HEADQUARTERS.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LOUISIANA REPORT.

THEY UNANIMOUSLY CONDEMN THE RETURN BOARD.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO BURN PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

THE COMMITTEE REPORTS ON LOUISIANA AND ALABAMA.

THE HOUSE ENGAGED ON THE TARIFF BILL.

DEVELOPMENT OF GRANT'S PROGRAMME IN ALABAMA.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23—Noon—Hous—The Louisiana Special Committee reported with resolutions, unanimously condemning the Returning Board; and by a majority of four to three recommending the Louisiana House of Representatives to take immediate steps to remedy the injuries and to place the persons rightfully entitled in their seats. Also recommending the recognition of Kellogg as Governor till the termination of his term of office. Ordered to be printed.

The Committee on Alabama affairs also made a report.

The House then proceeded with the Tariff bill.

In the Senate the Judiciary Committee reported that the United States is not bound to proceed with the contract for additional Pacific mail service to Ohio and Japan.

Winder's Building, occupied by the Ordnance and Engineer Departments, was fired by incendiaries. The building is opposite the Navy Department, which has been fired three times. Some one is crazy or there is a plot to destroy records.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23—Night—The Senate Finance Committee agreed to the bill authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to buy the Freedman's Bank building at \$315,000.

Hous—G. F. Hoar, of Massachusetts, Chairman of the Special Committee on Louisiana Affairs, made his report, closing with the following resolutions:

Whereas, Both branches of the Legislature of Louisiana have requested the Select Committee of the House to investigate the circumstances attending the election and returns thereof in that State for the year 1874; and whereas, said Committee has unanimously reported that the Returning Board of that State, in canvassing and compiling said returns and promulgating the results, wrongfully applied an erroneous rule of law by reason whereof persons were awarded in the House of Representatives seats to which they were not entitled, and persons entitled to seats were deprived of them,

Resolved, That it is recommended to the House of Representatives in Louisiana to take immediate steps to remedy said injustice and to place the persons rightfully entitled in their seats.

Resolved, That William P. Kellogg be recognized as the Governor of the State of Louisiana until the end of the term of office fixed by the Constitution of that State.

The majority and minority reports were ordered to be printed.

As the result of a colloquy between the Members as to which was the majority report and which was the minority report, it may be stated that all the members of the Committee report against the action of the Returning Board, and that Messrs. Foster, Phelps, Potter and Marshall unite in a majority report that there was no general intimidation in the State, but a free and fair election which resulted in favor of the Conservatives who were deprived of the result by the wrongful action of the Returning Board. That Messrs. Hoar, Wheeler and Fife unite in a minority report, and that Foster assents with Hoar, Wheeler and Fife to a compromise to recognize Kellogg as Governor, and giving the majority in the House to the Conservative delegates.

The majority report in the case of Alabama was presented by Coburn, of Indiana, Chairman of the Select Committee, and the views of the minority, by Buckner, of Missouri. They were ordered to be printed.

Coburn, of Maryland, made an effort to get up what is known as the caucus force bill, reported by him last week. Smith, of New York, made an effort to get up the constitutional amendment to regulate the election of President and Vice President, but Daves, of Massachusetts, pressed action on the present duties. It restores the ten per cent on manufacturer's goods, and provides that the increase of duties shall not apply to goods actually on shipboard for use on or before 10th February, 1875, or to goods

on deposit in warehouses or public stores at the date of the passage of the act.

SENATE—Spencer presented a memorial from the Republican members of the General Assembly of Alabama to the President and Members of Congress setting forth, first, that changes have been made by the Alabama Legislature in the penal code of the State by which a system of involuntary servitude and peonage for African citizens is sought to be inaugurated; second, that political legislation has been enacted by means of which 93,000 Republican voters are practically deprived of representation, that the Republican constitution is restricted and there is a practical nullification of the constitutional amendments. They therefore ask Congress to empower the President to suspend the writ of habeas corpus in certain contingencies in order to preserve the peace in the Southern States. Referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

The Post Office Appropriation Bill was then taken up. The amendment to strike out the clause repealing the Pacific Mail subsidy was lost by a vote of 52 to 11.

The Army Bill passed.

The bill for the admission of Colorado is up. Edmunds stated that the majority of his party desired their action, otherwise he would have pressed the Civil Rights bill.

The Cabinet to-day decided to take action at present upon the proposition for the Pacific Railroad Company to make a sinking fund of their obligations to the Government last discussed in Congress should put to hazard the regular appropriation bills.

There was no discussion in the Cabinet to-day either upon the Arkansas or Louisiana affairs.

## GEORGIA.

THE STATE TREASURY A MILLION SHORT.

THE ROBBERY CHARGED TO HENRY CLEWS.

ELABORATE INVESTIGATION BY THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

TREASURER JONES REQUESTED TO RESIGN.

New York, Feb. 23—Night—The Herald has at long special to the effect that the Georgia State Treasury is a million short. Treasurer Jones reported over a million in the treasury, but only one hundred and fifty thousand dollars can be found.

An investigation shows that at least one hundred and fifty thousand dollars in bonds have been paid twice. Treasurer Jones says Henry Clews, who was State agent, never gave him a statement of disbursements; if Clews paid bonds without cancelling them and then put them on the market again Treasurer Jones had no means of knowing it. The whole State regards Jones as perfectly honest. His bond is two hundred thousand dollars.

ATLANTA, Feb. 23—Night—The Sub Finance Committee, appointed to examine the Treasury, have made an elaborate and voluminous report to-day upon its salient points, which are as follows: On the first of January last Treasurer Jones reported the cash on hand to be one million and three thousand dollars. Since that time he has collected one hundred and sixty-seven thousand dollars, making the total for which he is responsible one million one hundred and seventy thousand dollars, and for which he is credited as follows: Six hundred and thirty-two thousand dollars are in the hands of agents in New York, for the paying of maturing bonds and interest on coupons which was not received at the time Treasurer Jones made his report to the Legislature; also one hundred and seventy-nine thousand dollars paid out by the Fourth National Bank of New York as interest and premiums on gold; also paid out of the Treasury direct on Executive warrants since the first of January one hundred and twenty-four thousand dollars, also cash on hand one hundred and seventy-seven thousand dollars, making one million one hundred and two thousand dollars, which leaves a deficit of \$8,000 to account; for this deficit Treasurer Jones submits informal vouchers for advances made to civil establishments, state road, exchange bills, executive warrants signed by Bullock, interest on temporary loans, loss by failure of John King at Columbus and counterfeits amounting to \$64,000, none of which are in proper form, and which, upon a superficial examination, the Committee does not allow, thus leaving about four thousand dollars unaccounted for altogether. The Committee further state that Treasurer Jones has illegally paid one hundred and fifty-two thousand dollars on old bonds, due January 1872, the same being a part of the bonds said by Bullock to have been paid by Clews. Of course Jones is not charged with this in the foregoing balance.

Jones states in extenuation that he had had no notice of the previous payment.

The Committee conclude by recommending that Jones be requested to resign, and in the event that he refuses that the State appoint a competent financial agent to supervise the Treasury Department and ascertain accurately the condition of the State's finances. The Committee do not attack the integrity of the Treasurer but condemn without qualification the system of book keeping and the general administration of the Treasury.

The report was ordered printed and made the special order for to-morrow evening. It is not known whether Jones will resign or not, but it is predicted by many that he will not, and if he refuses there is some talk of impeaching him, but they will hardly attempt to such violent measures. A provision will be made by the present Legislature to cover all deficits and keep the finances of the State in a healthy condition.

## EUROPE.

THE PROCESS OF ORGANIZATION OF THE FRENCH SENATE.

TOASTING ROYALTY AT BERLIN.

PARIS, Feb. 23—Noon—The floor of the galleries of the Assembly was crowded this a. m. The report of the Committee of Thirty upon the organization of the Senate reads: It rejects the American plan, and approves, with some modification, the plan of electing the Senate by the Assembly, Councils and Colonies.

A motion of urgency was carried by both Centres and the entire Left, whereupon the Right withdrew.

Castellane, Monarchist, mounted the tribune and declared that the Senate would lead to dissolution and anarchy, and threatened that if the measures were voted imposing upon MacMahon the duty of organizing the Republic the Right would resign in a body.

Duval, Bonapartist, moved that the Senate be elected by universal suffrage. Rejected, the Bonapartists only voting for it.

Waller, Bonapartist, moved that the Senate consist of three hundred members, departments and colonies electing 225, and the Assembly seventy-five. Adopted by 423 to 261.

An order making the organization of the public powers a special order for to-day was adopted.

BERLIN, Feb. 23—Night—Minister Davis gave a dinner in honor of Washington's birth day. The first toast was Grant and the second the Kaiser.

The question about the Gastave between Germany and Spain is unsettled.

PARIS, February 23—Night—The Bonapartist organs express their disapprobation of Wallon's amendment in violent articles.

All the ministers except the justices of the interior voted for Wallon's amendment.

## RALEIGH.

THE PUBLIC DEBT BILL PASSED IN THE SENATE.

THE HOUSE CONSIDERING THE PROPOSED EXPULSION OF THORNE.

RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 23—Night—The Senate to-day passed on its third reading the bill adjusting the State debt. It provides for the funding of the debt as follows: For the old debt and registered certificates, 40 cents on the dollar; for funded internal improvement bonds, 25 cents on the dollar; (it does not include Construction and Special Tax bonds). The following interest to be paid: For the first two years, two per cent; for the next three years, three per cent; for the next five years, four per cent; for the next two years, five per cent. Notice is given that a supplemental bill will be introduced to fund the Special Tax bonds.

A resolution passed the Senate to-day to change the time of holding the State election, to prevent North Carolina from being the pioneer State.

The House is considering the question of expelling a white member, J. W. Thorne, from Warren county, via Vermont, because of non-belief in the existence of God.

## ELECTRICISMS.

The Pennsylvania Senate by a vote of 24 to 6, instruct their Senators and request their Representatives to favor the passage of the Texas Pacific Railroad bill.

A billiard match for two thousand dollars and the championship of the world, with three balls, played in New York, was won by Maurice Vegnank, Rudolph scoring five hundred and fifty-six.

The Missouri Legislature yesterday adopted concurrent resolutions deprecating Grant's course regarding Arkansas, and urging that she be let alone.
