CONNECTICUT.

THE RADICAL PROGAMME IN THE NUTMEG STATE.

New Haven, Conn., April 2—Night

-Hon. James G. Blaine addressed a
Bepublican meeting here this evening He discussed the Southern question at great length, maintaining that so long as opposition to reconstruction on the basis of free suffrage and the Constitutional Amendments, formed the principal Democratic issue in the South, the Republicans would be combelled to make the support of these measures the principal issue in the North. He commented with some severity on the course pursued by the D mocrats in Congress, on the Louis-ians question, and said they had arrayed themselves solidly against any adjustment whatever, every member of the party except Stephens, of Ga., voting against permitting the question of adjustment and compromise to be even introduced and considered by the House. He said the evident aim of the Democrats was to restore their old mode of ruling the country, viz: With the South, and detach enough of the North to constitute a majority; with a consolidated South they only needed forty-seven electorial votes in the North, and

ed for in the war. He did not have with in additional coercive legislation by Congress, nor would be interfere in the good of any State except as a last resort for the public safety, but he ap-pealed to the voters of Connecticut and to loyal voters everywhere to keep the political power of the Umon in t e hands of the no wavering and andoubted friends of the Union; toose who had fought for it and served it when the ends of the war had been fully attained; when free suffrage was everywhere co ced d, and when free speech was nowhere denied; when Wendell, Phillips and Gen. Logan can speak as freely in Georgia as Lamar and Gerdon can speak in New Hampshire, the n cessity for further appeal to the loyalty of the North will not have ended uatil then; while he would cultivate and encourage the kindhest feeling between the North and South, he would urge the North to hold the political power as the guaranty of safe ty and prosperity of both sections.
