Butler introduced a bill for an elec tion in Louisiana. Referred to the Judiciary Committee. It provides for an election to be held on the 4th Tuesday in May next for Gover-nor, Lieut, Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, Au-ditor of Public Accounts, Superin-tendent of Elections and Members of the Legislature ; that the President shall immediately appoint three suitable persons to superintend such elec-tion; that they shall immediately ap-point two competent and suitable citi-

zens of opposite political parties as State Registrars, who shall cause a new and complete registration to be made of all the legally qualified voters of the State; that the State registrars and superintendent shall in like manner appoint two supervisors of registration in each parish, and that the superintendent shall in like manner appoint two commissioners of election for each election precinct; within ten days after the day of election the State registrars to open the returns in the presence of the superintendent and to examine, canvass and compile the same, and the superintendent is thereupon to make public proclama-tion of the result of the election in two newspapers of general circulation and newspapers of general circulation and of opposite politics. The Legislature thus elected is to meet and organize on the 2nd Monday after the promulon of the result of the election and gation of the result of the election and on the first Monday after such pro-mulgation the Governor, Lieut.
