HEADQUARTERS.

THE COURT OF CLAIMS DECIDES WHAT "PARDON AND AMNESTY" MEANS.

WASHINGTON, April 8—Night—The Court of Claims has just decided that full pardon and amnesty to those concerned in the late war. While it blots out or throws into oblivion all personal offenses, it does not restore the proceeds placed in the Treasury from confiscated property sold. The word pardon in that case, the Court says, is construed according to its meaning, as found in the English statute law, at the time of the formation of the Constitution. The King had no power to restore estates except those in which he might be personally interested, besides the proceeds of the confiscated property being received in the Treasury it could not be drawn therefrom except by virtue of a law passed in conformity with the Constitution.

A dispatch reached Pensacola when the disappointed Mexican excursionists departed for home via Jacksonville.

PENNSYLVANIA.

TROOPS EN-ROUTE FOR HAZELTON.

PHILADELPHIA, April 7—Night—The 6th regiment of the National Guards has been ordered to Hazelton, Gen. O'borne at Hazelton asks for these troops immediately.

The first regiment, numbering 350 men, with twenty rounds of ammunition and three days cooked rations, has left on a special train and will reach Hazelton at 9 o'clock to-night. The cause of the movement has not transpired.

SCRANTON, Pa., April 7—Night—The meeting to-morrow will decide whether the miners of the Wyoming Lackawanna region will strike. The companies refuse the 10 per cent advance demanded. The men are anxious to commence work.

HAZELTON, April 7—Night—Two regiments of infantry and one artillery company are expected to-night.

GOTHAM.

DISCREPANCY IN THE BOOKS OF THE PACIFIC M. S. CO.

THE DANA LIBEL CASE.

New York, April 7—Night—The books of the Pacific Mail Steamship Co., when Dillon assumed administration of its affairs, showed over \$250,000 charge of the China agency. The China agency replies by telegraph that they have advanced \$100,000, making the difference nearly \$150,000. The China agents have been ordered to New York. It is hoped that there is some mistake.

The Dana libel case is up, but adjourned till to-morrow.

ELECTION RETURNS.

HARTFORD, April 7—Night—Ingersoll's plurality is 9,482—majority 6,083. Starkweather's majority 372. The Republicans have gained two State Senators.

At Schoensted the Democratic Mayor was elected by 400 majority. At Leavenworth, Kansas, the Republican ticket was elected with one or two exceptions.

At Topeka, Kansas, the Republicans were successful. At Ithica, N. Y., the Democrats gain three Supervisors.

At Omaha the Republicans elected the Mayor and the Democrats elected the Police Judge.

EUROPE.

LAUNCH OF A NEW BRITISH MAN OF WAR.

TROUBLE BREWING BETWEEN PRUSSIA AND BELGIUM.

STATE GRANTS TO THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH TO BE WITHDRAWN.

ANOTHER PRINCESS PUT IN AN APPEARANCE.

MEETING OF THE EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA AND KING OF ITALY.

LONDON, April 7—Noon—The new British man of war, Alexandria, was launched to-day. The Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Teck, and others of high rank, were present.

A special from Paris regarding Prussia's note, says: Prussia demands new legislation on the part of Belgium. Belgium refuses Prussia's claims. Her note asserts that she is independent and neutral, and that she has done nothing that could alter her relations with friendly nations which guarantee her independence.

The Times' Paris correspondent states that Prussia has sent notes to other powers on the subject of correspondence with Belgium, and declared she would await the result of the Dutch investigation. He vouches for the trustworthiness of his information, but it is probably incomplete, as the trivium of the German complaints don't justify subsequent significant expressions. The gravest feature of Prussia's note is that her complaints are directed against the Bel-

gians whose attitude is therein considered hostile towards Germany.

LONDON, April 7—Night—The budget about to be presented will give the following satisfactory exhibit for the year ending March 31st, 1875: Revenue from all sources, £75,000,000; excess over estimate £1,500,000; the reduction expenses and increased revenue gives the government £1,125,000 surplus.

Berlin, April 7—Night—The bill withdrawing the State Grants from the Roman Catholic clergy passed its third reading.

PETROBURG, April 7—Night—Ozarna, Princess Imperial, has given birth to a daughter.

VENICE, April 7—Night—The festivities attending the meeting of the Emperor and the King still continues. Twelve thousand troops were reviewed and witnessed by thirty thousand people.

At the grand dinner the King seated the Emperor as his brother and friend. In responding the Emperor said, "I drink to the health of my dear brother and friend, the King of Italy, and to the well-being and prosperity of Italy."

ELECTRICISM.

At St. Louis, Mo., yesterday evening, the steamer Paragon, while lying at the Kountz Line wharf, landing for New Orleans, took fire in the hold. She was towed across the river where she burned to the water's edge and sunk in 8 feet water. She was owned by Jas. Rue, of Pittsburg, Capt. John Darrah, her commander, and Thomas Darrah, the clerk. She cost \$70,000 two years ago, and was insured for \$20,000 in a Pittsburg company. She had about a 1,500 ton cargo on board, valued at about \$25,000.

The Board of Directors of the Panama Railroad have elected T. W. Parke President, and J. McCullough, Vice-President.

Officer Shelby has arrived at New York from Sherman, Texas, with counterfeiter Isaac Baxter, and robber George Van Velsor.

THE ATTENTION OF THE CITIZENS of the community is respectfully called to the fact that the sickly season approaches with the warm weather, which is now near at hand, and that it becomes my duty to adopt the most stringent sanitary measures at this time in order to preserve the health of the city. To prevent, as far possible, the spread of all diseases incident to the warm season, which

Decayed Meat & Filth, Garbage, Trash and all Refuse Matter tend to generate, I would most earnestly ask the hearty co-operation of the citizens generally in placing our city in such a cleanly condition as to render it impregnable to those diseases which have birth in filth and an unwholesome atmosphere, and to a lack of prompt attention at the proper season. To this end the entire force of the city will be employed in

CLEANING, DRAINING, DISINFECTING, REMOVING TRASH, &c., &c. for at least the next twenty days. All persons are earnestly requested to have the trash and refuse matter upon their premises placed upon the streets, where practicable in barrels or boxes, which will be removed immediately.

DISINFECTANTS will be furnished free of charge at my Office to any person calling for same.

THE HEALTH OFFICERS TO BE DESIGNATED BY A YELLOW BOBBETTES, may be notified of any stagnant water standing upon any lot, dump cellars, or anything which would tend to impair the health of the City. Any complaint lodged at my Office will have prompt attention. Hoping that proper sanitary measures adopted now may secure to us a healthy city during the summer, I earnestly solicit the aid and prompt co-operation of all good citizens to attain this great to be desired end.
