ENDORING GRANT IN
LOUISIANA.

A TOUGH FIGHT AND A PRO-
LONGED SESSION
PROBABLE.

CHRISTIANCY AND ROBERTS
ABANDON THE RADICAL
CAUCUS.

BEAST BUTLER ON CIVIL
RIGHTS.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Noon.—In
the Senate, immediately after the reading
of the journal, the Senate, by a vote of 28 to 25, took up the resolution
of Mr. Frelinghuysen, approving the
action of President Grant taken in
Louisiana, and offered the following
substitute agreed upon in the caucus:

Resolved, That the action of the
President, in protecting the govern-
ment of Louisiana, of which Wm. P.
Kilgore is Executive, and the people
of the State, against domestic violence,
and enforcing the laws of the United
States is approved.

A motion to go into Executive ses-
sion was defeated.

A motion to postpone until Decem-
ber was defeated.

A prolongation of the session is
probable.

Christiancy and Roberts have aban-
doned the caucus.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Night.—
The Democratic Senators, in caucus
this evening, resolved not to consent
to having any time fixed for a vote on
the resolution approving of President
Grant's action in recognizing the Kel-
logg government, though they also
agreed not to offer any factious oppo-
sition, but to insist upon debating
it to the extent they might deem pro-
per. The Senate is still in session.—
Kernan, of New York, is speaking.
No speech was made by any Republi-
can.

A letter from Butler says: The Civil
Rights bill gives the negroes no rights
in drinking saloons or barber shops.
The bill only asserts the rights con-
ferred by common law, and simply gives
the colored man easier means of secur-
ing them.

EUROPE.

DEFECTION AMONG THE CAR-
LISTS.

DEATH OF JOHN MITCHELL.

THE OXFORD CREW VICTO-
RIOUS.

BERLIN, March 20.—Noon.—The
frigate Ariadne has been ordered to
Sivato to support the demand for an
indemnity for plundering the bark
Funst Bismarck.

MADRID, March 20.—Noon.—Catre-
ras' convention with the Alfonsists
produced a deep impression on the
Carlists.

Several officers who were suspected
with favoring Alfonso have been ar-
rested at Estella.

PARIS, March 20.—Noon.—The coal-
ition in the Assembly, which support
constitutional laws, have a majority of
eleven in the permanent committee
appointed to sit during recess.

VIENNA, March 20.—Night.—Don
Alfonso, brother of Don Carlos, is re-
siding privately here.

VIENNA, March 20.—Noon.—The
Lower House of Reichsrath approved
the grant of \$25,000 for 1875 and \$50,-
000 for 1876 to defray the expenses of
the representation of Austria to the
Centennial.

LONDON, March 20.—Noon.—The
Annual International University Boat
Race took place over the usual course
on the Thames this afternoon. It re-
sulted in an easy victory for the Ox-
ford crew. The weather was favorable
for the boat race, though rather cold.
Betting during the morning was three
to one on the Oxford crew. The banks
of the Thames were lined with a mass
of people all the morning. The differ-
ent avenues leading to the river were
choked with vehicles and pedestri-
ans, and at noon London presented a
deserted appearance.

The Prince of Wales goes to India
the next cold season.

John Mitchell died quietly at 8
o'clock this morning at Dromalona,
Ireland.

CALIFORNIA.

EXECUTION OF DE VASQUEZ.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 20.—Noon.—
The bandit De Vasquez was executed
at San Jose yesterday. No attempt at
rescue was made, although it was fea-
red there would be. He asserted his
innocence of the crime of murder, but
acknowledged the justice of his fate,
having been leader of a murderous
gang.

THE ORIENT.

ATTACK ON THE INDIAN GOV-
ERNMENT EXPEDITION.

CALCUTTA, March 20.—Noon.—When
the Indian Government expedition to
survey Western India arrived at Ran-
goun, an attack was made upon it by
the Chinese frontier officials and 20
Chinamen were killed and many
wounded.

Communication with China, on the
frontier, is stopped by large bands of
armed men.

The King of Burmah is sending
4,000 troops to the Assam frontier.

ELECTRICISMS.

At the adjourned election for Mayor,
yesterday, at Bangor, Me., F. M.
Houghton, Democrat, was elected by
59 majority. The Republicans have
4 majority in joint Council.

Gen. Carbo, now Segundo Gaho,
and seven hundred soldiers arrived at
Havana yesterday from Spain.

A dispatch from Columbus, O., says
it now appears that the trouble with
miners was at the Troy Coal Com-
pany's works, and not at those of the
Straitsville Mining Company. All the
colored miners have left the Straitville
works except two, who are too badly
wounded to leave. The Straitville
Company have yielded to the demands
of the miners, and the men resumed
work.

At the annual Convention of the
General Ticket and Passenger Agents'
Association, held at Cincinnati, rep-
resentatives of all important roads ex-
cept the Baltimore and Ohio were
present. The following officers were
elected: President, D. M. Boyd, Jr.,
of the Pennsylvania Railroad; Vice
President, C. P. Atmore, of the Louis-
ville and Nashville Railroad; Secre-
tary, Samuel Powell, of the Chicago,
Burlington and Quincy Railroad.

Mr. Mitchell, Capt. Robbin's clerk
on the boat Seminole, has been held
to bail in New Orleans to answer for
a violation of the civil rights.

The Equitable Life Insurance Com-
pany of Elizabeth, N. J., has failed.

TAX NOTICE.

WILMINGTON TOWNSHIP

The Board of Trustees and Tax-Listers for the
Township and City of Wilmington will proceed,
on the first day of April, 1875, and for twenty
days thereafter, at the City Hall, in the City
of Wilmington, between the hours of 9 A. M.
and 3 P. M., and every Friday evening during
the month of April between the hours of 6 P.
M. and 9 P. M., on said days, to list the tax-
able Lands and Property, and make the assess-
ments required by law.

All persons and corporations within this
Township and City are required by law to give
in their taxables, and attend at the above time
and place for the purpose specified, within
twenty days, under the penalty of double tax,
Extract from Act to Raise Revenue:

"All persons who are liable for a Poll Tax,
and shall willfully fail to give themselves in
and all persons who own Property and fail to
list within the time allowed, shall be deemed
guilty of a Misdemeanor, and on conviction
thereof, shall be fined, not more than Fifty
Dollars, or imprisoned not more than Thirty
Days."
