EFFECTS OF THE COLD.

THE NEWS AND COURIER LIBEL SUIT.

CHARLESTON, S. C., April 21.—Noon.—There has been great damage to Sea Island cotton and early fruits.

The jury in the Bowen libel suit against Ricordan & Dawson, publishers of the News and Courier, consists of 6 whites and 6 blacks. Publishers admitted by defence. The admission of the proof of the truth of the alleged libels is corroborated in every point by the prosecution.

DANA DISCHARGED.

New York, April 21.—Noon.—The treasurer of Booth's Theatre was arrested last evening on a warrant issued from Commissioner Daventry, based on an affidavit of a colored man named Smith, that he and his wife were refused seats in the parquette of the theatre. The treasurer was bailed till today.

Count Maresfashi, Monsignor Roncetti and Dr. Baldi, papal envoys, left this city for Baltimore this morning, and will sojourn with Archbishop Bayley until that prelate comes to New York to confer the Beretta on Cardinal McCloskey.

New York, April 21.—Night.—It is said that three men in cleaning out a cesspool at Staten Island, came upon between twenty and thirty thousand dollars in gold coin. It is said that the premises were formerly owned by a city bank cashier who proved a defaulter in the amount of \$160,000.

Specie shipments to-day was a quarter of a million.

An order for the re-arrest of Tweed, under three million dollars bail, was placed in the hands of the warden of the penitentiary. Should the decision of the Court of Appeals favor Tweed, he will be taken to the Ludlow Street Jail to await the further action of the courts.

Judge Blatchford rendered a decision in the case of Charles A. Dana, arrested upon an attachment issued out of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia by United States Marshal Fisher. Judge Blatchford discharged Mr. Dana from the custody of the marshal of this district in a very lengthy opinion.

DELANO NOT REQUESTED TO RESIGN.

THE ATLANTA POSTMASTER-SHIP.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Night.—Postmaster Jewell returned to Washington this morning. He states positively that he will not resign. He has declined Secretary Delano to resign in his stead. Governor Jewell was in the car with the President and Mr. Delano when the published statement referred to was brought to their attention and his assertion is based upon what was then said by the parties directly concerned.

Postmaster General Jewell has received several petitions signed by almost every republican at Atlanta, Ga., indorsing his appointment of Conley as postmaster at that point and praying that he will not reconsider his action and appoint Bard. Besides these petitions a number of letters have been received warmly indorsing Conley's appointment.

BISMARCK WRITES TO LUXEMBURG.

London, April 21.—Noon.—The Duchess of Sutherland and the Duke and Duchess of St. Albans, were present to-day at the revival services in the Haymarket, conducted by Moody and Sankey.

It is rumored that Bismarck has addressed a note to Luxembourg similar to those sent to Belgium.

THE WEST.

DAMAGE TO THE CROPS BY THE LATE COLD.

CINCINNATI, April 21.—Night.—Reports from sixty Ohio, and thirty one Indiana towns indicate a complete failure of peaches; apples are slightly injured; twenty-four towns report wheat uninjured, twenty-two report wheat a crop, twelve report no crop reports. Twenty towns in Western Pennsylvania indicate half a crop of wheat and fruit. Reports from Michigan indicate great damage to wheat, and destruction to peaches; apples promise well, and plentiful rains may improve the peach crop.

THE IMPEACHMENT OF CLINTON

New Orleans, April 21.—Night.—Gov. Kellogg to-day sent a special message to both Houses of the General Assembly, calling attention to the fact that the time for which the Assembly was convened is rapidly drawing to a close, and earnestly urging the passage of the bill for the relief of the city of New Orleans and recommending an amendment to the funding law. His message closes as follows: Permit me to say that it is expected of you, under the existing circumstances, that the great interests of the State and city shall receive the preference in your proceedings over the advancement of party ends, and that our financial condition renders it very undesirable that the term of this session should be extended, nor can it be with justice to the tax-payers or the creditors of the State.

At Cleveland, O., nearly all the peaches have been killed and apples largely injured. The wheat crop is unimpaired.

Reports from all parts of Kentucky show great damage to fruit and tobacco plants. Other crops have suffered triflingly.

An extensive oil cloth factory, belonging to the Eastern Manufacturing Company, was burned yesterday morning. Loss \$100,000; insurance \$25,000.

Ex-Treasurer Parker, of Columbia, S. C., was arrested yesterday on the charge of embezzling \$28,000 of the sinking fund money of the State. He has not yet procured bail.

In the billiard tournament at Chicago, on Tuesday night, Parker beat Hon. Buleigh best Shaw and Cartet beat Mazzio.
