#### HEADQUARTERS.

##### FUNERAL OF JUDGE ATOCHA.

##### GEN. BECKWITH TO BE CHIEF COMMISSARY.

##### HARDON OF THE ATLANTA POST MASTERSHIP.

Washington, April 15—Noon—Gen. A. Beckwith has been assigned to duty as Chief Commissary.

The funeral of Judge Atocha, who died in New Orleans, took place this morning from the Church of the Immaculate Conception in this city. His remains were buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

The President and party left this morning and will return on Wednesday.

#### EUROPE.

##### THE CARLISTS CAPTURE A FORT AND TAKE A NUMBER OF PRISONERS.

##### CHRISTIANS KILLED BY THE TURKS.

Hendage, April 15—Noon—The Carlists surprised Fort Agre, near Santander, and carried off two hundred prisoners and four guns.

Vienna, April 14—Noon—It is reported that the Turks have killed 275 Christians in Roumania and Bulgaria within the past three months.

#### ILLINOIS.

##### INTER-STATE BILLIARD TOURNAMENT.

Chicago, April 15—Noon—In the inter-state billiard tournament yesterday afternoon Rhines, of Chicago beat Harning, of Ohio, two hundred to one hundred and eighty-three; Miller, of Louisiana, beat Shaw, of Indiana, two hundred to one hundred and ten; Mastriolo, of Louisiana, beat Liverman, of Wisconsin, two hundred to one hundred and thirty-five.

In last night's billiard match Carter, of Ohio, beat Parker, of Chicago, two hundred to one hundred and forty-five; Burroughs, of Michigan, beat Gallaher, of Ohio, two hundred to sixty-seven; Macafee, of Iowa, beat Hon. of Louisiana, two hundred to ninety-two.

#### ELECTRICISMS.

Thomas P. Windover, of New York, a veteran of 1812, is dead.

Henry W. Dutton, senior proprietor of the Boston Evening Transcript, is dead.

Advisers from San Diego, Cal., report outrages by the Apaches. Three men with a pack train and a mail rider were killed. Troops recovered the pack train.

An injunction against free passes will compel Grant and his party to each up over the New York, Hartford and New Haven Railroads thither and hither from the Centennial of the Battle of Lexington.

The Detroit and Milwaukee railroad has been placed in the hands of receivers.

Canadian dispatches report a general opening of navigation in the St. Lawrence river.

A monster benefit for the support and education of Dan Bryan's children will take place on the 29th inst. at each place of amusement in New York City. The gross proceeds will be placed in the hands of Travers, Belmont & Duncan for investment to meet the object. One thousand dollars has been donated by the managers for the immediate wants of the family.

Fullerton is sick. The Tilton business has been adjourned till Monday.

#### SOUTH CAROLINA.

##### THE SENATORIAL EXCURSION PARTY.

##### GOV. CHAMBERLAIN WILL VETO THE TAX BILL.

##### BUNCH AND HARDEE RESIGNED.

Charleston, April 15—Noon—The Senatorial excursion party arrived here last evening, and are to day visiting Fort Sumter and other points of interest in the harbor, the United States Revenue Cutter being tendered by the Collector for that purpose. They will leave for Washington City to-night.

Governor Chamberlain left Columbia last night to attend the Lexington Centennial. The News and Courier says he has decided to veto the enormous tax bill, passed by the Legislature at the recent session. This action will give great satisfaction to the property holders throughout the entire State.

Two negro murderers, named Bush and Hardee, sentenced to be hung here to-morrow, have been respite for one week.

##### ARRIVAL OF SHARKEY AT HAVANA.

Havana, April 15—Noon—Sharkey is here. He slipped his handcuffs ten times during the month of January, and once attempted to jump overboard. He is greatly depressed.

Kingston advises that the cause of the meeting of the laborers was the burning of the fields by sparks from a locomotive. The proposition at the time was that the laborers had fired the estates. All is quiet now and the gunboats and troops have returned to Port Royal.

#### LOUISIANA.

##### THE HOUSE ADOPTED THE REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

##### RECOGNITION OF THE KELLOGG GOVERNMENT.

New Orleans, April 15—Night—The report of the Committee on Elections, embodying the terms of the award was adopted in the House by a vote of 82 to 15.

Most of the members displaced made speeches intimating their acquiescence. Poindexter, of Assumption parish, one of the colored members ousted by the award, said he had the satisfaction in giving up his seat, to know that his old master, who had always been just and kind, would take it. This was an honor which did not occur every day.

A joint resolution recognizing the Kellogg government and pledging the members to support the efforts of the Governor in the line of reform and good government, was adopted by the House, by a vote of 89 to 18.

##### IN ORDER TO ENABLE ME TO OBTAIN

The City thoroughly, and with as little delay as possible, I have divided the City into four (4) Health Districts, with a Health Officer assigned to duty in each.

##### THE FIRST DISTRICT.

In charge of Health Officer J. H. Brown, embraces that portion of the City North of Market and East of Fifth Streets.

##### THE SECOND DISTRICT.

In charge of Health Officer O. C. Taylor, embraces that portion of the City North of Market and West of Fifth Streets.

##### THE THIRD DISTRICT.

In charge of Health Officer A. J. Denton, embraces that portion of the City South of Market and East of Fifth Streets.

##### THE FOURTH DISTRICT.

In charge of Health Officer S. F. Walcott, embraces that portion of the City South of Market and West of Fifth Streets.

The Health Officers may be designated by the yellow rosettes, and they are instructed to inspect and report all uncleanliness to my office.

It is hoped that the Citizens generally will co-operate with me in this important work, and begin the needed cleaning without further delay.

Any person requiring the services of a Receiver may report the fact to the Health Officer of the Division in which the work is to be done, or at my office, and the matter shall have the prompt attention.

Trusting no further appeal to our good Citizens may be required and that our City shall be a model in neatness during the coming Summer.
