EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Pasha of Egypt has offered to the Hon. George H. Batcheller, of Saratoga, the office of judge of an Egyptian court, to be composed of representatives of the principal civilized nations. He has accepted the place, and will leave for Cairo a fortnight ago.

We always thought the last St. Louis directory a little fishy, but now it is evident that it has been cooked up. It contains the following: 1 Oyster, 1 Rawe, 13 Frys, 9 Fish, 4 Salmon, 1 Trout, 1 Shad, 1 Mackerel, 1 Porgee, 8 Pickles, 2 Fowles, 2 Chickens, 7 Hams, 35 Lambs, 4 Pickles, 1 Pudding, 2 Pyes, 2 Figgies, 2 Nutts, 2 Coffees, 2 Sugars.

The model houses for Chicago, for the plans of which a prize of \$1,000 was offered by the Merchants, Farmers and Mechanics' Saving Fund, are now being built in that city. In about one month they will be completed, with temporary doors, windows and stairs made of rough boards and protected with fire-proof paint. Fires will then be built on the slate roofs and in the interior of the houses to find the amount of damage that may possibly arise from an accidental fire. It is not expected that the buildings will be wholly fire-proof. Several acres of land between the parks and the business parts of the city have been purchased on which to build the "model cottages," costing from \$1,000 to \$1,500 each. The money for the enterprise is to be supplied by Eastern capitalists.

How the Republican party takes care of the soldiers in the matter of head-gear is shown in a late report from the Quartermaster-General: A corduroy that document there was in store in June, 1874, 242,528 army hats, and 309,455 caps. This for our total army of a little over 25,000 enlisted men, give nine and three-fourths hats and twelve caps to each soldier. Who will have the temerity to suggest, after this, that the Government is unmindful of its defenders? There is an expression, "armed cap-a-pie," which we never entirely understood; we never dreamed that it meant twelve caps apiece! If each soldier had even the fabulous nine lives of the cat, the supply of head-gear would be more than ample. Verily, it ought to be a good time for military tailors.

The next General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America will meet at Cleveland, Ohio, on the 20th instant. The proceedings will relate to the finances of the boards, the overture on the eldership, correspondence with the Reformed Dutch Church relative to union, the sustentation scheme, a court of appeals, the hymn-book question, &c. Important reports will be presented and discussed on mileage, with a view to a better system; on the ratio of representation, ministerial relief, and relations with the Southern General Assembly. The church of which this assembly is the chief judicatory comprises 174 presbyteries arranged in 35 synods, and having under their care 4,996 ministers; 4,946 churches, embracing 495,634 communicants and over half a million Sabbath scholars. Total amount contributed to all objects last year, \$9,120,792.

The foreign missions of the Presbyterian Church are thirteen in number, in charge of 861 laborers, and established among the Indian tribes and Chinese in the United States, and in Mexico, South America, Asia and Africa. The converts connected with these missions number over five thousand, and the mission schools are attended by about thirteen thousand scholars.

**SALE OF THE SAVANNAH AND CHARLESTON RAILWAY.**  
The News and Courier says Judge Reed has authorized the sale of the Savannah and Charleston railroad for \$1,500,000. Of this amount \$1,100,000 will be applied to the payment of the six per cent mortgage guaranteed bonds of 1836 and the seven per cent first mortgage bonds issued since the war (amounting together to about a million dollars) and to the payment of coupons, etc. The remaining \$400,000 will be applied to the payment of the funded interest bonds (State guarantee) and the eight per cent bonds and other claims. The State, under the decree, will be responsible for any amount of guaranteed bonds not provided for out of the proceeds of the sale.

**THE BUFFALO GNAT IN ALABAMA.**  
The Eufaula Times says a gentleman who is cultivating a piece of land about seven miles from that city, in one of the Cowikee bottoms, assures them of the presence there of the genuine buffalo gnat, which is now killing so many horses and mules in the Mississippi bottom lands. He says that he and his neighbors are compelled to give their horses and mules the closest attention, by keeping the ears, flanks and other parts of the animal well coated with tar and grease, and they also keep fires burning in their stock lots at night. He attributes the presence of the unusual number of the dangerous insects, to the great amount of wet weather had this season.

The Mississippi buffalo gnat is about half the size of a common house fly and jet black. They have a hump back, or shoulders, like the buffalo, and hence their name. Those in the Cowikee bottom are about half the size of those in the Mississippi river bottoms, but are identical in shape and color.

**THE NATIONAL CASH BOOK.**  
The management of affairs at the National Capital, so long patent to everybody outside of Administration circles who would not wilfully stop his eyes and his ears, is at last bearing some very unpalatable fruit. The Treasury is rapidly becoming depleted, while the receipts do not begin to balance the expenditures and the outlook ahead is certainly a gloomy one. This is only one of the many misfortunes which have accumulated around the silent Sun at Washington City, who continually smokes when he speaks, and perhaps, sometimes, speaks when he could be better employed in smoking.

**PROSPECTIVE EMBARRASSMENT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY—THE REVENUE FALLING SHORT ON ACCOUNT OF COMMERCIAL DEPRESSION.**

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The statement made in these dispatches six weeks since that the new revenue bill would not meet the expectations of its authors is fully justified by the published receipts for the four months of the year. The total receipts for the fiscal year to April 30 are, in round numbers, \$223,510,871; of this, \$133,752,000 are customs receipts, and \$89,758,871 internal revenue returns. The internal revenue receipts for the four months of 1875 are \$36,485,433, and the receipts for April are \$7,022,331. This is a large falling off from the receipts for the corresponding period of last year, April alone falling nearly three million dollars behind, as compared with the returns for the same month of 1874. The estimated receipts from customs and internal revenue for present fiscal year were \$267,000,000, and thus far the total receipts have been in round numbers only \$224,000,000; hence May and June will have to yield \$43,000,000 to make the books balance. To do this, internal revenue will have to yield nearly \$16,000,000 and customs nearly \$28,000,000. During May the special license taxes are collected, and this will help the internal revenue receipts some, but otherwise May and June are dull months, and they are especially so in the customs departments, there being but little business done by importers during these months. The new Revenue bill was constructed so as to take effect on the 3d of March, and yet it has no perceptible difference in the customs receipts, and but little in the internal revenue collections. It is therefore inevitable that the receipts for the present fiscal year will fall short several million dollars on the estimate, while on the other hand the expenditures will assuredly run ahead several millions, and thus to add to all this the currency balances in the Treasury have run down by less than a million and three-quarters. And unless it is replenished by sales of gold they will be entirely exhausted. But sales of gold are scarcely to be thought of, because the drain on the specie revenues must be very heavy during the remainder of the fiscal year. And at the same time that the Secretary of the Treasury is thus compelled to face this unsatisfactory condition of things in his department, he also hears from every quarter of the country the most discouraging reports in regard to the revival of business. The reports received at the Agricultural Department give a most gloomy account of the farming interests in every section of the country. There is the same instability among manufacturers which has existed for eighteen months, with no prospect of any immediate change. The extent of the suffering among the poor classes is appreciable from the facts supplied by the Federal city itself. The General Government disburses here over a million dollars a month in salaries, and the District Government is doing a vast amount of work on the streets of this city, but notwithstanding these facts there has never been more suffering among the poor than now prevails, and this suffering is not confined to the colored population, but is chiefly among the white laboring classes.

It is estimated that the carriage bill paid by the commerce of New York amounts to the enormous sum of \$12,000,000 per annum.

**THE FISH TO BE SPENT ON THE BARK.**  
According to the Baltimore Sun, the Bark, on the French coast, a heavy distance from Bonlogne, must be a free and easy sailing vessel. The fishy sailors who know the spot, come and go with the smallest quantity of baggage. Sailing trunks are unknown and wigs a bore. Many clothes are not wanted. The fishy men set the fashion, and the wealthy visitors easily follow it. A single thin garment, falling from the neck to a little below the knee, and a pair of gaily-worked slippers, constitute the entire costume of a Bark. Stockings are unknown, or, at least, if any lady appears with stockings she is recognized as a new comer. It may require twenty-four hours for her trunks to be sent off at the end of that time she will appear in as scanty a dress as the rest. About half of them, indeed, dispense even with slippers, and one or two groups playing croquet, the gentlemen clad in snowy linen and wearing red or blue caps, and the ladies in hats and short bright-colored skirts, but neither encumbered by shoes or stockings. Offshoots, however, the wind blows the dry sand for miles over the beach; and to prevent this from getting into the eyes, glasses or spectacles with wire gauze frames are worn, when on young and fair faces, have a droll effect. One would think that the same sand would sting the lily-white ankles and calves which are so freely exposed; but so, the effect is not severe enough to induce their owners to don the stockings. To those they have an ineradicable susceptibility, and are likely to remain so long as the village has to be reached only by twenty miles of stinging away from the nearest railway station.

**A New Wrinkle in Voting.**  
Nova Scotia, which furnishes to commerce grindstones, gypsum, lumber, &c., has lately furnished a new balloting system, which has been tested there by actual practice. It is thus described: "Upon each ballot will be printed the names of all the candidates. Each one will bear a different color. Thus the ticket will be a red, a blue, a green, a yellow, a purple, &c. At each polling there will be a special committee, who will have charge of the tickets. He will be provided with a number of ballots as there may be voters registered at that polling place. All the tickets will be officially stamped, and must be accounted for by the presiding officers after the election. When an elector shows his right to vote to the presiding officer he will receive a ballot. After marking the candidates he opposes, the ballot will be deposited in the box by the proper officers. Only the official ballots are to be recognized, and as they will be in the hand of the official who has to account for all tickets given out, the chances for ballot box stuffing are by no means flattering. In case of impersonation, the defrauded voter may deposit a 'tendered vote,' and in case the election is contested, the latter ballot will be wiped from the record."

A lady traveling from New York to Boston, a short time ago, took her seat in the drawing-room car, the only occupants of which were two gentlemen. One was smoking the other held a fresh and unlighted cigar just ready to apply the match. The fair traveler did not like the odor of smoke, and calmly remarked aloud that this was the drawing-room car, and they would please find the smoking-car forward, for the smoke was very offensive to her. The gentlemen removed the obnoxious weeds, but looked extremely serious about it, and had a word or two with the conductor when that functionary entered. He mildly requested the lady to step into another car, but she was comfortably seated and declined to move. By and by other gentlemen appeared and addressed the would-be smoker as "Mr. President," and when at last some one let drop the mystic word "Grant" the obtuse but well-meaning dame recognized her company, and, summoning the conductor, sought another car. All this is pictured in a cartoon by the Boston Saturday Evening Gazette.

The Cincinnati Enquirer attempted to interview Vice President Wilson, while in that city, with the following result: "Mr. Wilson refused to talk on the third term policy for personal and political reasons. He would say, however, that the great battle-field of the next national campaign would be in Ohio. It was here that the battle would be lost or won to the Republican party. This fact, he said, recognized by the party leaders at Washington, and great efforts would be made on both sides to carry the election of Ohio between this time and November of next year."
