eagle says: We regret to learn that a little boy 18 months old, son of Mr. Amos J. McDonald, of Cedar Creek, was accidentally drowned on Friday last, by falling in a tub of water.

The Wilson Plaindealer says: Our latest reports from Pitt represent the crop as decidedly good.

The surveying party of the Norfolk and Charleston road reached Greenville on the survey from Norfolk the first of last week. Our informant learns that the surveyors will go next in the direction of Moseley Hall. Greenville is almost in an air-line between Norfolk and Charleston and the people of Greenville think that the road will be built and that it will pass through Greenville.
