REPORT ON THE FEVER CASES AT KEY WEST.

SOME FEARS OF AN EPIDEMIC THERE THIS SUMMER.

The Fleet Surgeon, James Suddans, of the North Atlantic Fleet, writes to the Navy Department under date of Port Royal, S. C., April 14th, 1875, in regard to the health of the crews of the vessels attache | to the fleet and the report of yellow fever at Key West and Havana, and says: It was remarked at Key West and at Havana that the winds were constantly from a single northerly wind during the season when they are the most prevalent, Tue average temperature at Ker West from December 11th to March 31st, 1875, has been more than six degrees above the average of that season of the year. The probability is that the good health of the squadron as Key West, at all times for the past year, may be attributed in a great name to the strict sanitary regula-

Surgeon Suddans then speaks of e departure of the Colorado and the departure of the Colorado and Plymouth from Havana on the 29th of March, upon learning that the yellow fever existed there, and their arrival at Key West, where a board investigated the circumstances attending the reported appearance of yellow fever there. They found that three deaths had occurred from yellow fever of the most pronounced character, while of several other cases the surgeon was still doubtful. During the few days the fleet remained off Key West no new cases in the town were reported. Burgeon Suddan says all this time, however, a strong northwest wind had need blowing and purifying and purifyi been blowing, cooling and purifying the air, and when hot weather comes, which may be expected from day to day, he fears a fresh outbreak of the day, he fears a fresh outbreak of the disease. It now only remains to state the general probabilities of the health and disease in this station during the coming summer. I have heard but one opinion expressed since early in the winter, All the old residents of Key West with whom I came in contact invariably expressed themselves as fearful of a very circly season. In Havana, too, I made a point of axamining the opinion made a point of examining the opinion of almost every one I met on this point; it was the same. A general aprehension was felt, and even the cost conservative were compelled to owledge their fears. In concluding his report he says: The increased temperature of the past Winter being aix degrees above the average, the entire prevalence of southerly and canterly winds, and the absolute absonce of northern winds during the whole Winter, the general opinion ex-isting among those who have had the best opportunity to observe, and from a judgment of the actual appearance of yellow fever so early in the year, both at Havana and Key West, all combine to favor the belief that any protracted stay of a large naval force at either of these places might have a most calamitous result and would therefore be in the highest degree im-
