troduced a bill to provide for and regulate the counting of votes for Pre-sident and Vice President. Referred to Committee on Privileges and Elections.

The following bills were passed

House bid to amend 23d paragraph of section 3 of act to regulate the fees and costs to be allowed Clerks, Marshals and Attorneys of Circuit and District Courts of the United States, and for other purposes. Approved February 26th, 1853.

House bill to extend the provisions of the act approved March 3d, 1871, entitled an act to provide for the col-lection of debts due from Southern

railroads, and for other purposes. House bill to provide for deducting any debt due the United States for any judgment recovered against the United States by such debtor.

House bill relating to the punishment of the crime of manslaughter.

Debate was then resumed, and that the country was on the eve of another revolution more fatal in its results than the late rebellion. 




