LOUISIANA.
THE PRESIDENT'S WAR ON THE PEOPLE.

FEDERAL TROOPS GUARDING THE STATE HOUSE.

CITIZENS TURNED BACK ON THE STREETS.

A CONSERVATIVE ELECTED SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 4.—Noon.—In response to a request of Gov. Kellogg Gen. Emory has ordered the disposition of troops in close proximity to the State House. Gen. Hugh J. Campbell, of the State Militia, will command the forces on the inside of the State House. What this force will be has not yet transpired. A body of Metropolitan, without guns, will be there as conservators of the peace. The police officials state that the Metropolitan have not been requested to occupy the State House as soldiers.

Nervous people persist in talking about a row, but the citizens generally maintain their usual composure, notwithstanding the disposition of troops. The Warmoth-Jewell duel has been put off by an agreement of the friends of the parties.

Another dispatch says: At this hour, 8 o'clock, m., U. S. troops are taking their position, covering the State House. A regiment of infantry in two columns are at parade rest, and extend from Chartres street down St. Louis street to the levee. The Metropolitan are being placed in position to prevent the near approach of the police to the State House. A squad of them at Chartres street and on St. Louis street refused to allow persons to pass out St. Louis street, stating that only members of the Legislature and State officers would be allowed to go by. This squad was under the command of an captain. A similar guard will probably be placed at all approaches to the State House. Eighteen hundred U. S. troops will be in position to sustain the State Government.

Members of the House of Representatives, Jan. 4.—Noon.—Private notices from New Orleans indicate the intention of ex-Mayor, William Conservative, as Speaker of the House of Representatives, as three or four of the members will probably be absent. Everything is represented to be perfectly quiet and no outbreak is apprehended.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 4.—Night.—The Legislature is the most orderly for many years.

The Congressional Committee are in the Hall. The Clerk called the roll and announced a quorum.

On motion, Mr. Wiltz, former Mayor, and a Conservative, took the Chair temporarily, and his taking it caused confusion. Wiltz appointed temporary officers; the Radicals yelled; Col. Lowell protested, and five members not returned by the Board, were declared elected, and took their seats. At 1 o'clock, order was partially restored.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Night.—Nothing further from New Orleans through the regular channels. Private dispatches indicate clearly that the Lower House has, or will, organize under Conservative auspices.

EUROPE.

AMNESTY FOR ALL OF THE CARLISTS.

THE POPE BLESSES ALFONSO.

SERRANO AT BAYONNE.

Paris, Jan. 4.—Noon.—At the request of Princess Beatrix, of Vienna, King Alfonso has granted complete amnesty to all the Carlists.

The King of the Belgians has recognized King Alfonso and telegraphed his congratulations. The recognition of the King, by most of the European Courts, is momentarily expected. The papal nuncio, in this city, has received the blessing of the Pope asked for by the King. His Majesty will issue from this city a decree convoke the Cortes.

The staff of the Spanish Embassy, in Paris, has waited on King Alfonso and paid him their homage. The King, in reply to their address, said he would not disguise the difficulties of his task, and he sought aid of able men, of all parties. His first wish was for the pacification of Spain, and he desired to be the King of all Spaniards. A dispatch denying the Carlist report of the death of Espartero has been received.

BERLIN, Jan. 4.—Noon.—The Emperor William, in a speech in reply to New Year congratulations, expressed his great satisfaction at the continued peace in Europe, which he said it was the first duty of the German Emperor to preserve.

BATONNE, Jan. 4.—Noon.—Marshal Serrano entered Franco by way of Urdax on Saturday and is now here. It is reported that he will go to Paris and thence to Berlin.

THE INDIANS.

MORE MEN MURDERED BY THE SAVAGES.

VENETA, IND. TER., Jan. 4.—Everything was quiet here last night and up to 3 o'clock p. m. to-day, when news was received that the mob was at Prior's Creek again last night and had killed three men, supposed to be persons they captured yesterday. If this is true trouble will probably follow, as Hatchet, one of the men captured, was a Senator from this district, and will undoubtedly be avenged. Major Robinson has been requested to come here and prevent the fight, if possible.

MISSISSIPPI.

A WHOLE FAMILY MURDERED AND BURNED.

Vicksburg, Jan. 4.—Noon.—On Saturday night last Richard S. Borum, of Lee county, his wife, two children and three negro boys, were murdered and their bodies consigned with the building. No clue to the murderers.

ELECTRICISMS.

The Hyde Park Avenue Catholic Church, in Boston, has been burned. Rose Brown, grocer at Cincinnati, has failed. Liabilities, \$187,000.

The debt of the city of Boston is \$29,000,000.

A boiler of the Warham iron works burst yesterday, killing one and hurting four.

The Beecher-Tilton case was called yesterday, when Tilton was not ready. The message of the Mayor says that the debt of the city of New York is \$142,000,000 and the expenses for the current year \$37,000,000. He says the wooden pavements are neither useful nor safe.

The Treasury will not sell gold this month.

There will be a quorum in both Houses to-day.

There was no change yesterday in the condition of the steamship San Marcos, ashore south of Cape Henry. The sea has been too rough to admit of communication at any time between the ship and shore, except by signals.

The German bark Uriel, from Savannah for Reval, is stranded near Boston.

Two Louisiana Republican lobby at Washington City are not encouraged by the events of yesterday in New Orleans.
