GRANT SIGNS THE CIVIL RIGHTS INFAMY.

Washington, D. C., March 1—Noon—House—The Force bill was passed shortly after mid-night on Saturday. It was so amended as to limit the President's right to suspend the writ of habeas corpus to Alabama, Mississippi, Louisians and Arkansas, and to expire at the end of two years. Yeas 135, nays 114.

Before the last vote was taken on the passage of the bill, Young, of Georgia, said he desired the country to know one fact, and that was that cut

to know one fact, and that was that cut of the 40 Democratic Representatives from the States to be effected by the Provisions of this bill, not one of them has been allowed a word in discussion upon its merits, but on the contrary the gentleman in charge of it has thought proper to deuy time to any of the representatives from the Southern States who intended to oppose the bill event a few minutes to

be allowed to reach the President. Concessions,

they say, are over.

The President has signed the Civil Rights Bill. SENATE-The Force bill was received from the House of Representatives and read a first time by title. Thurman, Bayard and others objected to its second reading and it remains on the Vice-Presidents table until to-morths.

row. Its second reading will throw it over another day. It will come up on the direct issue on Wednesday and the session closes Thursday at noon. The Democrats are all determined that the bill shall not reach the Pres-House-A motion to suspend the rules and adopt the resolutions reported by the Louisiana Committee was defeated by a vote of yeas, 154; nays 85, not two thirds in the affirmative.

A similar motion to bring the reso-

lutions to a vote directly and separ

ately was carried by a vote of ayes, 172; nays, 85. Stephens, of Georgia, being the only Democrat voting aye. # CENTENNIAL

-OF THE-

## German Fusilier Company, CMARLESTON S. C.

The German Fusiliers of Charleston, South Carolina, will celebrate their Centennial An-niversary on the third of May, 1875, with ceremontes appropriate to so interesting an occa

ion.

In 1775, one hundred years ago, and before the Beckaration of independence, the German ettisens of Charleston raided to the standard of American Liberty. They organized a corpe for the defence of the colonies in the great war for freedom and roudered signal service in the establishment of self-government. Their record in the Revolutionary struggle is a matter of history. Their sorvices during that memorable centest, under General Lincoln of the Continental army, and at the sieges of Savannah and Charleston and on other battle fields are proud testimonials of their patriotism and devotion. They sealed their devotion to that cause with the blood and lives of many of their numbers.

their numbers.

In 1812 the German Fusiliers were again called upon to assist in the defence of the coast, and in 1836, when the bleedy tomahawa of the Saminole drenched the plains of Florida with the blood of its people, and the cryfor succor was again waited to the shores of Carolica the German Fasiliers, animated by the succor was again waited to the shores of Carolina, the German Fasilers, animated by the spirit of 76, voluntsered their services and sided is redeeming their sister State from the ruthless hand of the swage.

The company has through all the vicinstitudes and trials of the past century preserved its organization, and is now believed to be the oldest military organization in the United States.

A-early as 1792 they attached to their mill

Accarly as 1752 they attached to their mill-tary feature, a society for the support of their indigent widows, or phane and destitute members. In this noble cause of charity, they have expended large sums from their own rivate resources; these have been shattered by the calamities of the war.

This will be, as is believed, the first military contennial celebration in these United States. The Fusiliers desire to crown this centennial, not only by giving interest and significance to the occasion, but also by placing upon a permanent basis, a fund for the relief of the widows and orphans of this decessed members; these objects would indeed be fit and grateful memorials of this historic occasion. They therefore appeal with confidence to their fellow citizans throughout the bread sayanse of this Union, whose liberies, now enjoyed they helped to achieve. Whatever donations may be given for these purposes will be gratefully acknowledged.
