## CONVENTION.

### MOREHEADS CONVENTION

#### BILL PASSED THE SENATE.

[SPECIAL TO JOURNAL.]

Raleigh, March 12. The Convention bill passed its second reading in the Senate this morning by a vote of 35 to 14, to wit: Affirmative—Messrs. Shaw, Latham, Jernigan, Selby, Stickey, Boddie, Bell, Smith, Stanford, Sugg, Cantwell, Kerr, French, Pogram, Waddell, Busbee, Parrish, Williamson, Irvin, Morehead, McCauley, Anderson, Graham, Waring, Clement, Hargrave, Armfield, Linsey, McMillan, Mills, Young, McElroy, Love, Taylor and Jenkins. Negative—Messrs. Peebles, Bryant, Mabson, Tucker, Cashwell, Paschall, Bneed, Albright, Holton, Worthy, LeGrand, N. S. Cooke, Marler and Walker. Mr. Cantwell, Radical, voting aye, and Messrs. Albright, LeGrand, Marler and Walker, Democrats, voting no. Mr. Cooke, of Franklin, was absent. The bill then passed its third reading by a vote of thirty-seven to twelve, to wit: Affirmative—Messrs. Shaw, Latham, Jernigan, Selby, Cantwell, Stickey, French, Pogram, Waddell, Busbee, Parrish, Williamson, Irvin, Morehead, McCauley, LeGrand, Worthy, Anderson, Graham, Waring, Clement, Hargrave, Armfield, Linsey, McMillan, Mills, Young, McElroy, Love, Taylor and Jenkins. Negative—Messrs. Peebles, Bryant, Mabson, Tucker, Cashwell, Paschall, Bneed, Albright, Holton, N. S. Cooke, Marler and Walker.

On this reading Messrs. LeGrand and Worthy changed from the negative to the affirmative. When Senator Williamson, of Caswell, hitherto one of the strongest opponents of the bill, gave his reasons for voting in the affirmative in a very feeling and eloquent manner the applause drowned the President's gavel. General good feeling prevailed. The bill will be engrossed and sent to the House on Monday next. E.

## HEADQUARTERS.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The Freedmen's Bank in a worse condition than heretofore supposed, and therefore Commissioners Creswell, Leopold and Purvis have asked to be relieved.

## A VOTE ON PINCHBACK NEXT TUESDAY.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Noon.—In the Senate a consideration of the resolution for the admission of Pinchback was resumed, and McCready, of Kentucky, spoke in opposition thereto. The Freedmen's Bank is in a worse condition than heretofore supposed, and therefore Commissioners Creswell, Leopold and Purvis have asked to be relieved from any further responsibility for or on account of said trust; provided their bond may be relieved from liability after their relief and the new Commissioners substituted in their places. They assign as an excuse for their action, a failure to obtain from Congress such legislation as they deemed essential to the proper and speedy execution of the trust reposed in them.

### CIVIL RIGHTS IN MONTGOMERY.

#### NEGROES REFUSED ADMISSION TO A THEATRE.

MONTGOMERY, March 12.—Noon.—Several negroes applied at the ticket office of the theatre last night to purchase tickets of admission to the parquette, to witness Cal Wagner's minstrel performance, and were refused. Afterwards Deputy United States Marshal Randolph arrested Cal Wagner upon complaint of four negroes, for a violation of the Civil Rights bill, and a bond of five hundred dollars was given for Mr. Wagner's appearance before Commissioner Dimmick this morning at 10 o'clock. The negroes who made the application are notorious fugitives, and two of them were defeated by their own color for county offices at the late election.

MONTGOMERY, March 12.—Night.—The complaint of the four negroes against Cal Wagner, for not admitting them to his minstrel establishment, was heard before U. S. Commissioner Dimmick. The defendant counsel moved to quash the complaint for imperfection in the complaint in various particulars, and on the ground of the unconstitutionality of the Civil Rights bill. The counsel for the defence cited the Slaughter House case and Mrs. Myra Radwell's case, while U. S. District Attorney McAfee, for the complainant, cited the case of Luke W. Borden, and contended that this was a political question. At 4 P. M. the Commissioner quashed the complaint, but gave no opinion in the matter.
