THE STEAMSHIP MEDIATOR A TOTAL WRECK.

BANK STATEMENT.

New York, Jan. 23.—Noon.—The ice in the harbor impedes the ferry-boats. East River is solid from shore to shore, and hundreds of people are crossing on the ice.

The steamer Mediator is probably a total loss. Her cargo, which was principally intended for Augusta and Atlanta, is roughly stated at from fifty to seventy-five thousand dollars.

New York, Jan. 23.—Night.—Bank statements have decreased \$1,200,000; specie has increased \$3,500,000; legal tenders have increased \$1,500,000; deposits have increased \$250,000; reserve has decreased \$1,000,000; specie shipments to-day \$375,000.

Mr. Cantwell, a memorial from citizens of New Hanover against the proposed county of Lillington.

Mr. French, a resolution telling the people of the State that the present Constitution is unamendable to their wants, and that this Legislature should relieve them of its burdens at the earliest practicable moment.

Mr. Busbee moved to refer this resolution to the Committee on Constitutional Reform.

Mr. French could not see the necessity of this reference, as the resolution only desired to assure the people that the Legislature appreciated their needs.

Messrs. Busbee, Bell and Waring supported the resolution to refer, and Mr. Busbee's motion was adopted.

light resolution by adding the word "unnecessary" before the word "delay."

Mr. Cantwell's amendment was adopted, and the resolution was laid over under the rule.

Mr. Hargrave, a resolution to appoint seven additional members to the Judiciary. Adopted.

Mr. Busbee reported from the Committee on the Louisiana resolutions, submitting the following substitute from the Committee:

The Joint Select Committee, to whom were referred sundry resolutions in regard to the recent interference of the Federal authorities in the State government of Louisiana, have had the same under consideration and beg leave to report the accompanying substitute, and recommend its adoption:

WHEREAS, The military arm of the Federal Government has been used to control the organization of the House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana;

WHEREAS, Such action is unwarranted by and in violation of the fundamental law of the land; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the General Assembly of North Carolina that, in the name of the people of this State, we protest against such unlawful interference in the domestic concerns of a sovereign State.

Resolved, That we profoundly appreciate the condemnation of the proceedings by the people of the whole country; and we commend to our fellow-citizens of Louisiana a continuance of that sublime patience which awaits a settlement of their wrongs at the hands of the American people.

Mr. Busbee advocated the passage of these resolutions, as they had been unanimously agreed upon by the Committee, the Republican members thereof endorsing them, and he hoped there could be no dissension in a-son.

Mason, Tucker and Paschal, colored, opposed the resolutions, they believing the "loyal" citizens of the State did not want them passed. They did not care to censure the authorities at Washington.

Under the call of the previous question, the resolutions were adopted, only the following Senators voting against them: Messrs. Bryant, Cashwell, N. S. Cook, Holton, Mabson, Paschal, Sneed, Tucker and Walker, Messrs. Cantwell and Peebles, Republicans, voted for the resolutions.

Mr. Morehead, a resolution requiring the Committee on claims to report such expenditures incurred in the burial of Governor Caldwell as the State should assume. Adopted.

Mason's resolution requiring the Committee on Education to report a bill amending the public school law of the State, was considered.

Messrs. French and Bell opposed the resolution, as they did not desire placing the children of the State at the mercy of the Civil Rights Bill now pending before Congress.

Tucker, colored, thought there was no cause for fear from this source—the blacks did not desire this mixing of the two races.

Mr. Cantwell favored the resolution.

Mr. Peebles thought the present laws on this subject needed amendment. They were not suited to the wants of the people. He argued at some length in relation to the rights of the State to prevent mixed schools.

He claimed that the Civil Rights Bill now pending before Congress did not provide for mixed schools.

Resolution indefinitely postponed.

Mr. Bell moved to repeal the order for night sessions. He thought we should make haste slowly. Hasty legislation was often productive of much harm, and a night session would prevent the various committees from doing their duty, as the greater part of the work of the session was done in the Committee room.

Mr. Latham opposed the motion to rescind. He saw the reason why the Senate could not work at night.

Messrs. Standford and O. M. Cooke agreed with Mr. Latham.

Mr. Waring argued that hasty legislation was often productive of much harm. The Committees should have time to work, and night sessions would prevent this.

Mr. Linney sustained the views of Mr. Waring.

The motion to repeal was lost by a vote of 23 yeas to 24 noes.

The President announced the following Senators as additional members of the Judiciary Committee: Messrs. Hargrave, LeGrand, Graham, Albright, Standford, Latham and Cantwell.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. RESOLUTIONS.

By Mr. Means, a resolution of inquiry as to the right of Mr. Thorne, the Representative from Warren county to a seat on this floor.
