ANOTHER MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT.

HE TALKS WAR.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The Cabinet yesterday considered the Virginia matter, and with the exception of Fish, there was a unanimous decision that it should be referred to the Commission in the Gulf Squadron is ordered to coal up and rendezvous at Key West.

There was a Democratic convention at Arlington last night. The financial question disturbed the unanimity of the meeting, the details of which are inessentials.

BENNETT—Clayton introduced a bill to protect each State of the United States against invasion, and for other purposes, which was referred to the Committee on Military Affairs.

HOWARD—It was written to the House offering to purge himself of contempt and to answer all proper questions. He will be examined to-day.

A resolution calling on the President for information as to the use of military force at Vicksburg was offered by O'Brien, of Missouri, but was objected to by Lynch, of Mississippi.

WANNAMAKER, January 20.—Night—**SENATE**—The Legislative and Executive Appropriation Bill was read the third time and passed.

An amendment submitted by Ransom, appropriating \$5,400 for the Assay Office at Charlotte, and another submitted by Robertson, appropriating \$9,500 for the office of Assistant Treasurer at Charleston, S. C., were agreed to.

The Fortification Appropriation Bill, circular, and Diplomatic Appropriation Bill were passed.

LEGISLATION, introduced a bill authorizing the paying of the prize money to the captors of the steamboat New Era No. 6. Referred to Committee on Navy Affairs.

The Senate then took up the amendment to the Constitution proposed by the Committee on Privileges and Elections providing for the election of the President and Vice President.

Sherman gave notice that after the adjournment he will be disposed of will claim the floor to finish his remarks on the Louisiana question.

The Fortification Appropriation Bill, which passed the Senate to-day, contained the following items:

Fortress Monroe, Hampton Roads, Va., \$200,000.

Fort Moultrie, Charleston Harbor, S. C., \$150,000.

Fort Palmetto, Savannah river, Ga., \$35,000.

Fort Jefferson, Garden Key, Fla., \$500,000.

Fort Jackson, Mississippi river, Louisiana, \$250,000.

Fort Pickens, Pensacola Harbor, Fla., \$250,000.

Fort St. Philip, Mississippi river, La., \$350,000.

Fort Morgan, entrance to Mobile Bay, Ala., \$350,000.

The President sent the following message to Congress to-day:

To the Senate and House of Representatives:

In my annual message of December 1, 1874, while inviting general attention to all the recommendations made by the Secretary of War, your special attention was invited to the importance of preparing for war in time of peace by providing proper armament for our sea coast defenses.

A proper armament is of vastly more importance than fortifications. The latter can be supplied very speedily for temporary purposes, when needed. The former cannot. These views gain increased strength and pertinence as the years roll by. I have now again the honor to call special attention to the condition of the armament of our fortifications and the absolute necessity for an immediate provision by Congress for the procurement of heavy cannon. The large expenditures required to supply the number of guns for our forts is the strongest argument that can be adduced for a liberal annual appropriation for their gradual accumulation. In time of war such preparations cannot be made—cannon cannot be purchased in open market, nor manufactured at short notice—they must be the product of years of experience and labor. I herewith enclose copies of a report of the Chief of Ordnance and of a Board of Ordnance officers, on the trial of an 8-inch rifle converted from a 10-inch smooth bore, which shows very conclusively an economical means of utilizing these useless smooth-bore guns, and making them into 8-inch rifles capable of piercing seven-inch shells of iron. The 1,204 10-inch Rodman guns should, in my opinion, be so utilized, and the appropriation requested by the Chief of Ordnance of \$250,000, to commence these conversions, is earnestly recommended. While convinced of the economy and necessity of these conversions, the determination of the best and most economical method of providing guns of still larger calibre should no longer be delayed. The experience of other nations, based on the new conditions of defence brought prominently forward by the introduction of ironclads into every navy, show demands heavier metal and caliber. Those enormous masses, having a weight of 700 pounds, can alone meet a shot of the requirements of the national defence. They must be provided, and experiments on a large scale can alone give the data necessary for the determination of the question. A suitable proving ground, with all the facilities and conveniences referred to by the Chief of Ordnance, with a liberal annual appropriation, is an undoubted necessity. The guns now ready for trial cannot be experimented with without funds, and the estimate of \$250,000 for the purpose is deemed reasonable, and is strongly recommended. The constant appeals for legislation on the amount of fortification ought no longer to be disregarded if Congress desires in peace to prepare the important material without which future wars must inevitably lead to disaster. This subject is submitted with the hope that the consideration it demands may be given it at the present session.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

GEN. BUTLER'S HOME FIRED BY A NEGRO incendiary.

HE IS PUNISHED AND A FIGHT IS THE RESULT.

MORE TROUBLE APPREHENDED.

ACUSTA, Ga., Jan. 20.—Night—Gen. M. C. Butler's residence, in Edgewood county, S. C., was burned by an incendiary on the night of the 13th. The incendiary confessed that Tennant, a negro militia captain, hired him to do the deed. A warrant was issued on Monday for Tennant and placed in the hands of colored constables. Tennant refused to be arrested, and the constables called on Gen. Butler for a posse. Butler and eight others accompanied the constables in search of Tennant. Tennant and his followers fled at the posse from ambush, which was returned by the posse, wounding three negroes, two of them mortally, when Tennant and the others fled. Tuesday night the negroes fired at J. M. Weatherthrift five times, and Dr. McElie, who went to attend the three wounded negroes, was fired at twice on his way home, one shot perforating his clothing and the other wounding his horse. More trouble is apprehended, the people being determined to arrest Tennant.

THE RADICALS TRYING TO BOLSTER UP GRANT.

FERRIS FIRE IN BROOKLYN.

New York, Jan. 20.—At a meeting of the Republican Central Committee last night resolutions were adopted sustaining throughout the action of President Grant in the Louisiana matter, and settling forth that whatever was done that was illegal was done without the knowledge of the President and with a sincere desire on the part of the officers of the Government to perform their duty.

The Republican South Carolina has reached her dock.

BROOKLYN, Jan. 20.—A fire at the grocery store of Baderker, corner of Hottel and Pacific streets, was burned to-day. Five dead from suffocation and leaping from windows.

EUROPE.

ALFONZO GONE TO THE ARMY.

TREATHENED COALITION BETWEEN REPUBLICANS AND CARLISTS.

LONDON, January 20.—The steamer Beaver, of Cardiff, is supposed to be foundered with a loss of twenty lives.

MADRID, Jan. 20.—Alfonso has departed for the army. Carlota, looking about the railroads are ordered to be shut, on account of frequent breaks.

PARIS, Jan. 20.—It is stated that the republican emissaries from Barcelona and other towns are in conference with Carlist chiefs, for the purpose of inaugurating a general rising against Alfonso. The issue is a bill to whether a republic or a monarchy under Don Carlos.

SENATORIAL.

Daves has been elected Senator from Massachusetts; McQuinn from Indiana; Bayard from Delaware; Wallace, (vice Scott) from Pennsylvania, and Francis Kernan, (vice Foster) from New York.

In the Michigan Legislature Chandler received 64 votes, a gain of 1; and in Rhode Island, Burnside received 40 votes on the 24th ballot, there being no election.

Carpenner's election to the Senate from Wisconsin is regarded as certain.
