THE CALL FOR AN INDIGNATION MEETING.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7-Noon .- The Times says: "Such a dispatch as that sent by General Sheridan to the Secretary of War, on Tuesday, is not warranted by any facts known to the public, nor could it scarcely be warranted under any conceivable cir-cumstances. We have never published anything like it before, and we must say nothing like it has ever been seen in a country under a constitutional government It almost induces one to believe that the world has gone back two or three hundred years in theory and practice of gov-ernment. Cromwell did indeed serve Ireland pretty much as General Sheridan proposes to treat Louisiana, but most of us rere under the impression that that system had b en definitely abandoned. We are at a less to make out what are General Sheridan's ideas of the Constitution under which he lives, or of the functions of Congress, or of the powers which may right-fully be exercised by a Lieutenant-General in the army.
