THE SUPREME COURT AT THE MOURNERS' BENCH.

COMMISSIONS SIGNED BY THE PRESIDENT.

MORE MAIL FRAUDS DISCOVERED.

New York, April 13.—Non—The Post has the following Washington special: "The statement is made upon excellent authority that the Supreme Court will not render any decision of a political nature at this term of the Court, postponing all such until after the Fall elections. This has given rise to a story, which is credited in legal quarters, that the Court has been petitioned and a majority found opposed to declaring the enforcement acts unconstitutional. The belief is that the Court will sanction the views taken by Judge Bradley in the Louisiana case, from which an appeal was taken and the case was brought into the Supreme Court."

Washington, April 13.—Non—United States steamer Fortuna has arrived from Key West. No yellow fever on board.

Washington, April 13.—Night—The President has signed the following commissions: Benj. Conley, Postmaster at Atlanta; J. M. G. Packer, Postmaster at New Orleans; J. W. Ward, Postmaster at Corpus Christi; Jno. D. Wilson, Postmaster at Murfreesboro, Tenn.

The minor parties to the mail swindle had a partial hearing to-day. The statements heretofore telegraphed are fully sustained.

There were nine or ten bids for the Texas routes, three of which were genuine. Hinds will have a hearing to-morrow.

Funds to the amount of \$75,000 per year have been discovered in the St. Louis and Indianapolis mail bag depositories. They would cut new bags to match old ones with, and charge for both.

GOTHAM.

ARRIVAL OF COMMANDER LULL'S PARTY.

THREE PRIESTS KILLED IN THE ATTACK ON THE JEZUIT'S COLLEGE.

New York, April 13.—Night—The Apaloochee has arrived from Panama with Commander Lull's party. They have completed the survey from Panama to Aspinwall, and pronounce the route the most feasible of any yet surveyed.

Central America is reported as unusually tranquil.

Advices from Buenos Ayres say that only three priests were killed in the attack upon the Jesuit College. The Minister of Foreign Affairs, in his account of negotiations abroad, says that the number killed does not exceed four, and no priests among them. There are, however, some priests wounded.

The direct examination of Beccher is concluded, and Fallerton has commenced the cross examination.

THE NEW RUSSIAN LOAN.

Berlin, April 13.—Noon—The Post says its article of the 9th, indicating the possibility of war, was not inspired by the Government.

Paris, April 13.—Noon—The L'Union says the Pope made representations through the Patriarch of Venice, to the Emperor of Austria, to the effect that the position of the Church is becoming more and more intolerable. If the unreasonable demands of Prussia are not resisted by the Catholic powers the latter will lose all influence and become subjects to the German Government, which is endeavoring to bring the whole German nationality under one scepter.

The Emperor, replying through the Austrian Ambassador at Rome, deprecates the struggle between Church and State, and advises prudence.

The North German Gazette accepts as reassuring the disavowal of warlike intentions by the French press.

The Berlin Post says that the draft has been completed of the bill prohibiting religious orders in Prussia, except those employed in nursing the poor.

London, April 13.—Noon—The Humane Society at Bologna has voted a gold medal to Boyerton.

The Rothschilds have issued a prospectus of the new Russian loan of £15,000,000, the interest on which is to be 4 per cent per annum, to be issued at 2-£8,000,000 for subscription in London, and the balance at St. Petersburg.

Liverpool, April 13.—Night—The Arbitrator, for Orleans, which put back on account of a collision, has sailed again.

ELECTRICISMS.

The Republicans of Patterson, N. J., have elected their Mayor by 1,000 majority.

Seventy mills of the spinners at Lowell have struck. The balance will be discharged by agreeable notices of

the agents. The spinners and agents are equally resolute. There was a light snow at Washington and quite a heavy one throughout Pennsylvania yesterday. In some places the snow was five to seven inches deep.

The Nicks do arrived at San Francisco yesterday. There are no reports of the recovery of the missing boats of the steamer Gothberg. Only twenty-five persons were saved. All of the officers were lost.

At Indianapolis Rush & Co.'s elevator has been burned, with 30,000 bushels of wheat. Loss 70,000.

Six companies of cavalry and two of infantry have been ordered from Omaha to the base of the Black Hills, as an escort to the scientists who are sent by the Government to survey the country.

At Philadelphia yesterday the weight of the snow broke down the canvas of Barnum's Hippodrome. Forty persons were beneath, but none were seriously hurt.

Dispatches from Hazleton represent the mines unlangued.

At Trenton, N. J., the Democrats have elected the entire ticket, except Tax Receiver.

NEW JERSEY.

VESSEL ASHORE ON BARNEGAT SHOALS.

Barnegat, N. J.—Night—The vessel ashore on Barnegat Shoals was firing guns from 7 this a. m. to 11. At the time our informant left the vessel was distinguished what kind of vessel it was on account of the heavy fog, but judged it to be a steamer, from the continuous firing and amount of ammunition expended.

Decayed Matt'rs Filth, Garbage, Trash and all Refuse Matter tend to generate, I would most earnestly ask the hearty co-operation of the citizens generally in placing our city in such a clean condition as to render it impracticable for these diseases which have birth in filth and an unwholesome atmosphere, and to a lack of prompt attention at the proper season. To this end the entire force of the city will be employed in CLEANING, DRAINING, DISINFECTING, REMOVING TRASH, &c., &c., for at least the next twenty days.

All persons are earnestly requested to have the trash and refuse matter upon their premises placed upon the streets, where practicable in barrel or boxes, which will be removed immediately.

DISINFECTANTS will be furnished free of charge at my Office to any person calling for same.

THE HEALTH OFFICERS TO BE DESIGNATED BY A YELLOW ROSETTE, may be notified of any stagnant water standing upon any lot, damp cellar, or anything which would tend to impair the health of the City. Any complaint lodged at my Office will have prompt attention. Hoping that proper sanitary measures adopted now may secure to us a healthy city during the summer, I earnestly solicit the aid and prompt co-operation of all good citizens to attain this greatly to be desired end.
