New York, April 27.—Noon.—Thou-sends of spectators gathered at Saint Parlicks Cathedral this A. M., to wit-In con ness the peremony of conferring the bretta on Cardinal McCloskey. There has been an enormous demand for tickets, and numbers of those who had them, feared great difficulty in gain-ing entrances. The streets in the im-mediate neighborhood were packed with human beings. The interest m inifested was so great that represeutalives from every part of the Union were present. Numbers of front seats were reserved for invited guests and Justice Daly, Judge Donahue, District A torney Phelps, Sinclair and Loring.

m my other well known citizens. At 20 minutes to II o'clock the head of the procession emerged from the vestry. Then came Cardinal McCloskey, the Papal Envoys, Dr. Mude, Monsignor Rongest, and lastly the tall figure of Count Marefoschi of the Pope's Nople Guard in his dazzling uniform.

Cardinal McCloskey, wearing his ourple cussock and mautiliets, knelt at the Epistle side of the altar; the Arch-bishop of Baltimore sat on his throne on the same side. The officiating Bishop and Clergymen stood at the altar steps and mass was commenced at the confiteer; the Cardinal stood up and proceeded to his throne at the Gospel side; he alone of all the prelates present having the pastoral staff, which was carried by an assistant. The officiating Bishop, after incensing the altar three times, sat down with the Deacon and Sub-Deacons. Bishop Laughlin read the Introit, recited the Karia and intened the Gloria in Ex-

Kyrie and intoned the Gloria in Excelsis, which was sung by the choir. The Collects were read by the Cele-brant; the Epistle by the Sub Deacon, and while Bishop Laughlin read the Gospel, the entire congregation rose to their feet. He then chanted the words credo in unam Deum, and in a low voice, recited the remainder of the Nicene creed. When it was concluded, the Celebrant, together with the Assistant Deacon and Subd acon, sat down until the choir had fluished. Bishop Langhlin returned to the altar, where, after the customary dominus vobiscum and oremus, he bished. Bishop Langhlin returned the altar, where, after the customy dominus vobiscum and oremus, he occeded to read the prayers at the fertory; the deacon and sub-deacon was a leader of the mob.

bis venerable frater, the archbishop of Baltimore, setting forth the reasons which induced him to confer the cardinate upon Aich ishop McCloskey, and at the close handed him the brief authorizing him to confer the beretta on this newly appointed Prince of the Church. The Archbishop having replied in Latin, passed the brief over to Father McGean, Deacon of the Mass, who then read it. Count Marefoschi then surrendered the beretta to Monsignor Roncetti, who handed it to Archbishop Bailey, who then walked over to the

Cardinal and placed the cap on his head, at the same time addressing him in latin as emenentia tua. The Cardi nal made a suitable reply also in Latin and after intoning the Te Deum retired to the vestry and put on the crimson role of his office and returned to the altar, while the choir sang the Te Denm. At the close of the hymn the Cardinal gave the pontifical bene-diction and the ceremonies were end-ed and the rest of the congregation passed out of the Cathedral.
