### THE LONDON PRESS ON GLADSTONE'S LETTER AND AMERICAN POLITICS.

London, May 5—Noon—The Standard severely criticizes the letter from Mr. Gladstone, which was read at the Centennial celebration of the battle of Lexington. It remarks that the habit of taunting to Americans is discreditable in English men and journalists. The result of the republican experiment in the United States are corruption of public life, extinction of public spirit, opposition of minority, disgust of the honorable men with political life and the transfer of the government into the hands of corrupt, unscrupulous and ignorant men. The Times fully endorses Gladstone's letter, and says it would be melancholy if the first great attempt to complete independence should result in social anarchy, although there is nothing at present to justify such fears. Gray evily exits all some American institutions which must be reformed if progress is to be kept up. The Daily News announces that the Earl of Pembroke will resign the Under Secretaryship of War, and will be succeeded by Lord Cadogan. The British government intends to send the frigate Valorous to survey Baffin's Bay and the North Atlantic.

### DECISION IN THE GUNPOWDER CASE.

### ANOTHER NOTE FROM BERLIN TO BRUSSELS.

Boston, May 5—Noon.—The report of the delegates from Boston to the recent fair of the Washington Light Infantry, of Charleston, S. C., was read last evening at the Parker House to those interested in getting up the Boston table. The delegates reported the complete success of the Boston table and also spoke in the highest terms of the hospitality of the Charlestonians. A committee was appointed to confer with the City government in reference to the presence of the Washington Light Infantry at Bunker's Hill Centennial celebration, June 17th. The gunpowder case which has excited so much interest here and which was sent against the city of Boston for the value of goods in a building blown up during the great fire to prevent the spread of the flames, was concluded in the United States District Court yesterday. A verdict for the defendant was given.

London, May 5—Night.—Ewald, the German philologist is dead.

The Pall Mall Gazette says that a fresh note from Germany has arrived in Brussels. This note, the Gazette says, is in connection with a pastoral recently issued by the Bishop of Namur, which is extremely violent in its references to the German Government.

#### HEADQUARTERS.

### KICKING A HIGH OFFICIAL OUT OF OFFICE.

Washington, May 5—Night.—The displacement of the Commissioner of the Internal Revenue, Douglas, was a surprise to that gentleman, as he had no previous intimation of it. Yesterday afternoon, Secretary Bristow called upon Douglas, saying he did so at the request of the President, and to perform the disagreeable duty of informing him that ex-Senator Pratt had been tendered and accepted the position of Commissioner of Internal Revenue. Douglas made an inquiry only following this verbal communication. It was whether his integrity as a man and officer had been in any manner impugned; to which the Secretary replied, not in the slightest degree. With this, Douglas expressed himself satisfied. Other changes in office are intimated.

#### NEW YORK.

### REPORT ON THE CANAL FRAUDS.

Albany, May 5—Night.—The report of the Joint Committee of the Legislature, in relation to the canal frauds and investigation, reports that the system of letting and prosecuting contracts for canal work is full of grave defects, giving opportunities for numerous and varied deceptions and frauds; opportunities that designing men have no hesitation of embracing. In the brief time allotted, it would not probably be possible to make even a catalogue in detail of frauds, which the testimony indicates in addition to those which it seems to conclusively prove.

#### PHILADELPHIA.

### MEETING OF TRUSTEES OF THE PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

Philadelphia, May 5—Noon.—The annual meeting of the Trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States was held in this city yesterday. The Board has charge of forty-four trust funds, which it administers for benevolent purposes agreeably to the wishes of the donors. Hon. Geo. Sharswood was re-elected President.

#### GEORGIA.

### APPLICATION FOR AN INJUNCTION AGAINST THE GEORGIA RAILROAD.

Atlanta, May 5—Night.—A bill has been filed by Gen. Tombs and S. H. Hardeman, Attorneys for certain stockholders of the Georgia Railroad, praying for an injunction to restrain the officers of that corporation from completing the purchase of the Western Railroad of Alabama, or from paying the interest on the endorsed bonds of said road. Judge Gibson will hear the arguments in the case on Tuesday next. The Western Railroad of Alabama was recently purchased jointly by the Georgia and Central Roads, who are endorses of the bonds of the Western Railroad.

### THE MONTGOMERY MUNICIPAL ELECTRIC.

### HALF OF THE NEGROES VOTE THE DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

SPENCER IN A BAD WAY.

Montgomery, May 5—Night.—The following are the official returns of the election: Moses, Democrat, for Mayor; 484 majority; Smith, Democrat, for City Clerk, 548 majority. The Democrats carry every Ward, electing every Alderman. Among the Aldermen elected are Hon. G. W. Stone, late Justice of the Supreme Court, and Maj. Thos. G. Jones, whose memorial tribute to the Federal dead attracted so much notice at the North last year. Nearly half of the colored people voted the Democratic ticket, straight for the first time since the reconstruction.

At Pottsville, Pa., on Tuesday night about 11 o'clock, the Breaker and Ben Franklin Colliery at Donlyville, near Shemankin, was destroyed by fire. It was owned and worked by Donly & Gardner. As this colliery has been working during the strike the fire is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. Loss \$100,000. Two hundred men and boys are out of employment.

There is no news of the missing steamer Polyneux due at Quebec. She has thirteen hundred people aboard, but usually carries provisions for two months. Other delayed steamers are probably equally well provided.

At Terre Haute, in the municipal election on Tuesday, the Democrats elected their Mayor by 398 majority. The city is Republican on the vote for Councilmen by a small majority. The Democratic majority last October was 600.
