HEADQUARTERS.

WHAT THE HOAR COMMITTEE WILL REPORT.

THE SENATE CAUCUSING ON THE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL.

ANOTHER DOOR SHUT AGAINST THE SOUTH.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20--Noon--Carpenter occupied his seat in the Senate to-day.

The Indian Appropriation bill is being considered.

House--Is in Committee on the Tariff bill.

The Baltimore Sun special says the Hoar committee will make two reports, one setting members expelled by the military, and the other reorganizing Kellogg.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20--Night--The Treasury received four million dollars in bonds from Europe, to-day, for redemption and exchange.

The Senate caucused this morning on the order of business. There was a slim attendance. The Civil Rights bill was considered, but no conclusion was reached upon and subject.

The Library Committee heard Gen. Denver and others of the Mexican Veteran Association in favor of an equestrian statue in honor of Gen. Zachary Taylor.

Alcorn introduced a bill for the relief of the overflowed Mississippi river lands.

The Indian bill was taken up, but gave way to Kellogg.

The debate in the House to-day was on the motion made by Barlow, of Illinois, to strike out of the tariff bill the 5th section, which provides for the restoration of the 10 per cent. reduction on manufactured goods. Nearly all the members from Pennsylvania, Democratic as well as Republican, spoke in favor of retaining the section.

The single exception was in the case of Stearns, a Pennsylvania Democrat, who, to the amazement and chagrin of all his colleagues, supported the motion to strike out the section, and avowed himself unqualifiedly a free trader. The motion to strike out was lost by a vote of 86 to 98, and then, without finishing the bill, it was laid aside, and eulogies were pronounced on the four recently deceased members of the House, Crocker and Hooper, of Massachusetts; Hensley, of Maryland, and Rice, of Illinois.

The Louisiana Committee will report through Mr. Foster on Tuesday, and a minority report will be submitted by Mr. G. E. Har.

The report of the Committee, which will be signed by Messrs. Foster, Phelps, Potter and Marshall, will adhere to the original views presented in the sub-committee report, and contains a recommendation that a resolution urging the proper authorities in Louisiana to give the control of the lower House to the Conservative members be adopted by the House. Some of those signing the report will express their willingness to support a resolution formally recognizing the Kellogg Government, but the resolution their report does not urge, for the reason that the rights of Kellogg have not been established by any evidence taken by the committee, but are admitted upon general rumor, and as the best possible solution of the present difficulties.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20--Night--SENATE--Andrew Johnson's credentials were presented.

A resolution appointing a committee of five to sit during recess to examine the various branches of the civil service and report by bill or otherwise, with a view to reorganization, was introduced.

A resolution giving wounded soldiers, widows and orphans of those who died in line of duty preference in civil service. Passed by a vote of 36 to 8. This shuts out the South.

EUROPE.

TERRIBLE FIRE AND LOSS OF LIFE IN SWEDEN.

GATTENBURG, Feb. 20--Noon--A match factory was burned here crowded with workmen. The upper story was cut off and fifty perished in the flames or by leaping from the building.

PARIS, Feb. 20--Noon--The Assembly has adjourned until Monday.

LONDON, Feb. 20--Noon--The Stock Exchange is closed for repairs to the building.

ELECTRICISMS.

The Standing Committee of the diocese of Illinois have issued a pamphlet showing that Dr. DeKoven's election to have been perfectly fair and conducted according to the canon.
