#### GOTHAM.

**THE NEW CARDINAL PERFORMING THE MARRIAGE CEREMONY.**

**MATCH GAME OF BILLIARDS.**  
**COMBINATION TO CONTROL THE PETROLEUM MARKET.**

New York, April 29—Noon—Cardinal McCloskey married Miss Nelly Murphy, a daughter of Mr. Tom Murphy, to Senor DeRivas, a Spanish banker. There was a large attendance both of political and fashionable notables.

In a match game of billiards, 600 points, for \$1,000, Garnier won 46 in 99, Vignaux scoring 258.

#### THE FIRE FIEND.

**FIRES AT SING SING AND DETROIT.**

**A CHICAGO FIRE IN OSKOSH.**

**TERRIBLE PICTURE OF THE HOUSELESS INHABITANTS.**

Sing Sing, April 29—Noon.—The Nelson, Empress and Mansions Houses was destroyed by fire last night. Loss \$80,000.

Detroit, April 29—Noon.—This morning a fire broke out in the factory of the Webber Furniture Company, and consumed it with ten or twelve dwellings adjoining. Loss on the factory building \$200,000, machinery \$100,000, on dwellings from \$30,000 to \$50,000. Insurance unknown.

Oskosh, April 29—Noon.—A fire broke out in the Morgan & Bros. saw mill, burning that and a dozen other saw and shingle mills, millions of feet of lumber, hundreds of houses and printing offices, &c. The burnt district is one and a half miles long by half a mile wide. There are hundreds of homeless. Two lives are known to be lost. The thieves are in possession of the city. Special policemen have been detached to prevent depredations.

Chicago, April 29—Night—Numbers of women and children are lying about the streets or roaming around in search of shelter. Over 200 dwellings have been burned. Three lives were lost and other fatalities are apprehended. Gangs of thieves are prowling around, against whom the police are impatient.

Covington, Ky., April 29—Night—Neimayer's brewery has been burned. Loss heavy.

#### ELECTRICISMS.

A dispatch from Corpus Christi says that tranquility has been restored. The companies of citizens have disbanded but soldiers are scouting through the exposed region.

Valmueda proclaims pardon to all rebels in Cuba who surrender before the 30th of May.

The British delegation is permanently established at Yaddo.

The negro preacher who murdered his wife at Georgetown, Del., and accented himself in the attic of the church where he heard the funeral sermon, has been arrested.

In Milton county, Ga., a white boy aged 17 years, whose throat a negro cut over a game of cards, died instantly. The negro escaped.

The Georgia Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Masons has returned to its allegiance to the general Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the U. S., which was severed in 1861.

#### HEADQUARTERS.

**A NEW PLANET DISCOVERED.**  
**PRESENT CONDITION OF THE FREEDMEN'S BANK CONCERN.**

WASHINGTON, April 29—Night—Leverier announces to Professor Henry the discovery of a new planet.

The citizens generally pay no attention to the new tax law for the District.

The Freedmen's Bank Commissioners have \$300,000. It will require \$600,000 for a 20 per cent dividend. The depositors number seventy-five thousand. Many of the depositors are selling their bank books at ten cents on the dollar.

#### PENNSYLVANIA.

**THE LABOR RIOTS IN THE COAL REGIONS.**

**MORE MURDERS AND OTHERS THREATENED.**

WILKESBARRE, April 29—Night—The miners at Sawyer's works have voted unanimously to hold out until the restoration of the basis of 1874.

Two members of a posse of constables were wounded by the barricaded miners while serving civil writs. Two of the miners have been arrested and the rest are surrounded a sheriff's posse. One family, consisting of ten men—desperadoes—it is feared will fight to the last.

#### TENNESSEE.

**A NEGRO ATTEMPTS TO OUTRAGE A WIDOW LADY.**

MEMPHIS, April 29—Noon—Dan Wright (negro) attempted to violate the person of a widow lady, but her cries attracted the attention of her son when Wright fled. He was subsequently captured and hanged.

NASHVILLE, April 29—Night—A misunderstanding between the Governors of Georgia and Tennessee has resulted in the disregard of each other's requisitions for fugitives.

#### EUROPE.

**A ROYAL SCION MOBBED AND BEATEN AT VIENNA.**

VIENNA, April 29—Noon—The police are required to protect Don Alfonso from the mob. Don Alfonso was insulted and beaten.

#### A Small Fiction.

The Baltimore *Sun* has been at some pains to show the falsity of the legend on which Whittier's poem of Barbara Fritchie is founded. Whittier, it seems, heard some liar tell how old Barbara Fritchie waved a flag in defiance of Jackson's Corps on the march through Frederick; how she was fired at and yet still waved the wounded flag, and how Jackson himself called out, as Whittier puts it:

"Who touches a hair of you gray head, Dies like a dog—March on!" he said.

The *Sun* disposes of the whole thing, showing that Mrs. Fritchie showed no flag, Jackson's Corps did not march by her house, and nobody shot at her or was rebuked because of her. The evidence given by the *Sun* is complete, being derived from citizens of Frederick and neighbors of the late Mrs. Fritchie, and we are glad that the correction has been made and is likely to reach the Northern people, among whom alone the story is believed.

In our army, indeed, nothing was ever heard of the story until pictorial papers of New York brought us accounts of it. Jackson's Corps, of whom the writer of this was a soldier, certainly saw a United States flag or two in houses of Frederick City, and heard not a few expressions both of welcome and of abuse from women in that town; but it saw no ostentatious flag flaunted or fired at. The troops were careful to obey the strict orders they had received to respect the rights of the citizens, and forbore not only to levy contributions, but even to answer the viragos, of whom several took advantage of and abused our patience.

A rather unique sort of a miser died a week or two ago in Hudson, N. Y. He was an Episcopal minister who served as a missionary for his church in Greene county, receiving a salary of \$200 and numerous donations. He lived in extreme poverty, and when he died a subscription was taken up to pay the funeral expenses. After the funeral his rooms were examined and a will found, together with a package containing \$84,000 in government bonds, and a bank book showing a deposit of \$10,000 in a bank in New York City. The will gave half of his property to his relatives and the rest to St. Luke's Hospital and to churches in which he had preached. The clergyman's name was Clark, and he went to Greene county from Halifax, N. S.

the City thereof, and with as little delay as possible, I have divided the City into four (4) Health Districts, with a Health Officer assigned to duty in each.

**THE FIRST DISTRICT,**

In charge of Health Officer J. H. Brown, embraces that portion of the City North of Market and East of Fifth Streets.

**THE SECOND DISTRICT,**

In charge of Health Officer C. C. Taylor, embraces that portion of the City North of Market and West of Fifth Streets.

**THE THIRD DISTRICT,**

In charge of Health Officer A. J. Denton, embraces that portion of the City South of Market and East of Fifth Streets.

**THE FOURTH DISTRICT,**

In charge of Health Officer S. F. Walcott, embraces that portion of the City South of Market and West of Fifth Streets.

The Health Officers may be designated by the yellow rosette, and they are instructed to inspect and report all uncleanness to my office.

It is hoped that the Citizens generally will cooperate with me in this important work, and begin the needed cleaning without further delay.

Any person requiring the services of a Scavenger may report the fact to the Health Officer of the Division in which the work is to be done, or at my office, and the matter shall have the prompt attention.

Trusting no further appeal to our good Citizens may be required and that our City shall be a model in neatness during the coming summer.
