HEADQUARTERS. PARDEE FOR DISTRICT JUDGE IN LOUISIANA.

THE PROCESS OF ORGANIZATION IN THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The friends of Judge Pardee have the best assurance that his name will go to the Senate to-day or to-morrow as District Judge of Louisiana.

The Senate resumed the consideration of the resolution for the admission of Pinchback, and Morton continued his argument.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Night—Senator Booth, from California, is here. In Republican caucus Terry, of Michigan, was chosen President pro tem of the Senate, and the caucus approved the revision of the Standing Committee as reported by the Sub-Committee of the Senate. Thursday will determine the question of Sargent-at-Arms as between French, the present incumbent, and Chas. Kennedy, of New York, who contested the place with French in 1869.

The Democrats have been accorded the Chairmanship of the Committee on Enrolled Bills, this making three. Some Committees have increased from seven to nine, upon each of which the Democrats have three members. Senator Wilson was absent. Ferry received 39 and Thurman received 25 votes for President pro tem.

The standing committees announced show the following changes in chairmen: Conkling, Commerce, vice Chandler; Hamlin, Postoffice and Postroads, vice Ramsay; Oglesby, Public Lands, vice Sprague; Ingalls, Pensions, vice Pratt; Hitchcock, Territories, vice Boreman; West, Rail Road, vice Stewart; Sargent, Mines and Mining, vice Hamlin; Boutwell, Revision of Laws, vice Conkling; Patterson, Education and Labor, vice Flanagan; Clayton, Civil Service and Retirement, vice Wright.

Two committees have been given to the Democrats. Thurman, Private Land claims, and Stevenson, Revolutionary Claims.

After announcement of the committees Pinchback was resumed and Morton continued his speech. At its conclusion Merrimon took the floor in opposition, but yielded, before concluding, to Executive session.

Nominations—Pardee, District Judge of Louisiana, a renomination; Albert S. Tower, Paymaster of the Army; Dedrick, Attorney Southern District of Mississippi; Webster, Postmaster at Orangeburg, S. C.; Glover, Postmaster at Macon, Ga.; Stewart, Postmaster at Macon, Miss.; Love, Postmaster at Trenton, Tenn.

Confirmations—Orth, Minister to Austria; Maquere, Minister to Constantinople; Evans, Marshal Eastern District Texas, vice Ochiltree.

The State Department has either dispatched that the Virginia's papers were signed for five hundred pounds to be allowed the family of each victim.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

THE STATE ELECTION.

REPUBLICAN VIEW OF THE PROSPECTS.

New York, March 9.—Night.—A special dispatch to the Times from Concord, N. H., says the campaign ended last night with great meetings in the larger cities of the State held by both parties. Both parties show by their canvass that the State is sure, and it is impossible to predict the result. There can be no doubt that both parties are in better condition than ever before. The prohibitionists are scarcely heard of, and the feeling is that they will very generally vote with the Republicans. About Congressmen there is little talk, the interest being centered in the gubernatorial contest. It is thought the first district will be carried easily by the Republicans, that the second will be saved by a small majority, and that the third will go to a Democrat. The excitement over the naturalization frauds is great. Yesterday two arrests were made.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

AN UNUSUALLY LARGE VOTE POLLED.

THE RADICALS CLAIM THE GOVERNOR AND TWO CONGRESSMEN.

Boston, March 9.—Night.—Dispatches from New Hampshire up to this hour indicate an unusually large vote by each party and a possible Republican victory, through the prohibition vote, which is very generally being cast for the Republican nominees. The Republicans already claim the Governor and the Second and Third Congressional Districts. The election of Frank Jones, Democratic Congressional candidate in the First District, is conceded by the Republicans.

THE CARLISTS IN FORCE IN SANTANDER.

THE NEW CARDINALS.

Berlin, March 9.—Night.—Arch-Bishop Ledochowski, whom the Prussian government expelled from the See of Posen, will be created Cardinal at the approaching consistory.

Hendaye, March 9.—Night.—The Carlists have entered the Province of Santander with a large force. The government has embargoed steamers for transporting and are sending reinforcements.

New York, March 9.—Night.—A cable dispatch from Rome to the New York Freeman's Journal announces that at the Proconsistory, to be held on Monday next, March 15th, Archbishop McCloskey, of New York; Mrs. Ledochowski, Archbishop of Posen and Gnesen, in Prussia; Deschamps, Archbishop of Mechlen and Primate of Belgium; Archbishop Manning, of West Minister, and Mgrs. of Bartolini and Giannelli, of the Roman Court, will be created Cardinals.

The City of Vicksburg, from St. Louis for Vicksburg, has sunk in nine feet of water.

The efforts which are being made by the members of the First and Second Divisions of the National Guard of New York State, to assist the Washington Light Infantry, of Charleston, S. C., in raising funds for the benefit of the families of their deceased comrades, is meeting with gratifying success.

At Zanesville, Ohio, the investigation of the \$20,000 defalcation between the ticket and freight agents of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company is progressing.

The Grand Trunk Railway buildings at St. Charles, Canada, have been burned; loss \$130,000.
