WASHINGTON, January 21—Non-Sensate—From the Committee on Claims, reported with amendments to the House bill relating to the Commission of Claims, which was placed on the Calendar. It extends the time for filing the petitions before the Claims Committee.
House—Voting on the Indian Appropriation Bill.
WASHINGTON, Jan 21—Night—The Little tariff bill increases the tariff on hops three cents. It goes to the President.
The committee appointed to inquire whether newspapers must keep away from here, will fully investigate whether the arrest of Whitehead Reid was in violation of the privileges of the House. Mr. Reid was arrested for libel on charges preferred by Gov. Shepherd.
The President will not remove Belcher, Postmaster at Mason, Ga.
SENATE—House, of Motion, from the Committee on Civil Service and Retrenchment, reports adversely on the bill to reduce the salary of the President of the United States, with request that it be placed on the calendar with the adverse report. So ordered.
The Senate then discussed the proposed amendment to the Constitution, as submitted by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, in regard to the election of President and Vice President. Morton, Conkling, Edmunds and Thurman participated in the debate, the latter making a motion to postpone the further consideration of the subject till the first Monday in February. The vote on the motion will be taken to-morrow.
House—The Indian Appropriation bill was rejected on account of the provision to pay about \$3,000,000 to the Choctaw nation under a treaty of 1865, and was again referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.
Chas. A. Wetmore, the newspaper correspondent for contempt, sent a letter of apology to the Speaker, which was accepted, and he was discharged.
The conference report on the Little Tariff bill was discussed and agreed to. The House adopted the conference report on all still wines at 40 cents per gallon, on file.
The Special Committee appointed under a resolution of the Republican caucus, have agreed to report to the next meeting, in favor of recognizing the Kellogg Government, and the Judiciary Committee of the House will probably decide to-morrow, what action should be taken regarding Louisiana, and the prospect is the action of the Special Committee will be followed.

Four of the number were white men, and four were negroes, convicted of buying cotton from negroes, knowing it to have been stolen.
