The oftener the bill filed by Messrs, RUSSELL and BAILEY in the names of their negro clients, DUNCAN HOLMES and DAVID GAY is read, the more forcibly is the reader struck with its audacity.

In order to appreciate it however, it must be remembered that the two negroes Duscan and David solemnly swore, and upon the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God we presume, that they knew the contents of the bill and that they were true of their own knowledge be on their information and belief" and these hey believed to be true. Yet Duncan and David both swear upon the Holy Evangelist of Almighty God that DAVID lives in the City of Wilmington and they swear this not upon "information and be lief" but of their own knowledge !

2. DAVID and DUNCAN swear upon the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God, that under the amended charter "every elector is required as a prerequisite to registration and suffrage, to have resided ninety days in the particular ward and in some particular lot or yard of said ward, said term of ninety days not to be counted up to the day of election but up to the time of registration."

In point of fact the amended charter expressly requires the residence to be ninety days next preceding the election, Duncan and David, however, solemnly swear upon the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God that the amended charter requires a residence of ninety days preceding the registration, and they swear it not upon information and belief, but of their own knowledge!

3. DAVID and DUNCAN further jointly and solemuly swear that the Constitution of North Carolina "guarantees the right of suffrage to every male citizen, otherwise qualified, regardless of race and color, who shall have resided thirty days in the county or municipality.

In point of fact the Constitution guarantees no such thing, nor does it even use the word "municipality" a single time in the Article defining the qualifications of an elector. And yet DAVID and DUNCAN solemnly swear that the Constitution guarantees to any man, otherwise qualified, who has lived in a municipality thirty days, the right of suffrage, and they swear it not upon "information and belief," but of their own knowledge!
