THE DEBT STATEMENT.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Night.—The Philadelphia Enquirer says, editorially: Hon. Wm. D. Kelley, having returned to Washington, from a prolonged tour throughout the South, declares that the vote he most regrets during his fourteen years services in Congress, is that which he cast last winter in favor of the force bill; and he added that so far as his observation went during his extended tour, there was no more necessity for the use of a Federal military force South than there is in Pennsylvania and Ohio. He talked with all classes and conditions of men regarding the political feelings of the people of the South, and was surprised to find the prevalence of amity and good will to be universal. Judge Kelley has lost all faith in the stores of Kn-Kix and Southern outrages, having personally proven them to be the myths of mere partisan malevolence.

When a Republican of such eminence as Judge Kelley gives testimony such as this, it would seem as if it were time indeed for Mr. Williams to retire to his native wilds of Oregon, and for the superserviceable organs of the cap-baggers to learn new tunes to stir up vindictive feelings against the South. It would also appear to be time to withdraw our army from those places where it is not wanted, and to send it to the Texas frontier where it is wanted very much. As a new crop of Southern outrages will be required next Fall, it will be just as well for the North to remember the testimony of Judge Kelley.

(Note.—The Enquirer has been ultra radical, and Judge Kelley is he who refuted under a table when there was loose shooting in Mobile some years ago.)

THE BUNKER'S HILL COLLIERY  
EXPLOSION.

Berlin, May 1.—Night.—The Emperor has given his assent to the introduction of the bill abolishing religious orders in Prussia.

Geneva, May 1.—Night.—Gutiérrez, who was president of the revolution, was killed at Cartagena, Spain, is dead.

London, May 1.—Night.—On representations made, that ill feeling existing between Frenchmen and Englishmen, engaged in fisheries off Newfoundland, is likely to come to collisions, the governments of France and England have resolved to send war vessels to those waters to prevent disturbances.

Edward Browning Stephens, the English sculptor, is dead.

A number of miners were killed by an explosion in Bunker's Hill colliery, North Staffordshire, yesterday. The calamity is greater than at first reported. Forty-one dead bodies have been recovered from the mine. These are probably all who have perished. Many of the bodies of the miners were mutilated beyond recognition. A great number of the miners have left large families of children in a destitute condition.

THE FIRE FIEND.

Whitehall, N. Y., May 1.—Night.—The paper mill of Barnes, and the office of John McLean at Factoryville, near Ballston, N. Y., were burned last night. Loss \$70,000; insurance \$32,000.

Montpelier, Vt., May 1.—Night.—There was a disastrous fire last night. Burns street is in ruins. Losses fully \$150,000.

LOUISIANA  
KELLOGG SUES CLINTON  
FOR STATE FUNDS.

New Orleans, May 1.—Night.—Kellogg sues Auditor Clinton's bondsmen for various sums alleged to have been withdrawn from the State and money unauthorizedly paid by Clinton. Half a million is involved.

ELECTRICISMS.

At Nashville the people took Joe Reed, who killed the policeman who attempted to arrest Reed for whipping his wife, and threw Reed over a bridge of ninety feet fall. Reed's body has not been recovered.

On and after May 1, 1875, the cotton brokers of Boston have decided to adopt a rate of brokerage on cotton of fifty cents per bale, to be paid by the seller, in lieu of one per cent, the former charge.

There was a heavy storm at Knoxville, Tenn., yesterday, blowing down the county bridge over the Tennessee River, and also damaging the Charleston railroad bridge. Loss to the county \$40,000 dollars.

The United States Hotel, at Saratoga, sold for \$330,000 cash, with the mortgages, which makes the value of the property half a million dollars.

The Pennsylvania Railroad has declared a dividend of 4 per cent.

There is to be a conference in Richmond, Va., Tuesday, to consider the question of exchequer. H. K. Paster, D. H. London, G. M. Firey, of New York, S. T. Wilson, Providence, R. I. and representative men from all sections of the state are expected to take part, also to urge modification or repeal of tax on tobacco and spirits.
