##### NATIONAL BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS.

##### DEATH OF JOHN HARPER.

##### TEN YEARS FOR A BANK THIEF.

New York, April 23—Noon—The National Board of Fire Underwriters have resolved to continue to charge taxes to policy owners where it is found necessary. The Executive Committee are empowered to offer rewards for the arrest of incendiaries whether the local authorities did so or not.

John Harper, Sr., a partner of the firm of Harper Bros., is dead, aged 79. Chas. O. Lewis, member of the suspended firm of Webster, Lewis & Co., and whose family is at Aikins, shot himself and died at the Windsor House yesterday, in consequence of his difficulties.

The cashier of the Hoboken Savings Bank has been convicted of stealing the bank's money, and sentenced by various courts, aggregating ten years.

The resignation of Geo. W. Cass, President of the Northern Pacific Railroad, has been accepted.

The National Fire Underwriters elected the following Executive Committee: Stephen Crowell, D. A. Heald, J. W. Murray, Chas. Platt, A. G. Baker, D. B. Smith, E. Lockwood, J. B. Hall, Geo. P. Oram, Geo. L. Chase, Henry Kellogg.

##### A DANGEROUS COUNTERFEIT.

##### DELANO AND OUR STUBBORN PRESIDENT.

##### MORE ABOUT THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF THE ENFORCEMENT ACTS.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Noon—The printers of the Chronicle office struck yesterday. Amateurs and old hands got the paper out. The strike includes compositors, proof-readers, pressmen and apprentices.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Night—There was nothing of importance before the Cabinet, and no allusion was made as to Cabinet changes. The Attorney-General left early for court duties.

There is a dangerous five dollar bill on the First National Bank of Boston, Ill., in circulation. The counterfeit is printed from an altered plate from which base fives on the Traders National Bank of Chicago were printed. The heads of the bureaus of the Interior Department visited the President in a body, assuring him that Delano had unduly controlled their decisions. The President said he was glad to see them, but that the visit was unnecessary, as his confidence in Delano's integrity and official deportment remained unimpaired. The President appointed E. H. Banks, Postmaster of Camden, N. C.

The question of the constitutionality of the enforcement act to be determined by the decision pending, has been fully argued on the merits four times. In the first instance it was argued at the South Carolina Circuit on a motion to quash indictment under it by Beverly Johnson and Henry Stannberry. There was then a division of opinion between the Judges, but the hearing being on a motion to quash it, it was held that the decision could not be certified on such motion. It was again argued on a motion in arrest of judgment, and the question was certified here, where the case was dismissed, the accused having been pardoned by the President. The question was again argued at this term in a case from Kentucky by Mr. Stannberry and Mr. Buckner, and still again in the present case by Mr. Johnson, Mr. Field, Mr. Phillips and Mr. Mann.

##### EUROPE.

##### MOTION IN THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT TO EXCLUDE OUTSIDERS.

London, April 23.—Noon—Notice has been given by Mr. Sullivan of his intention to have the resolution that all persons not members be excluded from the house debated to-night.

Mr. Bright will probably make a move that reporters be allowed to remain, though the Government will consent to refer the subject to a Special Committee.

London, April 23.—Night—The motion impugning the verdict in the Tichborne case, in the House of Commons, attracts an immense crowd. Extra policemen are stationed around the building.

##### ALABAMA.

##### MEETING OF THE YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

Montgomery, April 23.—Noon—The State Convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of Alabama met here last night, E. L. McKee, of Selma, presiding. There was a larger delegation in attendance than at any previous meeting and much interest was manifested. G. A. Hall and T. K. Cree, of Washington, D. C., were present, representing the Executive Committee of the United States and British America.

The paper mill of Geo. Benton & Sons, at Farmington, Va., was burned Thursday night. Loss \$75,000.

## THE ORIENT.

### A VICEROY DEPOSING A KING.

CALCUTTA, April 23.—Night—Lord Northbrook, Viceroy of India, has issued a proclamation deposing the Guikwar of Baroda and declaring him and his issue precluded from all rights appertaining to the sovereignty of the country, and compelling the Guikwar and his family to select a place for their retirement in British India. The Viceroy says that this measure is based independently of the recent trial of the Guikwar, upon his notorious misconduct, gross misgovernment and incapacity; and furthermore a restoration of the Guikwar would be detrimental to the interest of Baroda. The Viceroy will select a member of the Guikwar's family to reign.

### BALTIMORE.

#### SUDDEN DEATH OF COL. YERGER.

BALTIMORE, April 23.—Noon—Col. E. M. Yerger, formerly of Mississippi, but for several years past a resident of this city, died very suddenly last night. At one time his name was prominent before the public in connection with the killing of Col. Crane at Jackson, Miss., for which he was tried by a military commission. Dr. Yerger was in apparently good health until 1 o'clock P. M. yesterday. For several years since residing in Baltimore he was proprietor and editor of the Evening Journal.

### LOUISIANA.

#### TERRIBLE STEAMBOAT DISASTER AT NEW ORLEANS.

NEW ORLEANS, April 23.—Night—The steamboats John Kyle, Expositor, and Charles Bodman, while lying at the foot of Poydras street, were banded to the water's edge. Many lives are said to have been lost. Particulars soon. [No particulars received.—Ed. JOURNAL.]

### ELECTRICISMS.

Special dispatches to Texan papers report continued disorders along the Rio Grande.

A dispatch from Santa Barbara, Cal., says that the Schooner sent to the assistance of the supposed burning steamer has returned, and reported that a man of war passed yesterday, firing guns for practice. No other information tending to confirm the rumor of the disaster has been received.

The defalcation of \$6,000 from the Western Union Telegraph office, at Philadelphia, is attributed to John A. Heiner, chief clerk to Superintendent Bates. Heiner is non est.

The library of Princeton College contains a large collection of books, pamphlets and other publications relating to the recent war, and the librarian has addressed a circular to the alumni of the institution in the Southern States asking them for contributions of the war literature of the South.
