SUPREME COURT.
SECRETARY DELANO WILL
RESIGN.

NEW YORK, April 22—Night.—A dispatch from the Sun from Washington says that the Supreme Court will adjourn on the 28th day of May. Although there has been no formal conference or vote on the Louisiana case, which involves the constitutionality of the Enforcement acts, there is good reason to believe that this tribunal, by a most decided majority, will sustain the decision of Justice Bradley in the Court below and declare all of the legislation to be void and without any constitutionality or warrant. The opinion will be reserved until the meeting of the Court next fall.

WASHINGTON, April 22—Night.—Attorney General Williams has resigned. His resignation takes effect on the 15th of May. No successor has been named. Williams goes home, hoping to become Senator from Oregon. It is the general impression of those likely to be injured that the case known as the Great parish case, involving the constitutionality of the Enforcement act of May 31st, 1870, will not be decided at this term of the Supreme Court, but the same authority asserts that a large majority of the Court, if not all, are of the opinion that the act is unconstitutional. All the cases which have been argued at the present term, except this, it is thought will be decided before adjournment. One of these is what has been called the capitation tax case, from Maryland, arising under a statute of the State passed in 1852, which secures to the State one-fifth of the gross amount received by the Company from passenger travel on the Washington branch road of the Baltimore and Ohio Company. Before the counsel of the Company advised that the tax was unconstitutional, the Company had paid into the State Treasury on account of the tax more than \$3,000,000, and has paid in dividends to the State, as a stockholder in the branch road and as a stockholder in the main road, more than \$5,000,000. Secretary Delano will certainly resign.

GOTHAM.
SINKING OF THE STEAMER SIONINGTON.
THE BLACKMAILER'S TESTIMONY CONCLUDED.
New York, April 22—Night—The Sionington, of the Boston line, sunk at her moorings, while repairing. There were forty workmen on board, all of whom escaped. She went down in a heavy swell in five minutes. The Ninth Annual Convention of the National Board of Fire Underwriters met here to-day. Fifty Companies were represented. The proceedings were preliminary. Beecher's testimony was concluded to-day. Half a dozen witnesses were examined regarding the general morals and wiles of the blackmailer.

CUBA.
THE INSURGENTS ACTIVE IN SAGUA AND COLON.
Key West, April 22—Night—Advisors from Havana report that 1,000 well mounted insurgents entered the jurisdiction of Sagua on Friday last and burned seven large plantations in the district of Quarnada de Los Guines. They met with no resistance. Manuel Suarez, formerly an officer of the Spanish army, is in command. Another rebel cavalry corps, estimated to be 1,500 strong, is operating under Gen. Sanguill, in the eastern part of the jurisdiction of Colon. It was supposed that reinforcements had been received by Captain General Valmasosa, sufficient to prevent the insurgents from overrunning Colon, and to check their progress westward for the present.

MEXICO.
THE MEXICAN CONGRESS IN SESSION.
TOM SCOTT AND HIS PARTY AT THE CAPITAL.
CITY OF MEXICO, April 12, via HAVANA, April 22—Night—The latest session of the present Congress was opened by President Lerdo de Tejada with a speech. The President said that the relations of Mexico with the foreign powers were friendly. In accordance with the recent amendment to the Constitution a Senate would be organized in September. The executive had fulfilled all the requirements of the constitutional amendments and the reform laws, but old prejudices and a spirit of bigotry still lingered. Some persons, by artfully creating an

unreasonable excitement, had given occasion or pretext for the formation of small armed bands in parts of Michoacan and Jalisco. They pretended to believe that Mexicans would allow themselves to be deprived of the glorious results of the victories they had purchased with their blood; of those ideas and principles whose incorporation in the constitution and laws of the country elevated the republic to a place among the most liberal and civilized people. The President stated that measures would be submitted making education compulsory and providing for a normal college for female teachers. Col. Tom Scott and party have arrived at the capital. Many who thought that their purpose was diplomatic and warlike, are now convinced that they are here in pursuit of a purely speculative and commercial enterprise. Funds have been deposited for the construction of light-houses at Tampico and Vera Cruz.

RALEIGH.
DISTRESSING CASE OF SUICIDE.
RALEIGH, April 22—Night—Jacob B. Rumbough, cigar maker of Charlottesville, Va., more recently of Lynchburg and Richmond, shot himself fatally in the head here this evening with a small pistol. Cause, failure to obtain work and disheartened in consequence. He leaves a wife and three children in Lynchburg. He belonged to both the Knights of Pythias of Charlottesville, and the Red Men of Richmond.

LOUISIANA.
THE SENATE IN COURT OF IMPEACHMENT.
New York, April 22—Night—The Senate to-day resolved itself into a Court of Impeachment to impeach Charles Olinon, of high crimes and misdemeanors in office, and notified the House of their action. A Committee was appointed to prepare rules to govern the Senate when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, and a joint resolution was adopted, suspending Auditor Clinton from office pending impeachment.

EUROPE.
THIERS COMING TO THE FRONT AGAIN.
Paris, April 22—Night—The Monitor says: Thiers has been elected to the Senate by many departments, and may possibly be elected President of that body, which position he is sure to hold for life. LONDON, April 22—Night—The hearing of the seat holders in her Majesty's Opera House, restraining Moody & Sanky from using that building for a revival, has been postponed.

ELECTRICISMS.
The Presbytery of New Castle, Del., rejected the General Assembly's overture, regarding rotary eldership, by a vote of 46 to 14. The Union Pacific R. R. is passable except six miles, where the trains transfer. Roswell C. Smith, of Hartford, Ct., author of Smith's Grammar and other school books, is dead, aged 78. At New Orleans there is a railroad war. The fare via the Jackson route to New York is \$35, and the reduction at other points are in proportion. A San Francisco dispatch says: The steamer Ventura has been wrecked at Point Luna and is a total loss. All the passengers were saved. The cargo will be saved with fair weather. A burning steamer, seen off Santa Barbara, is firing distress guns and a schooner has gone to her relief. Jessie & Duval's cotton mills, at Zanesville, O., were on Wednesday evening damaged by fire to the extent of \$25,000, insured.

In the Chicago billiard tournament Callaghan beat Liverman. Carter beat McAfee 800 to 46, making the highest average of the tournament. He counted as follows: 18, 11, 15, 23, 0, 29, 11, 72, 30. Time of game 55 minutes. Burleigh beat Magisole 200 to 164. A dispatch from San Francisco says there is nothing authentic regarding the burning of the steamer off Santa Barbara. She fired 25 guns, and her stern was burning when the fog hid her. One of the Shah's daughters was married on January 26th to the Imam Jumeih of Teheran. A correspondent of The London Academy writes that public opinion in Persia regarded the marriage as another link of the chain with which the King tries to attach himself to the priesthood, and then adds this description of the festivities attending the wedding: "The bride veiled, and covered with what looked like a waving mass of molten gold, was taken to her husband's house at half-past nine; soldiers with bayonets in the muzzles of their guns, lined the road, the walls of the houses were illuminated with oil lamps, and as the process led her father's palace guns were fired and fireworks let off. The fireworks went off very well, with but a few exceptions; on the roof where we had taken our stand some hundreds of rockets suddenly burst off in all directions, burning many of the spectators, and some suns and stars exploded just as the bride's carriage was passing, frightening the horses and burning the uniforms of many soldiers and servants. To-day a grand salvo of artillery was fired off, and some festivities took place in the great square.

THE SECOND DISTRICT.
In charge of Health Officer C. U. Fayler, embraces that portion of the City North of Market and West of Fifth Streets.
THE THIRD DISTRICT.
In charge of Health Officer A. J. Denton, embraces that portion of the City South of Market and East of Fifth Streets.
THE FOURTH DISTRICT.
In charge of Health Officer S. F. Walcott, embraces that portion of the City South of Market and West of Fifth Streets.
The Health Officers may be designated by the yellow route, and they are instructed to inspect and report all uncleanliness to my office. It is hoped that the Citizens generally will co-operate with me in this important work, and begin the needed cleaning without further delay. Any person requiring the services of a Feaver-remover may report the fact to the Health Officer of the Division in which the work is to be done, or at my office, and the matter shall have the promptest attention. Treating no further appeal to our good Citizens may be required, and that our City shall be a model in neatness during the coming Summer.
