STATE NEWS.

The Washington Echo says: A re vival is now progressing in the M. E. Church at this place, under the able and efficient ministration of the Rev. A. R. Raven. Alread two persons have been happily converted, and several others are still at the altar, seeking the pardon of their sins.

The Rocky Mount Mail says: There were shipped from Rocky Mount during the six months, from September 1st, 1874 to March 1st, 1875, six thousand one hundred and nine bales of cotton, against even six thousand bales shipped during the twelve months ending September 1st.
