HEADQUARTERS.

AN ALL NIGHT SESSION IN THE HOUSE.

FRUITLESS ATTEMPT TO GET UP THE FORCE BILL.

THE LOUISIANA RADICALS NOT SATISFIED.

THE FORCE BILL UP AT LAST.

NO DISCUSSION HAD ON IT YET.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25—Noon—The House spent an all-night session in a fruitless attempt on the part of the Republicans to get up the caucus force bill. Although by the new rule dilatory motions are forbidden, a means was discovered and put in practice by the Democrats to circumvent that rule and make it entirely futile. The plan was for the Democrats to refrain from voting on the main proposition, and as the Republicans could not keep together a majority of the House from their own ranks the vote would reveal the absence of a quorum. Then the tedious process of a call of the House would be proceeded with, and when it was finished and the vote came to be taken again on the main proposition the Democrats would resort to the same tactics, refrain from voting and thereby again reveal the absence of a quorum, which would again necessitate a new call of the roll of members. In this circuit the House has been going round and round from last evening till noon today.

The Senate has admitted Colorado, and at adjournment, was at work on New Mexico.

The House has been in continuous session, filibustering over the caucus force bill.

Dispatches from New Orleans threaten further complications, caused by jealousies among the Republicans.

There are technical defects in the tariff bill regarding the importation of *malva*, which will carry it back to the House.

Civil suits have been inaugurated against person who received money from Irvin, and a warrant has been issued for Irvin, on a charge of embezzlement.

Ex-Governor Parsons, whose name for the position of United States District Judge for Alabama, has been before the Senate all the winter, has been withdrawn by the President and the name of John Bruce has been sent in for the position. Mr. Bruce is said to be a citizen of Wisconsin and his nomination does not give satisfaction to Mr. Spencer.

The Louisiana Conservative caucus accepts Wheeler's compromise by a vote of thirty-four to thirty-five.

Dispatches from New Orleans report that Kellogg made a speech to his faction quieting them.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25—Night—HOUSE—It was not till 4 o'clock today that the caucus force bill was launched on the turbid and stormy waters of the House. The entire time between 8 o'clock last evening and 4 o'clock this afternoon had been consumed by the parliamentary maneuvers of the Democrats, notwithstanding the new rule against dilatory motions, and it was only when the Republicans got an absolute majority of the House in their own ranks that they were masters of the situation. It was then too late to go on with the discussion in the demoralized physical condition of the members, after a continuous session of 29 hours, and the Republicans themselves decided on an adjournment.

What new tactics the Democrats may have in reserve for to-morrow, remains to be seen, but at least they have it in their power to consume a large part of the day in having the journal of the last day's session read.

Chandler moved that the evening session be for the consideration of the steamboat bill. Objected to.

Mr. Edmunds said if the Senate saw fit to postpone the regular order, it would refer to him of all other responsibilities for the Civil Rights Bill.

The bill restoring certain soldiers of 1812 to the pension roll was lost by a vote of 29 to 34.

Morton's bill for counting the Presidential vote and contingent questions was taken up.

Several amendments were offered and adopted.

Bristow had a conference with the Senate Finance Committee, and stated that the conclusion reached was that the tariff and tax bill be reported substantially as it came from the House.

The Supreme Court to-morrow hears the argument of the United States vs. the Southern Insurance Company and the Southern Insurance and Trust Company. The question is whether the corporations, granted by States during the rebellion give corporate powers to said corporations.

ELECTRICISMS.

A bill repealing local option passed its first reading in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives by a vote of 128 to 62.

It is claimed that the assets of Harp, Conroy & Co., who failed yesterday at Pittsburgh, fully covered their liabilities.

Wheatley, Williams & Co's sugar refinery of New York has been suspended.

The Chicago Commission demand a more equitable distribution of the relief fund. All of the troops in the city have been placed in readiness.

EUROPE.

THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION.

PARIS, Feb. 25—Noon—An amendment to the Senate bill, that 75 Senators be chosen from a double list of nominations by MacMahon, was adopted.

Having disposed of the Senate, the assembly took up the organization of public powers, which passed its second reading.

The amendments moved by the Right and Bonapartists, were all rejected.

The clause implying the recognition of the Republic, which on January 13 had one majority, was finally adopted, by a vote of 433 to 262.

Rome, Feb. 25—Noon—It is reported that Corti, Italian Minister to Washington, is to be transferred to London.

THE LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

SENATE.

SIXTY-THIRD DAY.

FEBRUARY, 24th, 1875.

Mr. French, a bill to compromise that portion of the Special Tax bonds that have not been declared unconstitutional. Referred.

Mr. Armfield's bill requiring the registration of deeds (published by us yesterday morning) came up on its third reading.

Several amendments being adopted, changing the features of the bill, we republish the principal portion of it:

That deeds conveying real estate, and of agreements to convey the same, shall be valid against subsequent purchasers for a valuable consideration, and without notice, only from and after their registration in the county where said real estate is situated.

Provided that deeds made before the ratification of this act may be registered at any time within two years.

No part of this act except the proviso to the first section shall be in force until the first day of January, 1876, and said proviso shall be in force from and after its ratification.

The bill was discussed at some length by Messrs. Armfield, Kerr, Standford, Cantwell, Boddie, Bell, Mills and Parish, when the bill as amended passed its third reading.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

A memorial was read from the National Board of Trade of Chicago, asking the public enactment of a law requiring firms closing businesses in the State to register the names of members thereof with the Clerk of Superior Court. Referred.

By Mr. Tate, a bill to raise revenue; ordered to be printed.

By Mr. Pinix, a bill to the registration of various counties to make a report of all of the monies coming into their hands. Referred.

On motion of Mr. Foote, House bill to allow mortgage deposits in the Courts of this State, was taken up and put on its passage.

The following bills were tabled: House bill giving the right of redemption to debtors whose real estate has been sold under executions, mortgages and deeds of trust.

House bill to exempt corn, wheat and tobacco from taxation.

The special order being the bill in relation to the Western North Carolina Railroad, was taken up.

The bill provides for the appointment of a Commission to be composed of the Governor, Robert F. Armfield and Jas. Le Robinson, to purchase the Western North Carolina Railroad, at a sale to be made under a decree of the Circuit Court of the U. S., at Greensboro, and any claims against said road, which may be necessary to secure to the State of North Carolina a perfect title to said road. Also, that if the said road be purchased, the Governor shall appoint three Commissioners, who shall manage said road, and to build and complete the same to its terminus at Point Hook, and back to the original charter of the road. It also provides that for the payment of the road, the Commissioners shall issue bonds upon mortgage of the road, and the earnings of the road to be applied to the completion to the terminus stated; and should this sum not be sufficient the Public Treasurer is required to pay such deficit out of the general fund. It further provides for the use of convict labor on the work.

Mr. Tate advocated the bill and proceeded to explain the various machinery provisions in the bill to show the feasibility of the plan. He thought it was the only means to save the \$400,000 interest now held by the State, etc.

Mr. Walker, of Richmond, an amendment providing that the net earnings of the road shall first be applied to the payment of the coupons upon the bonds. Adopted.

Mr. Staples, an amendment providing that no sale or foreclosure under the mortgage shall be made until six months notice is given by advertisement in six newspapers of the State having the largest circulation. Adopted.

By the same, an amendment requiring the Commissioners appointed to give bond to the amount paid by the State for the road; afterwards modified by making the bond double the amount of the net earnings of the road. Adopted.

By the same, an amendment that after the organization the number of Commissioners shall be increased to four, one of whom shall be elected by private stockholders in such manner as the Commissioners shall prescribe. Adopted.

The bill passed its second reading almost unanimously.
