THE NEW TARIFF BILL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10-Noon,-SEN-ATE. -Clayton, of Arkansas, intro-duced an act to place the colored soldiers who enlisted in the army on the same footing as to bounties and pensions with the white soldiers. Refer-

red to Committee on Military Affairs, House-Sener, of Virginia, presented a resolution of the Virginia Legislature, in relation to the tax on the circulating medium. Referred. The House went into Committee of

was made special order for to-morrow. The following is the full text of the Be it enacted, &c., That from and after the date of the passage of this act there shall be levied and collected on all distilled spirits on which the

tax prescribed by law shall not have been paid, and whether the said spiri s shall then be in distillery, bonded warehouse or not, a tax of one dollar on each proof gallon or wine gallon. When below proof to be paid by the distiller, owner or person having posfrom the distillery or bonded warehouse, and so much of section 3,251 of the revised statutes of the United States is inconsistant herewith is hereby repealed. Provided that in addition to the tax of 70 cents per gallon imposed by law now existing there shall be levied and collected a tax of 15 cents, being one-half the increase of the tax under this act on each and every proof gallon or wine gallon when below proof or domestic distilled, spirits manifest and placed in bonded warehouse prior to the day when this act shall take effect and held in bonded warehouse at that time, and on all such spirits then held by distillers, rectifiers or wholesale dealers having in their possession or under their con-tract, distilled spirits in stampe. packages and any person who shall transfer or otherwise dispose of such

effect until an additional stamp to be especialy printed for this purpose by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue denoting the payment of the additional 15 cents per gallon herein im-posed is purchased and attached to the package or packages containing the same in such manner as the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shall prescribe; shall be subject to, or pay a penalty of one dollar for each and every gallon so removed, and the spirits removed shall be forfeited to the United States; and provided further, that on all brandy, gin, rum and on all compounds and preparations of which distilled spirits is a component part of chief value explracing all forms of distilled spirits imported from foreign countries on which the duty as fixed in the revised statutes is two dollars per gallon, the duty here-after to be levied and collected and

paid shall be \$2 50 per proof gallon. Sec. 2. That section 3,368 of the revised statutes be, and the same is, hereby amended by striking out the words 20 cents per pound, and inserting in lieu thereof, the words 24 cen's per pound; provided that the inper pound; provided, that the increase of tax herein provided for shall not apply to tobacco on which the tax under the existing law shall have been paid when this act takes effect.

Sec. 3. That so much of section 3, 437, as imposes a stamp tax on friction matches, lucifer matches, and other articles made in part and favor, and used for like purposes, be, and the same is hereby repealed, to take effect on and after the 1st of July, 1875.

Sec. 4. That on all molasses, not in cluding tank bottom syrup of sugar, cane juice, melado, or concentrated melado, and on sugar according to the Datch standard in color, imported from foreign countries, there shall be levied, collected and paid, in addition to the duties now imposed in schedule G, section 2, 504, of the revised statntes, so amount equal to twenty-five per cent. of said duties as levied upon the several grades therein designated.

Sec. t. That so much of section 2 503, of the revised statutes, as provides that only 90 per cent, of the several duties and rates of duty imposed on certain articles therein enumerated by section 2, 504, shall be levied, colloted and paid, and the same is hereby repealed, and the several duties and rates of duty prescribed in said section 2,504, shall be and remain as by that section levied, without abatement of 10 per centum, as provided in section 2, 503.

Sec. 6. That the increase of duties provided by this act shall not apply to any goods, wares or merchandise ac-United States on the 10th day of February, 1875. Nor any other such goods, wares or merchandise on deposit in warehouses or public stores at the

date of the passage of this act.

(to which there was an amendment pending, submitted last session by Edmunds, providing that at any time say desirction shall be made in the admission of pupils, on account of race or color, the site shall revert to the United States) was taken upland rejected, by a vote of 23 yeas to 24 pays, Cameron, Perry of Connecticut, Gilbert, Ingall, Morrell of Vermont, Schurz and Sprague being among those who voted in the negative.

Alcorn, of Mississippi, said that the vote just taken indicated the fact that the Republicans had become thoroughly demoralized on the st bject of civil rights, and he felt constrained to vote against the bill. It could be construed in no other way than as an intimation that if the Trustees of the School choose to do so, they might pal office, corner fixth and Arch streets, exclude colored children from its Patradelphia, every Monday, where all 1 sters benefits.

Morrill, of Vermont, desied that such a construction would be justified. He hoped that this institution, which was a private one, would make no distinction on account of color. The bill was then passed without a division, Alcorn voting in the negative.

The steamboat bill was recommitted to the Committee on Commerce. The bill to provide a government for the District of Columbia, was discus sed, but no vote was reached. Morton gave notice that he would call up the resolution to admit Pinch-

THE NORTH RIVER BRIDGED WITH ICE.

REPORT ON FISH CULTURE.
