CIVIL BIGHTS IN MONTGOMERY NEGROES REFUSED ADMIT-TANCE TO A PHEATRE.

THE NEGROES SUE AND THE HEINSBERGER'S COMM SSIONER QUASHES THE COMPLAINT.

MONTGOMERY, March 12-Noon-Several negroes applied at the ticket office of the theatre last night to pur-chase tickets of admission to the par-quette, to witness Cal Wagner's Minstral performance, and were refused.
Afterwards Deputy United States Marshal Randolph arrested Cal Wagner upon complaint of four negroes, for a violation of tha Civil Rights bill, and a bond of five hundred dollars was signed for Mr. Wagner's appearance before Commissioner Dimmick this morning at 10 o'clock. The negroes who made the application are notorious profligates, and two of them were defeated by their own color for county offices at the last election.

Monroomery, March 12—Night— The complaint of the four negroes against Cal. Wagner, for not admit-ting them to his minstrel establish-ment, was heard before U. S. Commissioner Dimmick. The defendant counsoner Dimmick. The defendant counsel moved to quash the complaint for imperfection in the complaint in various particulars, and on the ground of the unconstitutionality of the Civil Right bill. The counsel for the defence cited the Slaughter House case and Mrs. Myra Radwell's case, while U. S.
