HEADQUARTERS.

TROOPS ORDERED TO THE RIO GRANDE.

THE YELLOW FEVER REPORTED EPIDEMIC AT HAVANA.

THE FEVER AT KEY WEST.

WASHINGTON, March 31—Noon—The Secretary of War to-day telegraphed to the Commanding Officer of the Department of Texas to distribute troops along the Rio Grande to prevent further outbreaks by the Mexicans.

On dit: William Overy succeeds Douglas as Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

The following was received at the Navy Department from Capt. G. M. Ransom, commanding U. S. Steamer Colorado, dated Havana, 30th: "The yellow fever is reported epidemic all at here will sail for Key West to-morrow."

WASHINGTON, March 31—Noon—A telegram was received at the War Department to-day from the commander of the troops at Key West, Fla., announcing that two cases of yellow fever existed in that place, and that the troops had been moved to another locality beyond the reach of the disease.

GOTHAM.

HOW DANIEL DREW CALLED, STRADDLED AND PUT THE STOCK MARKET.

New York, March 31—Noon—The Times' financial says that the cause of the violent fluctuations in stock yesterday was attributable to Daniel Drew's wild operations in "calls," "straddles" and "puts." Drew, it appears, failed to put in an appearance when the decline in gold made his customers anxious. The legion of enquirers at Drew's usual places of resort were blandly told that Drew was sick. Drew's absence from the street caused a decline in gold and an advance in exchange was asked. The effect on the street when the fact became known was to depress prices and generally un-able values, but as soon as it was understood that any permanent default on his part would place a number of speculators' operations on his "calls" short of stocks, the feeling changed and prices began to advance. Just as the stock exchange was closed for the day, the effect in the gold room was even more decided than in the stock exchange and the price declined from 110 1/2 to 114, and millions of long gold were sold out on this decline in gold. There was a sharp advance in the foreign exchange. The operations in the Gold Room Monday and yesterday are generally interpreted as meaning disruption.

Daniel Drew is in Wall street to-day settling all contracts which came due yesterday.

PENNSYLVANIA.

THE MINER'S RIOT.

DEMONSTRATION MADE IN FULL.

ONE MAN KILLED AND FURTHER TROUBLES THREATENED.

READING, March 31—Noon—The Sheriff has seized the Wilmington & Reading Railroad, and the sale will take place April 22d. The Eagle says the coalition of the two Unions is hailed with joy by the miners and suspended railroad employees; judicial meetings are being held in Schuylkill county, and Presidents Siney and Rhodes will issue proclamations.

Later—A dispatch from the Upper Lehigh announces the killing of Mc Dermitt, one of the bosses there. Last night coffin hand bills were served on men obtaining coal for the boilers at Eckley colliery. The whole region is in a state of great excitement and the feeling is general that property and lives are at the mercy of these ruffian men. This is the third day that demonstrations have been made. Sheriff Kirkendall has declined to appear unless an actual riot takes place and then he proposes to come from Wilkesbarre, 24 miles away, to quiet the riot. The Deputy Sheriff now here declines to act without instructions. The ruffians are called the Landburn Regiment, from the fact that Landburn has been selling condemned government munitions.

PHILADELPHIA, March 31—Night—The Sheriff is getting the better of the miners, who generally obey his summons, and come in after concealing their arms. All who have arms on their persons are arrested.

HAZLETON, March 31—Night—Another crowd of armed men have started from Ebervale for the upper Lehigh, to stop the men employed by the Jersey Central Railroad, from loading coal at that place. A special train has left here with a detachment of police armed and equipped, to resist any attempt at violence by the mob. The result of this raiding is awaited with great anxiety. Our local police force is too small to contend with the exasperated miners, and a call for the military is expected.

ELECTRICISMS.

Shields' woolen mills, at Davenport, Ia., were burned yesterday. Loss \$20,000.

The Masonic and Odd Fellows' hall, with adjacent buildings, at Fairburg,

Ills., have been burned. Loss \$30,000. The trial of the Guikwar of Barbados, at Calcutta, on the charge of attempting to bribe servants of the resident to poison Colonel Player, the resident, has resulted in the disagreement of the Commission before which the case was tried.

News from the floods shows that the water is rising, but the ice is very rotten.

EUROPE.

SERIOUS DISSENSIONS AMONG THE CARLISTS.

THE RELIGIOUS TROUBLES IN GERMANY.

ANOTHER HEAVY FAILURE IN LONDON.

LONDON, March 31—Noon—Spanish advisers state that notwithstanding the denials of the truth of the reports of dissensions among the Carlists, it is known beyond question that there are serious differences between Don Carlos and the Carlists in the council of the Province of Navarra.

BERLIN, March 31—Night—Dr. Henry Foester, Bishop of Brison, has been summoned to resign his Bishopric because he promulgated the papal interdict against the ecclesiastical laws.

The conference of the Roman Catholic Bishops at Fulda is held with closed doors. The object of the meeting is to discuss and issue a pastoral letter concerning the bill before the Prussian Diet, withdrawing state grants from the church.

PARIS, March 31—Noon—France has agreed to the Berno Postal Convention.

LONDON, March 31—Night—Wm. Thomas Henley, telegraph engineer and contractor, has failed. His liabilities are over \$2,500,000.

TEXAS.

THE MEXICAN BANDITS ON THE RIO GRANDE.

TROOPS ORDERED TO THE FRONTIER.

WASHINGTON, March 31—Night—The following telegram was received here to-day from the Governor of Texas:

AUSTIN, March 30th, 1875. To His Excellency U. S. Grant, President of the United States.

Sir:—The depredations of organized bands of robbers from the Republic of Mexico have, of late, increased in frequency and atrocity to an extent which threatens the depopulation of the lower Rio Grande country. The alarm in the country between the Nueces and the Rio Grande consequent upon those raids, in which our people are ruthlessly murdered and their property forcibly taken by these foreign desperadoes, is widespread, and unless relieved by some assurances of protection, must result in a general breakup of the settlements. On the 29th of this month a large party of these robbers penetrated the interior as far as within eighteen miles of Corpus Christi, robbing stores and ranches, and murdering and capturing citizens, and capturing and destroying the United States mails. I appeal to Your Excellency for protection for the people of that country against those invasions of outlaws from Mexico, since they have been of almost weekly occurrence for several months past, and are increasing in force and boldness. The citizens of that country have been compelled, for the most part, to move to the towns for protection, and no security exists outside of these corporations for life or property, and these in the towns even hold themselves in constant readiness for defence. I trust that Your Excellency will deem it proper to give security to the people on the Rio Grande border, in view of the assurance I now give you that an extreme necessity exists for it.
