THE FLOODS.

BREAKING UP OF THE ICE GORGES.

QUIETLY PASSING OUT TO SEA.

WILMINGTON, April 1.—Noon.—The ice above this place has broken up, and is now passing down the river quietly on an eleven foot flood. A considerable quantity of logs, estimated at one hundred thousand feet per hour, have been going down since six o'clock this morning. They are supposed to have come out of Pine creek.

All the anticipated danger at this place is now over. The gorge which formed last evening three miles below Lewisburg still remains there, and some parts of the town are under water. Families living in the low parts of the town have moved out, but if the gorge does not break up by the time the Green river gorge, which passed Lookhaven early this morning, reaches there, it is feared that great destruction will ensue. The longer the gorge remains there the more excited they become, and the more danger of devastation.

Reports from Lookhaven say that the Green Union gorge passed there at five o'clock this morning and no danger is now anticipated.

EUROPE.

THE CARLISTS HOISTING THE WHITE FLAG.

AN ENGLISH MAN'S VIEW OF AMERICA.

INVESTITURE OF CARDINAL MANNING.

LONDON, April 1.—Noon.—The reported Budget will show two and a half million pounds decrease in the revenue.

MADRID, April 1.—Noon.—The Carlists have hoisted flags of truce at Urtuvia and Oyarzun and are fraternizing with government troops. Gen. Cabrera has written to Don Carlos, declaring that the decree issued by the latter depriving him of his honors would be the best justification of his causes he could have, if he needed any.

One hundred Carlists have been captured at Matreusa.

LONDON, April 1.—Noon.—Mr. Childers, speaking at Pontretract last night, gave an account of his last American tour. He spoke in terms of high eulogy of America. The United States, he thought, was probably the most prosperous country in the world; it would contain 150,000,000 inhabitants, while the progress of England was necessarily limited. He forcibly presented reasons why England should seek the friendship and alliance of the United States.

ROME, April 1.—Noon.—The ceremony conferring the title of Cardinal on Archbishop Manning, took place yesterday at the Church of St. Gregory. The ceremony was imposing and witnessed by one thousand English and American Catholics.

LONDON, April 1.—Night.—A special dispatch to the Post from Berlin says a financial crisis is feared there. The settlements on the Bourse are effected with great difficulty. There have been twenty eight failures, and two persons have committed suicide in consequence of financial reverses.

The steamer Victoria, from New York for Glasgow, is ashore at Garvel Point.

PARIS, April 1.—Night.—Advises from Spain state that a force of Carlists have entered the Province of Santander and will be followed by Don Carlos and the bulk of his army. It is supposed that they are trying to penetrate to Castile.

PENNSYLVANIA.

THE LEHIGH RIOTERS.

INTENSE EXCITEMENT AT UPPER LEHIGH.

THE RAIDERS ON THE WAR PATH.

WHERE IS SHERIDAN?

HAZELTON, April 1.—Night.—The excitement at Upper Lehigh yesterday during the raid of the miners was intense, and during their stay there was a perfect reign of terror. It seems that they divided their force before entering the town, some coming at the East end and others at the West, thus cutting off the retreat of citizens.—Shots were fired indiscriminately and without any order, many of the crowd being intoxicated. At the hotel a violent demonstration was made. The rioters went through the house, endeavoring to force the landlord and boarders to join their ranks. Some of the inmates took refuge in the cellar, while others escaped through the back door. The Company's store was also attacked; the superior agent and clerks escaped, but the rioters fired shots into the building. Persons riding along the highway were stopped and fired at when they refused to join.

The mob expected from Schuylkill county did not reach Anneroid. Riots are reported at Ashland with the loss of several lives. All quiet here.

At Potsville, the railroad trouble is still threatened. The Reading Road officials have withdrawn their special police to protect themselves. The safety of property must be secured from the military.

ELECTRICISMS.

At a meeting of the Irish Societies at New York it was determined that the Mitchell parade should take place on April the 11th.

Judge Waite has enjoined the removal of the Capital of West Virginia to Wheeling until the Courts have an opportunity to pass upon the law.

At Providence, R. I., a meeting of the Republicans opposed to the action of the late Republican Convention, nominated Richard A. Hagar for Governor. It is supposed that the Prohibitionists will adopt the candidates of the meeting.

Senator Alcorn has abandoned the Missouri election.

The Jury in the Can Case against the Varieties Theatre, at Philadelphia, has decided that it is not a nuisance.

The difference between the Great Western and Grand Railroads has been adjusted.

Panama advises indistinctly a revolution over the Presidential election.

The Northern Central Railroad has issued a thousand \$1,000 bonds, the proceeds to be applied to the increase of terminal facilities at Baltimore.

Four stores were destroyed by fire in Atlanta, Ga., yesterday morning. Loss \$53,000, \$32,000 of which was covered by insurance.

DEBT STATEMENT.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Night.—The debt statement shows a decrease of over \$4,500,000 in the treasury; coin \$84,000,000; currency \$5,000,000.

Postage stamps sold during the present quarter exceed those of the quarter ending December, over \$26,000.

The argument in the Grant Parish case was concluded by Reverend Johnson and Attorney-General Williams.

The Treasury disbursements for all purposes, exclusive of the payments of March, were \$12,290,693.

CITY OF WILMINGTON, N. C., April 1st, 1875.

THE ATTENTION OF THE CITIZENS of this county is respectfully called to the fact that the sickly season approaches with the warm weather, which is now near at hand, and that it becomes my duty to adopt the most stringent sanitary measures at this time in order to preserve the health of the city. To prevent, as far as possible, the spread of all diseases incident to the warm season, which

decayed meat, fish, garbage, trash and all refuse matter sent to generate, I would most earnestly ask the hearty co-operation of the citizens generally in placing our city in such a cleanly condition as to render it impracticable to those diseases which have birth in filth and an unwholesome atmosphere, and to a lack of prompt attention at the proper season. To this end the entire force of the city will be employed in

CLEANING, DRAINING, DISINFECTING, REMOVING TRASH, &c. &c.

for at least the next twenty days. All persons are earnestly requested to have their trash and refuse matter upon their premises placed upon the streets, where practicable in barrels or boxes, which will be removed immediately.

DISINFECTANTS will be furnished free of charge at my Office to any person calling for same.

THE HEALTH OFFICERS TO BE DESIGNATED BY A YELLOW BOARDS, may be notified of any stagnant water standing anywhere in the city, or anything which would tend to impair the health of the City. Any complaint lodged at my Office will have prompt attention. Hoping that proper sanitary measures, adopted now may secure to us a healthy city during the summer, I earnestly solicit the aid and prompt co-operation of all good citizens to attain this greatly to be desired end.

A BILL TO ASCERTAIN THE INTERESTS OF THE DIFFERENT COUNTIES, CITIES AND TOWNS OF THIS STATE, AND TO PRESCRIBE A STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SECTION 1. That all claims against the several counties, cities and towns of this State, whether by bond or otherwise, shall be presented to the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners or to the chief officer of said cities and towns, as the case may be, within two years after the date of maturity of such claims or the date of such claim or claims shall be forever barred from a recovery thereof.

Freighted, that claims which have already matured and become due, shall be presented on or before the first day of January, A. D. 1877, or the holders thereof shall be forever barred of a recovery thereof.

SECTION 2. That it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of the several counties and towns, to cause to be published in the "Daily News" or the "Charlotte Observer," published in the city of Charlotte, the "Greensboro Patriot" published in the city of Greensboro, the "Shelby Citizen" published in the town of Asheville, the "North Carolina Gazette," published in Fayetteville.

This section 2. shall not apply to any county whose debts are already audited and certified.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect from and after its ratification.

In General Assembly read three times and ratified the 23d day of March, A. D. 1875.
