POLAND'S GAG LAW AT WORK.

BLOODY BROOKS, OF ARKAN-SAS, PRESENTS HIS PETITION.

THE NEW RULE ADOPTED.

UNFAVROABLE REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA RESOLU-TIONS.

Washington, Feb. 2—Noon—A. C. Buell, of the St. Louis Republican, has been notified by the District Attorney, under orders from the Bureau of Justice, that he was wanted in Washington, for slandering Zack Chandler. The proceedings are uder Poland's gag law. Buell gave bail, and the best of legal talent has volun-teered to test the legality of the law.

Senstor Clayton, of Arkansas, pre-sented a memorial from Jos. Brooks, of Ark., stating that he was elected Governor of that State in 1872, that the State Government had been usurped by force and fraud, and asking that he be recognized by Congress and protected by the Constitutional Government in that State. Referred to Committee on Privileges and Elec-

'After nearly three hours, spent in fruitless efforts to have the rules suspended and the new rule passed, a motion was carried by a majority of one, to suspend the rules and allow the Committee on Rules to report now, Garfield thereupon reported from the Committee on Rules a new rule

prohibiting dilatory motions. The House is now considering it.

Washington, D. C. Feb. 2—Night.— After an exciting debate, in which the Speaker took part as a member of the House, a new rule was adopted, 171 to 85, which forbids dilatory motions on any question, except propositions to appropriate the money, credit or other property of the United States, but provides that the previous question shall not be seconded on the first day that a bill is under considertion except by two-thirds vote. At the close of the proceedings Randall, of Pennsylvania, and Cox, of New York, resigned as members of the Committee

on Rules Logan, from the Committee on Mil-itary Affairs, reported back Clayton's bill to protect each State in the Union against invasion and for other purposes and moved that it be referred to the

Committee on Judiciary. So ordered. Wright, of Iowa, from the Commit-tee on Civil Service and Retrenchment, reported favorably on the bill to pro-vide for the reduction of salaries from the time therein named. Calendar. He gave the notice that he would call up the bill and urge its passage at

the earliest opportunity.

Fenton, of New York, from the Committee on Finance, reported unfavorably on the various resolutions of the North Carolina Legislature for the repeal or modification of the internal revenue laws, in favor of the repeal of the tax on tobacco and in favor of refunding the direct taxes levied and collected upon lands in that State in 1865, and the Committee was discharged from their further consideration.

Sargeant, of California, who had obtained the floor to speak on Louisiana affairs, was taken suddenly sick and could not proceed to-day. Sherman, of Ohio, submitted a resolution instructing the Judiciary Com

mittee to inquire and report whether there is now in force any act of legislation under which the authorities of the District of Columbia are empowered to prosecute and suppress notorious gambling establishments, and if there is not such legislation to report a bill to confersuch powers. Agreed to.

In seconding the resolution, Sherman said he knew nothing of this matter himself, but from what he had seen in the newspapers there existed establishments in this city which were a public scandal and in violation of

the laws of any State.

FORTY-THIRD DAY.

FEBRUARY 1, 1875 Mr. Graham, bill to incorporate the North Carolina State Grange of the Patrons of Husbandry. Referred. Mr. Waring, a bill from the Joint Committee on the Public Debt, comprising several amendments to the bill committed to the Committee. Ordered to be printed.

THE USURY BILL.

The usury bill coming up as unfinished business, Mr. Shaw took the floor in favor of adopting stringent usury laws, and in answer to the position taken by Mr. Busbeeon Saturday. Pending the discussion, further consideration was postponed until to-

morrow. Mr. Wering arose to a question of personal privilege. The Wilmington Journal, editorially, had reflected upon his action in wishing to grant to the Senator from New Hanover the time he asked to consider the bill to amend the charter of the city of Wilmington. This was only a matter of justice and courtesy to a Senator in the minority upon this floor when questions of much importance to the citizens of his county are being considered, and he should always vote to extend this courfesy. He had not been unfriendly to the bill in question, as his vote showed, nor was he unfriendly to the city of Wilmington. His friendship for that city had dated many years back, and he had now at his home a valuable set of silver service presented to him because of serrices he had rendered in behalf of the Wilmington, Charlotte & Rutherford Railroad, and he did not wish to be understood to-day as opposed to anything that would tend to promote the interest of the city of Wilmington; but he did not think he should be required to deprive another Senator of that right which ordinary justice demand-

The first special order—the bill to amend the adultery act, was on mo-tion, re-committed to the Committee. The second being the bill in relation to the sale of the Western North Carolina Railroad, was postponed till to-

day week. On motion of Mr. Walker, of Richmond, the bill to amend the charter of the city of Wilmington was taken up. Mr. Walker advocated the bill as being an act of justice to the tax-paying population of that city.

The three colored Representatives, Lloyd, Brewington and Moore, and Mr. Boyd opposed it as being unjust to the whole people of that city. Several amendments were offered, but all rejected, and the bill passed its readings by a strict party vote, 69 voting in the affirmative and 31 in the negative.
