THE POSTOFFICE BILL PASSED THE HOUSE.

DISCUSSION ON THE TARIFF BILL.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11—Noon—SENATE—Hamilton, of Missouri, presented a minority report from the Committee on Privileges and Elections, signed by himself and Sanbury, against the admission of Pinchback. Ordered to be printed and lie on the table.

The House is again considering the Postoffice Appropriation bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11—Night—In the Senate to-day, McGree, of Kentucky, introduced a bill setting forth that it had been reported in a responsible medical journal of the United States that a Cooley ship from Calcutta had become infected with epidemic cholera during her voyage, and it had been announced, in a newspaper of the State of Texas, that a disease resembling cholera was raging in Mexico, at no great distance from the frontier of the United States, therefore the Secretary of War be directed to detail a medical officer of the army, under the direction of the Surgeon-General, to investigate carefully the matter of said reports, and if they shall be based on facts, he shall, through the Surgeon-General, give due and timely notice of the advance and spread of the disease, and should it threaten to reach the United States during the present year, it shall be the duty of said officer to complete the records of the epidemic and report the same to Congress.

The bill proposes an appropriation of \$5,000 to defray the expenses of the investigation. Referred to Committee on Appropriations.

The bill to provide a government for the District of Columbia was discussed the balance of the day; the amendment of Morton, to have the Commissioners elected by the qualified voters of the District, instead of being them appointed by the President, was rejected by a vote of yeas, 28; nays, 28.

Bargant offered an amendment to provide for the election of a delegate to Congress, which was being discussed when the Senate adjourned.

The Senate discussed this morning on the order of business. There was to have been a joint session caucus to-night but it failed; probably on account of bad weather. The South generally was to have been considered.

The House passed the postoffice appropriation bill after rejecting an amendment for the practical restoration of the franking privilege.

The new tariff bill was discussed during the rest of the day's session, Dawes, of Mississippi, the Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, making a speech for it, and Wood, of New York, a Democratic member of that Committee, making one against it. No action.

## EUROPE.

LONDON, Feb. 11—Noon—A royal train, bearing Alfonso, was fired into by the Carlists a few miles from Logrono. None hurt.

Berlin, Feb. 11—Noon—Bismarck will remain in office as long as his health will permit.

## ELECTRICISMS.

The National Convention of the Stove Manufacturers, now in session at Chicago, denounced free trade with Canada and the reciprocity treaty.

A large dry dock, at Philadelphia, was sunk while taking on the Pennsylvania for repairs. The ice floated under the dock and overturned it, doing considerable damage. It lies on its side and it will be several days before she is righted. One workman is missing. It being the only dock on the Delaware, the Pennsylvania will probably be towed to New York for repairs.

All harbors are closed in the Penobscot Bay, which is frozen over for the first time in quarter of a century.

A special to the Savannah News, from Tallahassee, Fla., says that C. W. Jones, Democrat, of Escambia county, is elected U. S. Senator.

No progress in the Senatorial election in Minnesota.

The National Stove Association have a fixed rates upon common at six and quarter, medium at seven and best at eight cents per pound.

## GOTHAM.

THE TERRIBLE WEATHER.

New York, Feb. 11—Noon—An easterly snow and rain storm prevails. The Staten Island ferry boat was cut through and has been drawn off for repairs.

The Ambassador, for London, was forced ashore by the ice on the flats. Several vessels, in attempting to go to sea, were obliged to return. Several pilot-boats are in the ice off Sandy Hook, which extends as far as the eye can reach.

John Haviland & Co., importers of fruit, have failed. Liabilities \$3,000 to \$4,000.

President Grant's Arkansas Message.

The closing sentence of this extraordinary document conveys a clear intimation or threat that if Congress should follow the advice of the committee sent to investigate the condition of things in Arkansas and let the State alone, the President will interfere on his own authority to upset the State government, depose Garland and install Brooks as Governor. This is the boldest menace, and its fulfillment would be the most daring act ever ventured upon even by General Grant. "I earnestly ask," he says, "that Congress will take definite action in the matter to relieve the Executive from resting upon the question which should be decided by the legislative branch of the government." He too evidently means, if Congress does not act, to adopt a course parallel to that which he has pursued in Louisiana, constraining the silence of that body as a permission to follow his own judgment as to who is the rightful Governor, and to put him in office and maintain him in office by military force. The demand that Congress act on the subject in disregard to the advice of one of its own committees who have visited the State and inquired into its affairs is absurd. If, as the committee think, the new constitution and the Garland government are supported by a large majority of the people and are legally valid, what objection is there for Congress to "take definite action in the matter," or to act upon it at all? He might as reasonably ask Congress to decide whether Mr. Tilden is the legal Governor of New York, with an implied threat of ousting him if Congress declines to go beyond its authority and pass upon his claim. It is a subject in which Congress has no right to interfere, and its forbearance to act can give the President no shadow of an excuse to overthrow the State government and put Brooks in office.

According to the President's Message he has much stronger grounds for supporting the claim of Brooks than he ever had for supporting that of Kellogg. He does not pretend that Kellogg was legally elected, and he has recently stated, in a Message to Congress, his opinion that the Louisiana election of 1872 was a "gigantic fraud," and that he sustained Kellogg because, between two invalid claims to the Governorship, he thought Kellogg's the least objectionable. But he has no misgivings respecting the claims of Brooks. He asserts that gentleman's title to the office of Governor in the strongest possible language, and if he follows the precedent set for himself in Louisiana General Grant, as soon as the session closes, will send the army to Arkansas to revolutionize its government. By declaring his belief that Brooks is the legitimate Governor he has invited him to make an application for Federal assistance in putting down opposition to his authority; and it is plain from this amazing Message that the President intends to comply with such a request when it is made, unless Congress ties up his hands. We want him to tie up his hands, for a greater commotion than was caused by the military interference with the Louisiana Legislature.

We will not discuss the Arkansas constitution now, for the deliberate judgment of Judge Poland's committee, formed after careful investigation, renders such a discussion unnecessary. Suffice it to say, that the alleged irregularity is merely technical, and is no greater than has happened in many other States in adopting new constitutions. The present constitution of New York was framed and adopted in 1846, in disregard of the provisions of the constitution that preceded it, it being held here, as it has been held elsewhere, that the permission of the Legislature and ratification by a majority of the people was a sufficient warrant. Grant has just as much legal authority to reinstate the old constitution of New York as he has to send an army to revive the dead and discarded constitution of Arkansas after the people, acting under the authority of the Legislature, have established another.
