SENATE COMMITTEE REPORT IN FAVOR OF KELLOGG.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Morton, from the Committee on Ways and Means, reports that the Committee has found that the tariff and taxes have been found to be inoperative, seriously injuring trade. The statement is authorized that no final action has been taken upon any tariff or tax, the whole matter being yet unsettled.

The condition of the Appropriation bills and the Navy and Fortification bills are laws. The Consular and Diplomatic bill will soon be presented to the President. The Executive, Legislative and Judicial bill is before the Committee on Conference. The Indian bill on account of defeat on the Choctaw clause has been re-committed. The Army bill in Committee of the Whole, a so Military Academy and Postoffice bills. The River and Harbor and Deficiency bills not yet reported. A large amount of other public business will require eight sessions.

Attorney General Williams appeared before the Select Committee of Alabama. He had no correspondence with Gov. Houston, but sent troops to Alabama upon information from other sources. There is no prospect of an extension of patents on Sewing Machines. There is a heavy lobby on this subject. House.—This being Monday, a large number of bills were introduced and referred.

Speaker Quilley, from the Judiciary Committee, reported adversely on a bill to give jurisdiction to the Court of Claims to hear the claim of G. W. Cassin Lee for Arlington, and it was indefinitely postponed. SENATE.—The credentials of Theo. F. Randolph, from New Jersey, were placed on file.

Pratt, of Indiana, from Committee on Pensions, reported back the bill granting pensions to certain soldiers and sailors of the war of 1812, and widows of deceased soldiers, and to restore to pension rolls the names of persons stricken therefrom, in consequence of disability, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. Placed on calendar. In reporting the bill, Pratt said the substitute admitted to the pension rolls the names of all surviving officers, soldiers and sailors of the war of 1812, who served in that war for a period of 30 days, and also were honorably discharged and did not voluntarily engage in the late rebellion.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—Night.—House.—Sener, of Virginia, introduced a bill for a break water at Smith's Point, on the Potomac river; for a light house at the mouth of the great Wisconsin river, Va.; also to make West Point, Va., a port of entry.

Speaker, of Alabama, introduced a bill to apportion the eight representative Districts of Alabama.

Crossland, of Kentucky, introduced a bill for an income tax of 2 1/2 per cent on incomes exceeding \$2,000.

Morey, of Louisiana, moved to suspend the rules so as to make in order to the river and harbor appropriation bill a proposition for an appropriation to close the existing crevasses or breaks in the levees of the Mississippi river, and for making a survey for a permanent plan for the reclamation of the alluvial basin of the Mississippi river. Rejected by a vote of yeas 122, nays 73; not a two-thirds in the affirmative.

Speaker, of Pennsylvania, moved to suspend the rules and adopt the resolution declaring that, in the judgment of the House, the election of a President for a third term is against the traditions of the republic and is in violation of the examples of Washington, now sacred as law itself, and would be hazardous alike for the liberties of the people and the free institutions of the country. The motion was lost, the previous question not being seconded, 57 to 102. All who voted for it, with the exception of Smith, of North Carolina, were Democrats, and all who voted against it were Republicans.

House, of Massachusetts, moved to suspend the rules to make in order an appropriation bill or amendment for the abolition, suspension, or repeal of Section 25 of the revised Statutes, regulating the time for holding elections for Representatives in Congress. He stated that in order to make the time conform to the law required several State Constitutions would have to be changed between now and 1876. The motion was agreed to, yeas 161, nays 74.

The President signed the Little Tariff bill.

To the Senate of the United States: Herewith I have the honor to send,

in accordance with the resolution of the Senate of the 3d inst, all the information in my possession not heretofore furnished, relating to affairs in the State of Arkansas. I will venture to express the opinion that all the testimony shows that in the election of 1872, Joseph Brooks was lawfully elected Governor of that State; that it has been unlawfully deprived of the possession of his office since that time; that in 1874 the Constitution of the State was by violence, intimidation and revolutionary proceedings overturned and a new Constitution adopted, and a new State Government established. These proceedings, if permitted to stand, practically ignore all rights of minorities in all the States; also what is there to prevent each of the States recently re-admitted to Federal relations on certain conditions, from changing their Constitutions and violating their pledges if their action in Arkansas is acquiesced in? I respectfully submit whether a precedent so dangerous to the stability of State Government, if not to the National Government also, should be recognized by Congress. I earnestly ask that Congress will take decisive action in this matter to relieve the Executive from acting upon questions which should be decided by the Legislative Board of the Government.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Night.—In the Senate, Spencer, from Alabama, introduced a bill for the apportionment of Representatives in Congress from the State of Alabama. Referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. A number of bills reported by the Committee on Patents were passed, but one to extend a patent for a trimming attachment for sewing machines, to be used only in the manufacture of boots and shoes, was rejected by a vote of 23 to 15. Several Senators declared their opposition to extending any sewing machine patents.

Morton, from the Committee on Privileges and Elections, made a report recognizing Kellogg as Governor of Louisiana, and declaring Fitzhugh as entitled to the seat as United States Senator from that State from March 4, 1873. Ordered to be printed and lie on the table. Hamilton, of Maryland, raised a point of order that the report was signed by only four members of the Committee, which was not a majority, the Committee being composed of nine members.

Morton argued that there were seven members present when the report was made and that five constituted a quorum. The report was signed by a majority of those present.

Hamilton's point of order was overruled. He gave notice that he would submit a minority report.

RALEIGH.

SOME EARLY EFFECTS OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL.

HOW THE OLD THING WORKS.

TWO REPUBLICAN MEMBERS FORMALLY SECEDE FROM THE PARTY.

RALEIGH, Feb. 8.—Night.—On the floor of the House, W. B. Gunn, of Yadkin, brother-in-law of Judge Settle of the Supreme Court, and J. H. Focht, formerly Federal appointee, re-joined Republicanism on account of the passage of the Civil Rights bill in Congress. Strong resolutions were offered, and in conclusion Focht said: "I declare that I hereby forever dissolve my connection with the Republican party and ally myself with the great party that is now building up in the South and North for the preservation of constitutional government and the purity and salvation of the Anglo Saxon race of our great land."

LOUISIANA.

BUT LITTLE PROSPECT OF A COMPROMISE NOW.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 8.—Night.—The Conservatives last night considered the proposition of adjournment submitted by the Congressional Committee. Neither the terms nor action of the caucus transpired. The compromise involves the submission of contested seats under the election of 1874 to the Congressional Committee. Persons so returned will not disturb the present Government, known as the Kellogg Government, or seek to impeach the Governor for any past official acts. The Conservatives discussed the matter without action. The Republicans say they will accept no compromise. The Conservative meeting at the Clay Statue also protested in strong language.

ELECTRICISMS.

St. Mary's Catholic Church, at Potosi, Conn., has been burned. Loss \$70,000; insurance \$48,000. Cause—defective flue.

Brevet Brig. Gen. Wm. Hays is dead. He was born in Richmond, and was appointed from Tennessee. He graduated in the year 1810, and served in the Mexican war.

The loss by fire at Shakertown, Mass., amounts to \$70,000.

Lieutenant commander Allen, of the U. S. Navy, was found dead at Portland a day or two ago. Cause—apoplexy.

A rector and his assistant rector, at Baltimore, have been brought before a ecclesiastical court for using prayer for the dead involving the doctrine of purgatory.

The vindicator, from New York for Philadelphia, was out by 100 and it is feared has sunk.

EUROPE.

FIGHTING NEAR ESTELLA.

A BLOODY ENGAGEMENT WITH THE CARLISTS.

DRIVING THE CARLISTS TO THE NORTH.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—Night.—In the election in the Seine et Oise a Republican leads the Bonapartist by five thousand for the assembly.

Subscriptions to the Paris municipal loan exceed the amount required forty times.

HENDAYE, Feb. 8.—Night.—Fighting is going on in the vicinity of Estella. The Carlists have concentrated and occupy the same position that they held when Gen. Concha was killed.

MADRID, Feb. 8.—Night.—Sener Mery has been appointed Minister to Berlin.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Night.—Earl Harborough is dead, aged 40 years.

Twelve cannon, four thousand rifles and five hundred thousand cartridges have been landed on the Biscay coast for the Carlists.

Alfonso has entered Pamplona. The Carlists made a fierce attack at Olcina, their object being to capture Alfonso, but were driven off with a heavy loss.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—Night.—Additional returns confirm the success of the Republicans in the Seine et Oise. A second ballot was required in the Cotes du Nord.

A grand ball was given for the benefit of the poor of Strasse, at which 150,000 francs were realized. The leading band, the Cabinet and other prominent people were present.

RAYONNE, Feb. 8.—Night.—The Alfontista have entered Estella. It is stated that the Carlist chiefs, Mendiere and Argos, have been killed by their own men.

Don Carlos has retreated to Virgara in the Province of Guipuzcoa.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

DOINGS IN THE NATIONAL GRANGE.

CHARLESTON, Jan. 8.—Night.—The National Grange was Saturday engaged in a pleasure trip up the Ashley river and met at night for business of private character.

The Lower House of the State Legislature passed unanimously the bill requesting Senators and Congressmen from South Carolina to support the Texas Pacific Railroad.

THE EXPRESS ROBBERY CASE.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Night.—Sweeney has turned State's evidence in the express robbery case; on his evidence James Drew was discharged, Ehrlich is charged with receiving stolen goods. Hourly is held for the Grand Jury. Sweeney has been sent to the house of detention. All but \$2,000 of the property has been recovered.
