mored ultimatum of the United States is equivalent to the declaration of war. PHILADRIPHIA, Nov. 26-Noon.-There is an increased activity in the Navy Yard here. Admiral Porter inspected the vessels yesterday. The dispatch boat Pinta has been ordered

HAVANA, November 26-Noon,-A grand reception and serenade was given to Sener Soler, the Colonial Minister at Casino Espanol.

NEW YORK, November 26-Noon, -A dispatch to the Herald says: On Tuesday evening Secretary Robeson received information which quickened, if possible, the activity in his department in preparing for the crisis. Orders peremptory and plenary were issued by the Secretary to the chiefs of Bureaus to put the navy in the best possible condition without waiting for the approval of the Secretary.

The next orders issued were Rear-Admiral Case, commanding the Baropean squadron, to leave but one ship at Cadiz and proceed with the other vessels under full steam to Key West. Dispatches were then prepared for the rear-admirals commanding the South Pacific and South Atlantic won the way. to order all vessels of their fleets to Key West, under steam, and report to the Navy Department at that point.

A telegram was sent to the commander of the East India squadron informing him of the gravity of the situation and ordering him to issue orders at once to every vessel of the fleet to prepare for any emergency.

Per contra, the Times, in a doubleleaded editorial, says: We have reason to believe that the negotiations with Spain have assumed a shape which places the prespect of war at a much greater distance than was the case yesterday.

Chrysgo, Nov. 26-Noon,-General Sheridan has been ordered to Washington to confer in regard to military affairs, in case of a war with Spain, in the event of which he would have chief command in the field.

### HEADQUARTERS.

AGRICULTURAL REPORT FOR NOVEMBER.

WARRINGTON Nov 26 Night .- The ovember statistical report of the Department of Agriculture, now in press, makes a showing for the corn product quite as unfavorable as that which diness. forecasted the short crop of 1869. The preliminary report of the aggregate quantity in that year indicated a total of 874 millions less than the estima's a Peerage, becomes Baron Coleridge. for the large crop of 1870 and the present returns point to a product of about

The estimate of last year's crop of Illinois was 217 millions. The estimate of the present crop is 132 millions. Only six States show a grop equal to last year's, viz: Virginia, Georgia, Florida, West Virginia, Oregon and Rhode Island.

The percentage of deficiency in the principal corn-growing section in comparison with the total product of last year is as follows: Kentucky 4 percent, Ohio 11, Indiana 22, Illinois 39, Iowa 28, Missouri 32, and Kansas 31. The deliciency for New York is 8 per

cent, and 16 for Pennsylvania. In most of the Southern States th crop is smaller than that of last year. direct comparison is made between the total product of grain in each county in 1872 and 1873, having for its elements both the comparative yield and

extent of area. The cotton reports of November, unlike those of the comparative condition earlier in the sesson, make the exact estimates of the expected crop in each county stated in the form of a percentage of last year's crop. The aggregate of these estimates varies a little from three million and seven hundred thousand bales. The season for picking has been unusually fine thus far, yet the result may be modified by an exceptionably favorable season in the latter part of November and in December, or by storms affect-

ing injuriously the saving of the top erop. The State percentages in comparison with last year are calculated as follows: North Carolina, 92; Georgia, 97 ; Plorida, 97 ; Alabama, 91 ; Mississippi, 85; Louisiana, 80; Texas, 112; Arkansus, 102; Tennessee, 102. These figures would be much lower but for the increase of area planted. The estimated total area is in round numbers nine and a half millions. A tabulated statement of the results of

### GOTHAM

NAVIGATION ON THE HUDSON SUSPENDED

STRIKE OF THE BROOKLYN PLASTERERS.

NEW YORK, November 26-Noon. Navigation on the Hudson to Albany has been suspended. The steamers have gone into winter quarters. This is the earliest closing during the present century.

Under orders of the Union, the Brooklyn plasterers have stopped work until the employers grant them four dollars a day during the winter months.

The employers generally refuse. The associated banks have \$35,000, 000 in legal tenders.

### GEORGIA.

THE GRANGERS IN CONVENTION.

THEY ADVOCATE REFUNDING OF THE COTTON TAX AND REMOVAL OF IMPORTS ON ALL EXCEPT LUXURIES.

ATLANTA, November 26-Night .-The Convention of Grangers to-day adopted resolutions to establish di rect shipment of cotton to Europe and urge the refunding of the cotton tax to legitimate claimante and the removal of all imports except on conceded luxuries.
