**HEADQUARTERS.**

WASHINGTON, January 22.—**NOON.**—SENATE.—Covington, from Kentucky, gets money for public buildings.  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—**NIGHT.**—HOUSE.—Some dozen private bills passed.  
The Senate had Executive session. No Southern outcries.  
Pinchback's new credentials, instead of sending him as apprehended, were referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections, where they will sleep.  
Scharz's Louisiana resolution was discussed, and will be continued on Monday.  
The Republicans of the House are caucusing of the Louisiana affairs. To-night the leaders will move an early adjournment, without action.  
The Election Committee propose to recommend the expulsion of Cannon, to secede from Utah, for polygamy.

**ELECTRICISMS.**  
A dispatch from Baltimore says: The Committee of Seven from the Christian Churches of Baltimore, Richmond, Pittsburg, and Allegheny City, have unanimously accepted Rev. Alfred N. Gilbert.  
John Ricketts, for thirty-seven years connected with the Baltimore Sun, died recently of pneumonia, aged fifty-nine years.  
A boiler explosion at Pottsville, Pa., killed two persons and hurt several others.  
Charles Sprague, of Boston, the banner poet, is dead.  
The steamer schooner near Barnegat is the Mediator. The crew has landed. The vessel will probably go to pieces.

At Lansing, Mich., Christianity beat Chandler one vote for the Senate.  
D. L. Child, of Oregon, has been elected Senator.

**PROBABILITIES.**  
WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—During Saturday, in the South Atlantic States higher, followed by falling barometer, slightly lower temperature than today, northerly or easterly winds and clear or partly cloudy weather will prevail. In the West and Gulf States, falling barometer and rising temperature, winds shifting to the east or South and clear or partly cloudy weather. In the middle States and lower lake region higher barometer, north or west winds, and slightly lower temperature in the former, but with slight changes in the temperature and winds shifting to southeasterly in the latter.

The old story of the sad fate of Aaron Burr's daughter (Theodosia Alston), is brought to mind in the narrative of Jean Baptiste Callistre, one of Lafitte's men, residing in Calcasieu, Louisiana, who writes to the Galveston News that after Lafitte abandoned his adventurous career, Chauvet, his first lieutenant, took command of the Vengeance and sailed into the Gulf for a cruise. He captured the American privateer schooner Patriot, bound from Georgetown, South Carolina, to New York. Every person on board was put to the sword or made food for sharks. After disposing of the dead, Chauvet descended into the cabin and soon called out in an angry tone for Callistre and the mate to go to him. They found him in the cabin confronted by a beautiful woman, who held an empty bottle in her hand, with which she had struck Chauvet, who had attempted to make too free with her. He ordered them to tie her hand and foot, convey her on board of the Vengeance and place her in his cabin. She fought the men and did all she could to jump overboard. Callistre says she died a few days after their arrival in Galveston. She was a very handsome woman and the daughter of a distinguished American. Her clothing, which was of the finest material, was marked "F. A." and she had a locket containing the portrait of a beautiful boy. On the locket were the words "To my wife Theodosia." She was buried on the east of old fort on the point. It was whispered among the men that Chauvet had killed her because she would not yield to his wishes. Callistre is very old now. He was the best gunner and oarsman Lafitte and Chauvet ever had. He was nicknamed L'Ecuyer.
