FRUITLESS ATTEMPT TO GET

THE FORCE BILL UP AT LAST. NO DISCUSSION HAD ON IT YET.

Washington, Feb. 25—Noon—The House spent an all-night session in a fruitless attempt on the part of the Republicans to get up the cancus force bill. Although by the new rule dilatory motions are forbidden, a means was discovered and put in practice by the Democrats to account practice by the Democrats to circumvent that rule and make it entirely intile. The plan was for the Democrats to refrain from voting on the main proposition, and as the Republicans could not keep together a major-ity of the House from their own ranks the vote would reveal the absence of a quorum. Then the tedious process of a call of the House would be prooceded with, and when it was finished and the vote came to be taken again on the main proposition the Democrats would resort to the same tactics, refrain from voting and thereby again reveal the absence of a quorum, which would again necessitate a new call of the roll of members.
