EUROPE.

THE POPE AGAIN IN MEDICAL HANDS.

A NINE POUND LUMP OF GOLD. RATIFICATION OF THE POSTAL TREATY.

THE MUTINY AT SEA.

Rome, May 4—Noon—The Pope is again in a weak state and under treatment of his physicians.

BRUNN, May 4—Noon—The Representatives of the States belonging to the postal union ratified the treaty. France signed subject to the consent of the Assembly.

LONDON, May 4—Noon—Sir John Ho ke, Solicitor-General, will be elevated to the bench, vice Judge Pigott deceased.

The steamer Africans, from the Cape of Good Hope, brought \$50,000 in gold from the diggings; this is the largest shipment ever sent from South Africa; one nugget weighed nine pounds.

There are strong symptoms of a collapse of the strike in South Wales. Sixty miners have returned to work on the master's terms in one colliery.

Three additional deaths by the Bunker Hill disaster have been reported.

The schooner Jefferson Borden, Patterson master, sailed from New Orleans March 5th, for London. When eighteen days from the former port, a mutiny broke out. Capt. Patterson and his officers fought the men with revolvers and knives. After a terrible struggle, in which the first and second mates were killed, the Captain succeeded in disabling and securing all the men who resisted. He hailed passing vessels and obtained sufficient hands to work the ship and proceeded on his voyage to London.

The mutineers seized an opportunity to carry out their plot when on watch with the first mate and boy. The latter was gagged. The men struck the first mate from behind and fractured his skull; the second mate coming to his rescue, was seized and thrown overboard alive. The boy in the mean while got free and alarmed Captain Patterson, who came up from the cabin with two revolvers and began firing with effect. One of the mutineers received seven bullets, another was wounded in the stomach, and one who was reported dying, may live until the vessel reaches London.

THE HUB.

ENTERTAINMENT OF THE CATHOLIC PRELATES.

Boston, May 4—Noon—The programme for the entertainment of the Catholic prelates, who participated in the consecration ceremonies, was fully and most pleasantly carried out today as pre-arranged, closing with the reception by the Catholic Union at Boston College this evening. Between six hundred and eight hundred persons were present.

ALABAMA.

RICH DEVELOPMENTS PROMISED BY THE SPENCER COMMITTEE.

MOBILE, May 4—Noon—The Spencer Investigating Committee here are still examining witnesses. The development is said to be rich, throwing light on the outrage business and the use of troops in Alabama. This evidence promises to be interesting and voluminous.

PHILADELPHIA.

TRIAL OF GUEDEMANN FOR EMBELLISHMENT.

PHILADELPHIA, May 4—Noon—The trial of John W. Gudemann, ex-President of St. Boniface's church, for embellishment of church funds, commenced yesterday. The greater part of the day was taken up with the arguments of the counsel. As the accused and his wife left the Court House they were received with jeers from some and cheers from others.

HEADQUARTERS.

A FEDERAL JUDGE IN TEXAS CHARGES IN FAVOR OF CIVIL RIGHTS.

PRESENTATION AT COURT OF THE SPANISH AMBASSADOR.

WASHINGTON, May 4—Night—Judge Morfles, of the U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, in his charge to the Grand Jury to-day, reviewed the civil rights law and expressed his opinion that all persons have legal rights to have board and lodging at inns, transportation on steamers and railroads or stages, and entrance in theatres, while they do not thereby acquire any social right to hold that a conductor of a railroad train cannot assign a special car to ladies and children and their attendants to the exclusion of all others, provided the other passengers are furnished with other cars with all the necessary facilities for traveling. It would, he says, be to stab social rights, privileges, and immunities; therefore, in view of the act it is that it was not intended to affect social rights through civil and legal rights. In conclusion the Judge said that if it should be made to appear that any inn-keepers, managers of theaters or transportation agents had refused the proper facilities to any one on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude, the Grand Jury would have authority to find a true bill against such a person.

Senor Antonio Matella, who represented the Spanish Republic here as Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary, to-day presented his credentials to the President as representative of the King of Spain. The usual congratulatory addresses were made.

On dit: Congratulations upon the fizzle of the Republic are malapropos.

GOTHRAM.

MRS. TILTON APPLIES TO JUDGE NEILSON FOR A HEARING AND IS REFUSED.

BROOKLYN, May 4—Night—Judge Neilson—I ask the privilege from you for a few words in my own behalf. I feel very deeply the injustice of my position in the law and before the Court now sitting, and while I have understood and expected from the beginning, Mr. Everts' principle in the matter, yet since your late decision, I have been so sensible of the power of my enemies, that my soul cries out before you and the gentlemen of the jury, that they beware how by a divided verdict they consign to my children a false and irreparable stain upon their mother; for five years I have been the victim of circumstances most cruel and unfortunate, struggling from time to time only for a place to live honorably and truthfully; released for some months from the will by whose power I unconsciously crumpled myself, again and again, I declare myself actually before you, without fear of man and by faith in God, that I am innocent of the crime charged against me; I would like to tell my whole sad story, truthfully to acknowledge the frequent falsehoods wrong from me by compulsion, though at the same time unwilling to reveal the secret of my married life, which the vital importance of my position makes necessary. I assume the entire responsibility of this request, unknown to friend or counsel of either side, and await your Honor's honorable decision. With great respect.

THE JUDGE'S REPLY.

CHAMBER OF THE CITY COURT. BROOKLYN, May 4. Mrs. Tilton—I am directed by Chief Judge Neilson to return your letter, as it cannot be received in court, also to state that in civil cases counsel have the right to refrain from calling particular witnesses, however competent, and that neither the court nor the client can interfere with the exercise of that right. The Judge also instructs me to say that the question whether you could be a witness, stands on quite another ground from that considered when your husband was called and sworn; he was a competent witness to testify in his own behalf against a third person, a defendant, and while the policy of the law was to some extent involved, there was no express statute in the way, but the statute of May 10, 1867, expressly declares the wife to be incompetent as a witness, for or against the husband.
