## STATE NEWS.

The *Louisburg Courier* says: The Commissioners of Franklin positively refuse to enlighten the people of the county, as to the receipts and expenditure of the county money for the year 1874, as required by law.

The *Raleigh Sentinel* says: Guilford Carpenter, in Backport, Chatham county, is one hundred and ten years old and still gets around the house and does little outdoor jobs without a grunt or an ache. If he would only stop chewing tobacco!

The *Tarboro Southern-Enquirer* says: Nineteen persons from the lower part of Edgecombe county took the cars at this place last Monday destined for Texas. There were only five men in the party and these seemed to be mostly disabled and maimed—there were fourteen women and children in the party.

The *Tarboro Southern-Enquirer* says: We have heard no complaint whatever this year about a scarcity of farm laborers. Planters have been generally supplied throughout Edgecombe and are now ready to commence on the new crop. Good hands command from ten to twelve dollars.

The *Newbern Times* says: On his farm on Neuse River, nearly opposite Wilkinson's Point, Mr. A. W. Stevens produced on two acres of land that have been in cultivation one hundred and fifty years, 1,583 pounds of seed cotton; and that from 2,640 pounds of seed cotton he realized 1,023 pounds of lint.

The *Louisburg Courier* says: Mr. J. K. Spencer, of this county, raised last year on 4 acres of land, using 1 ton guano, 5 bales cotton, weighing on an average 420 lbs., also 41 barrels corn on 6 acres. He made also 4,000 pounds oats, and cut and saved 6,000 pounds hay. This without any extra labor. We challenge the county to beat him.

The *Raleigh News* says: The Conference on the State debt continued throughout the day yesterday, the proceedings of which are as yet not made public. Gov. Brogden sent to the Conference on yesterday a number of letters received by himself in regard to the State debt question, which were read by the Clerk. Several of the letters were from bondholders in England, and others from parties in several of our Northern cities. The general sentiment of foreign bondholders seems to be embodied in the following extract we take from the letter of Geo. E. Marsh, of Portsmouth, N. H.: "I will cheerfully comply with any term of time your government may deem best suited to the means of the citizens."

The English letters express a desire that the past due interest on State bonds may be funded into new bonds and any compromise the people see fit to propose.

### EUROPE.

**TROUBLE THREATENED BETWEEN GERMANY AND SPAIN.**

**THE GERMAN FLEET IN SPANISH WATERS.**

**REPORTED LANDING OF GERMANS ON THE SPANISH COAST.**

BERLIN, Jan. 16.—Night.—The *Corvette Nautilus* will await the arrival of other vessels off the Spanish coast. She will make no demonstration in retaliation of the *Guastave* affair unless attacked. Negotiations with the Spanish government are not progressing as favorably as expected. Eight German vessels have been ordered to the Bay of Biscay.

MADRID, January 16.—Night.—The King gave a dinner last evening to a number of his cabinet and the diplomatic corps.

Decrees have been published in the official Gazette, reducing punishments in cases of violation of the ordinary criminal laws.

General Primo Decines will accompany the King on his visit to the Army the North.

BERLIN, January 16.—Night.—When the additional vessels that have been ordered to be sent to the northern coast of Spain shall have arrived there, the total armament of the German fleet in those waters will consist of fifty guns with a combined horse power of 6,500.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—Night.—The *Daily News* publishes a dispatch from Henda, which states that the German man-of-war *Nautilus* landed one hundred men at Seranz on the Spanish coast, who occupied the place after resistance.

#### DISCUSSION ON LOUISIANA CLOSED IN LOUISIANA.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Night.—The President withdraws Gen. Manley's nomination as Minister to Ecuador. Nellie Grant Satoris brings her husband from Europe on the steamer Republic. The executive family will meet Nellie at New York.

The Senate caucus, this morning, ordered that the discussion of Louisiana affairs be closed.

The *habeas corpus* for Irwin was partially argued, and the prisoner was recommended for a further hearing on Monday.

### THE EAST.

#### A LITTLE ROYAL DISAGREEMENT.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—Night.—Intelligence has been received here that a rupture has occurred between the first and second kings of Siam. They are father and son respectively. The latter took refuge in the British Consulate at Bangkok. He has disbanded his forces and declines an appeal to arms. A British gun boat has left Singapore for Bangkok to protect the interests of Her Majesty's subjects.

### ELECTRICISMS.

Charles A. Stephens, Republican, is elected to Congress from the 10th Massachusetts district, by a small majority.

A Republic caucus in the Minnesota Legislature nominated Ramsey for the Senate.

The night dispatches say that Ramsey's nomination to the Senate from Minnesota is doubtful. Some Republicans bolted the caucus and a sufficient number of Democrats smuggled in to make mischief.
