TRYING TO MAKE UP FOR THE DEFICIT IN REVENUE.

THE DUTY ON SUGAR TO BE RESTORED.

THE ARLINGTON BILL TO BE PLACED ON THE CALENDAR.

AN EFFORT TO SEND GRANT'S MESSAGE TO COMMITTEE ON PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS.

REPORT ON TARIFF AND TAX BILL.

GOV. VANCE URGING PAYMENT OF ANTE-BELUM MAIL CONTRACTS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—House—Speaker, of Louisiana, offered the following resolution, which was agreed to:

WHEREAS, The expenses of the Government require an additional revenue of from thirty to forty million dollars, and

WHEREAS, By the Act of the 14th of July, 1870, the duty on imported sugars was reduced at the rate of 33 1/3 per cent; and

WHEREAS, Said reduction of duty diminished the revenue of the Government fourteen millions dollars in gold annually, without reducing the price of sugars to the consumers; therefore

Resolved, That the Committee on Ways and Means be directed to inquire into the expediency of restoring the duty on all imported sugars to the rate of duty imposed by law previously to the passage of the aforesaid Act.

The Sub-Committee on Ways and Means have reported in favor of twenty per cent increase on the present tariff on all grades of sugar, and it is said the full Committee accepted the report, and that their bill embraces this feature.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Night—Senator Clayton, of Arkansas, moved that the message of the President, on Arkansas, be taken up and referred to Committee on Privileges and Elections.

Bayard, of Delaware, said that yesterday an order was made to print the message and accompanying documents, which had not yet been compiled with. True, the message was here, but the accompanying documents had not yet been printed. He had been informed that it was the intention of the Senate to adjourn today at the expiration of the morning hour, as a mark of respect to the late Senator Buckingham, of Connecticut, whose funeral took place to-day. He therefore hoped the motion to refer would be considered now, as it would lead to debate and there were but few minutes of the morning hour left.

Clyde said some days ago he presented a memorial from the Hon. Joseph Brooks, of Arkansas, to the effect that he had been unlawfully kept out of his office as Governor, and that memorial was referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. He (Clyde) introduced a resolution calling upon the President for information received yesterday after presenting the memorial, and it seemed to him proper that the message should go to the same Committee as the memorial of Brooks.

Thurman said, ordinarily there was no trouble about referring a message, but this was an exceptional case. He seemed to him that if anything could be demonstrated it was a fact that this message should go to the Committee on Judiciary.

He did not want to consume time in arguing the matter now, but he was sure that the message could not be referred without debate, as it was the most extraordinary and astounding of all messages. He asked that the unfinished business, the steamboat bill, be taken up.

The Vice President announced that the morning hour had expired, and laid before the Senate the steamboat bill, it being the unfinished business from yesterday.

Senate then adjourned.

The Senate Committee voted on the Southern Pacific Railroad bill; the result was a tie vote; further action will await the return of Senator Stewart, who favors the bill.

Quartermaster Derby has been ordered to Raleigh, N. C.

The Ways and Means Committee have agreed upon a tariff and tax bill, which will be reported to-morrow. The duty on sugar and molasses is increased twenty-five per cent, upon increased rates, and classifications are not disturbed.

The tax on whisky is increased 15 cents per gallon, on all in bond and in the hands of retailers and wholesale dealers, and thirty cents per gallon on future manufacture, and an increase of duty on imported spirits to correspond with the increase upon domestic.

The tax on tobacco is increased four cents per pound on all manufactured after the law takes effect. The ten per cent reduction, in act of 1872, is repealed, and matches are wholly relieved from tax.

Congress refused by a decided vote to pass the coffee bill.

Vance, of North Carolina, appeared before the Committee on Appropriations and urged the payment of \$37,067,717, due Southern mail contractors for carrying the mails, up to the 20th of May, 1871. Referred to a sub-committee.

The rest of the day's session was consumed in discussing an appropriation to pay Cloutlaw and Chesapeake claims to the amount of about \$1,000,000. They were rejected and the Indian appropriation bill was passed.

EUROPE.

THE CAPTURE OF ESTELLA NOT YET CONFIRMED.

DON CARLOS STILL ACTIVE.

A GREAT VICTORY FOR THE CARLISTS REPORTED.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—Noon.—The capture of Estella by the Alfontists is unconfirmed. The Carlists claim to have regained the ground lost in Guipuzcoa; that General Lema has been compelled to abandon Zoloug and Guipuzcoa, and is hemmed in at San Sebastian, and that the Alfontists lost 12,000 men in recent battles.

MADRID, Feb. 9.—Noon.—Alfonso returns to Madrid on Saturday. Jovellar takes chief command of the army of the North.

MADRID, Feb. 9.—Night.—The Carlist chief, Mendiere, reported killed by his own men, was shot for treason by order of Don Carlos.

The Alfontists operating against the Carlists in Navarra have suffered a check, caused by the over-confidence of the Alfontist commander.

Count Valmaseda is to be appointed Captain-General of Cuba. Important measures regarding Cuba are pending.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Night.—The Carlist Committee here have intelligence of a great victory, seven thousand Alfontists having been killed and wounded. Don Carlos issued a congratulatory proclamation.

LOUISIANA.

NO FORMAL ACTION FOR COMPROMISE.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 9.—Noon.—The cotton laden steamer, Princeton, is burning in her hold.

Judge Marshall, member of the Congressional Committee, in a card disavows any formal action of the Committee towards a compromise. Individual members are responsible as individuals.

ELECTRICISMS.
