PETITION FOR THE TEXAS PA-CIFIC RAILROAD.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE PENSION LAWS.

THE SENATE SENDS THE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL TO THE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE.

COMMITTEE REPORTS ON ARKANSAS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Night—Senate—Sherman presented a memorial from the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce in favor of granting aid asked by the Texas Pacific Railroad.

The House has been transacting business of a miscellaneous character, of no public importance.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Night—Senate—The credentials of Theo. F. Randolph, from New Jersey, were read and placed on file.

Pratt, of Indiana, from the Committee on Pensions, reported back the bill granting pensions to certain soldiers and sailors of the war of 1812, and widows of deceased soldiers, and to restore to the pension roll the names of persons stricken therefrom in consequence of disability, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. Placed on Calendar.

In reporting the bill Pratt said that the substitute admitted to the pension rolls the names of all surviving officers, soldiers and sailors of the war of 1812 who had served in that war for a period of 30 days, and also were honorably discharged, and did not voluntarily engage in the late rebellion.

It also admitted all surviving officers and soldiers who served in the Indian war of 1811, and surviving members of Seneca Indian Nation who served in the war of 1812, and finally restored to the roll the names of all persons now surviving, stricken therefrom by the act of 1863, to be paid from the passage of the act.

West, of Louisiana, presented a memorial of P. B. S. Pinchback, asking action on his claim for admission to his seat in the Senate. Referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

In presenting it, West said: I present the petition of P. B. S. Pinchback, Senator-elect from the State of Louisiana.

Morton, of Indiana, from Committee on Privileges and Elections, reported back the bill to regulate the counting of votes for President and Vice-President, and the concurrent resolution to amend the 22d Joint Rule, and asked that the Committee be discharged from their further consideration. It was so ordered.

He also reported from the same Committee a bill to provide for and to regulate the counting of votes for President and Vice-President and decision of questions arising therefrom. Placed on Calendar.

He gave notice that he would ask the Senate to consider the bill on Monday next.

The Senate discussed the House bill to amend the steamboat laws but resolved no vote.

The Louisiana discussion will be renewed Wednesday.

The Civil Rights bill was received from the House of Representatives and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The President will send a special message to Congress on Monday regarding the South.

Housser—An investigation was directed into the expenditures of the Western Judicial District of North Carolina since 1872.

Majority and minority reports were made by the Select Committee on Arkansas Affairs, and re-committed.

The majority report recommends no action by Congress or the government, and the minority report insists that Joseph Brooks is the legal Governor of the State.

LOUISIANA.

REPORTED COMPROMISE BETWEEN THE DEMOCRATS AND RADICALS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Night—Dispatches from New Orleans to the New York Times and Herald report that a compromise which was adopted by the Conservatives by a vote of thirty-nine to twenty-seven. It involves three conditions of the Kellogg government and releasing five members, expelled by military, of the Lower House. McEnery and Penn protest, and Wills offered the resignation, which was not accepted. The oligarchy, who are in constant communication with New Orleans, have no account of these occurrences.

New Orleans, Feb. 6.—Night—In the Conservative caucus last night the proposition under consideration was that the Conservatives should have a majority of about ten in the House and that the past action of the Kellogg government should not be inquired into. The vote stood 38 in favor of this compromise to 27 against it. Gov. McEnery said by this action of caucus it was evident to him that it was time to lower the Democratic banner and he therefore wished to retire.

GOTHAM.

BANK STATEMENT.

New York, Feb. 6.—Night—Loans have increased \$4,750,000; specie has decreased \$2,000,000; legal tenders have increased \$500,000; deposits have increased \$3,000,000; reserves have decreased \$3,000,000.

## ELECTRICISMS.

The Consul General of Nicaragua has addressed a note to Laseps, asking his support for an inter-oceanic canal, which he promises to do.

There are thirty-seven persons suffering from small-pox in the Cook County (Ill.) Poor House. An infected person was admitted by the negligence of the inspector.

The West Virginia Senate has passed a bill moving its Capitol to Wheeling. It is thought that the House will concur.

The strike among the mill operatives at Fall River continues. Nearly two thousand weavers and spinners, mostly females, have been idle nearly a fortnight.

The Lancaster, Penn., pumps are frozen, and the city is without water.

## GEORGIA.

THE RACES YESTERDAY.

SATURNAL, Feb. 6.—Night—Fine day, fine track and large attendance. The first race, a dash of two miles between Granger and Limestone, which was declared a dead heat; time 3:41. The owners divided the money and decided to run another heat. The second race, three mile heats, Jim Hinton won two straight heats, beating Occident; time 7:01; 6:31; poor race, nothing more than a walk over. The third race, mile heats, three started, Volcano, Denver and Warfare. Volcano won straight heats; time 1:57; 1:54. The races will continue on Monday, which is the last day.

## EUROPE.

A BLOODY REPULSE FOR THE CARLISTS.

MADRID, Feb. 6.—Night—Eight battalions of Carlists made a furious attack on Alfonso's troops, near Ortelzo, making a bayonet charge, and were repulsed with great loss.

A decree has been issued to the effect that military and naval officers must abstain from attending political meetings.
