HEADQUARTERS.

PARDON REJECTED AND THE SENATE ADJOURNED.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Noon.—The Senate went into Executive session immediately after the journal of yesterday's proceedings was read. WASHINGTON, March 24.—Night.—The Senate was in executive session all day, most of the time being spent in discussing the nomination of D. A. Pardee to be United States Judge of Louisiana, vice Darrell resigned. The nomination was finally laid on the table. A committee was then appointed to wait upon the President and inform him that the Senate was ready to adjourn unless he had some further communication to make. The President replied he had not. The usual resolutions of thanks to the Vice President and President pro tem. of the Senate was agreed to, and the Senate at 5:45 adjourned sine die.

EUROPE.

THE PEACE PRESERVATION ACT.

MITCHELL'S FUNERAL.

LONDON, March 24.—Noon.—The bill for the amendment of the Peace Preservation Act passed by a vote of 264 to 202. The Home Rulers supported the bill. Disraeli appealed to the Irish members not to agitate the country by an opposition that in the end must be futile. Notice was given of a motion to give the Carlisle bill a second reading. Ten thousand persons attended Mitchell's funeral at Newry.

PARIS, March 24.—Noon.—The conspiracy for the assassination of Gen. Cabrera, who recently abandoned the Carlist cause, has been frustrated.

THE FLOODS.

PREPARING FOR THE RUSH OF WATER.

PORT JERVIS, March 24.—Noon.—There is great alarm among the people in this vicinity. Persons living on the banks of the Delaware are moving to higher grounds.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Noon.—There has been a light snow here and generally North.

The apprehensions from the floods and gorges are general. The late severe weather having passed, the ice and snow in many localities is melting, which indicates a general flood. Twenty thousand people who subsist from the lumber trade will probably lose everything.

ELECTRICISMS.

Wm. Fryor & Sons, of Halifax, have failed. At Lowell, Mass., Mrs. Low left her house for a place as servant in a boarding house. Low fired two shots at her and then killed himself. She cannot live.

The citizens of Augusta have contributed \$6,000 to the sufferers from the tornado which has desolated several counties of the State from the Chattoohocchie to the Savannah river. Brown was hung at Pottsville, Pa., yesterday. The fall was five feet, but failed to break his neck, and he died from strangulation. The confortions were awful. The tops of houses, trees and the summit of the mountain were crowded.

The Tennessee river has fallen sufficiently to allow trains to pass. The first train went through yesterday. Heath has resigned the Presidency of the Pacific Mail Company.

ALABAMA.

A PRESS GANG ON A RAID.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 24.—Night.—A party of Indiana editors, forty-odd in number, reached here this morning from New Orleans. They will leave at 4 p. m. for Enfield, where they will take the boat down the Chattoohocchie and go to Tallahassee, and from there to Jacksonville. On their return they will go through Savannah, Atlanta and Chattanooga.
