THE SENATE BUSY ON COL. ORADO.

THE FORCE BILL UP IN THE HOUSE.

SPIRITED DEBATE IN REGARD TO IT.

PASSAGE AT ARMS BETWEEN ELDRIDGE AND SPYHER.

THE COLORADO AND NEW MEXICO BILLS PASSED THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Noon.—The Senate has up the bill for the admission of Colorado as a State.

In the House reports were made from the Committee on Elections giving the result from Louisiana to Sheridan as against Pinchback, and from Arkansas to Hodge as against Gause. An effort was made to get a consideration of the Louisiana report and of the Arkansas report and of the caucus force bill, but by a fusion between the democrats and the moderate republicans preference was given to the funding civil appropriation bill and the House went into committee upon it.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Night.—The House is in session to-night and the majority has succeeded in getting up Coburn's force bill.

House.—G. F. Hoar, of Massachusetts, rose to call up the report of the Special Committee on Louisiana Affairs. Coburn, of Indiana, raised the question of consideration and desired to have precedence given to the bill reported by him and known as the Caucus Force Bill. Poland, of Vermont, claimed that his report on Arkansas matters should have precedence. Ward, of Illinois, sustained Poland's views, and represented that the disturbed condition of Arkansas demanded prompt action by Congress. Hoar said that the resolutions reported by him yesterday contained recommendations concurred in by all the members of the Special Committee, and immediate action was desirable, in view of the fact that the Louisiana House of Representatives, which was called to remedy injustice, would adjourn in a few days. Poland suggested that all these Southern matters should be allowed to stand aside until after the passage of the sundry civil appropriation bills, and that then they be taken up in the order of their presentation to the House.

Smith, of New York, declared that the Constitutional Amendment reported by him for the election of the President and Vice-President, was the unfinished business before the House, and was a measure of the highest importance. Congor, of Michigan, intimated that Poland was the representative of the party of masterly inactivity, and that he might have had action on Arkansas affairs in Congress.

Poland defended himself from the imputation, and said he had only failed to press the earlier consideration of the public business, as represented by the Chairman of the Committee of Ways and Means, and Appropriations. As soon as the next appropriation bill was out of the way he proposed to proceed with it with all possible despatch.

Negley thought it was high time that the House should direct its own business instead of leaving it to the Committee on Ways and Means and Appropriations.

Ward, of Illinois, came to the defence of Poland and of the Committee on Ways and Means.

Coburn represented that the debate on his bill would cover all the questions raised in the reports of the Special Committee on the Southern States, and besides his bill contained something definite and tangible.

Finally, after a long colloquy, the question was put on the motion of Garfield, of Ohio, to go into Committee of the Whole on the sundry civil appropriation bill. The motion was agreed to—yeas 145; nays 101.

The democrats all voted for the motion and 161 Republicans against it.—The discussion on the civil bill branched off into frauds and intimidation, and the use of overvalued bacon for political purposes in Alabama, and there was quite a noisy altercation over it. After the Committee rose there was an exchange of compliments between Eldridge, of Wisconsin, and Spyher, of Louisiana, arising out of the report of Eldridge's speech a few nights ago. Spyher characterized what he complained of as cowardly and contemptible.

LOUISIANA, A BITTER DENIAL IN REGARD TO McENERY.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Noon.—In reply to a card published in the New Orleans papers, by certain prominent citizens, in relation to conservatives in Washington, stating that Governor McEnery had lost the confidence of the people of the State of Louisiana, the Conservative committee here desire to state that they have at no time, either directly or indirectly, individually or collectively, in any manner expressed any such opinion, but have refrained from treating in relation to the questions of 1872; and now declare that had any such opinions been expressed in their hearing, or within their knowledge, they should not have hesitated to promptly deny and correct the same as unfounded in truth.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 24.—Noon.—McEnery protests against the compromise of the '73 elections. Governor Kellogg and the Conservative caucus has dispatched stating that Messrs. Burks and Leonard, now in Washington in the interest of the Conservatives, have accepted Wheeler's proposition.

A majority present in the House have expressed themselves favorably, and Kellogg is anxious for some adjustment before Congress adjourns.

EUROPE. THE FRENCH ASSEMBLY PASS THE SENATE BILL.

THE ENGLISH VIRGINIUS CLAIM GLADSTONE REPLIES TO NEWMAN AND ARCHBISHOP MANNING.

PARIS, Feb. 24.—Noon.—The Assembly passed the Senate bill clause by clause. The election occurs one month before the dissolution of the Assembly and commences their functions upon the separation of the Assembly.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—Noon.—It is stated that the Earl of Derby has accepted from Spain five hundred pounds for each white and three hundred for each black man murdered in the Virginia affair.

Gladstone has published a pamphlet entitled "Vaticanism" in reply to Dr. Newman and Archbishop Manning. He maintains his original assertions; he eulogizes Newman whose secession is the greatest loss since Weale; acknowledges that the loyalty of the mass of the Catholics is unchanged; refutes Manning's assertion that the claims of the Roman Church are not changed by the Vatican decrees, and points to the declarations repudiating the doctrines of Papal infallibility and the temporal power by which the English and Irish Catholics obtained full civil liberty.

ELECTRICISMS. The Massachusetts House defeated the amendment to the Constitution giving the right of suffrage to women by 85 to 135.

Veguaux, yesterday, beat Rudolph 33 innings. Rudolph scored 326.

Mexican advices report the Sabanao volcano to be in violent eruption. An earthquake damaged a number of houses and churches at Gnadajajara, and extended to San Cristalbar, where several were killed. The religious excitement there is intense. A Protestant Bible reader has been assassinated. An outbreak is apprehended.

ALABAMA. EMPHATIC PROTEST FROM ALABAMA IN REGARD TO THE RADICAL LIES.

MONTGOMERY, Feb. 24.—Noon.—The democratic Senators and Representatives of the Alabama Legislature today, without exception, signed an emphatic protest against the memorial presented in the United States Senate yesterday, by Mr. Spencer. They declare the charges in the memorial to be false and unfounded, and appeal to the legislation of the General Assembly of Alabama as conclusive proof of the falsity of the charges reported to have been made by the Republican members there-of.
