All day long details of the Schiller disester have been coming in. Unfortunately no more persons are re-ported to be saved. Bodies are con-stantly being picked up. Five men and five women and two children were recovered yesterday; altogether twenty-four bodies have been found. The total number of lives lost is 311. Mr. Poleman, the second officer of

There was a violent sea and obedience by firing a revolver over their heads. During two hours six caunon shots were fired, when the powder dampened. Distress signal rookets and blue lights were unauswered. At midnight the fog lifted in a minute, revealing the lighthouse and the waves sweeping the decks and carrying away the victims. At two o'clock the deck house, in which were the women and children, was swopt away. The cries and shricks of the victims were heartrending. Then followed a ghastly silence. The smoke stack fell, crushing some of the boats and two others were carried away. The remainder followed the Captain to the forward bridge. Each succeeding wave took fresh victims. Some persons sought refuge on the mainmast and some on the foremast. At 3 o'clock the Captain and two other officers were on the bridge. The Captain descended for a moment to ren-der assistance and was swept away; thus perished a brave man, says Mr. Stern. At this time about ten persons were clinging to the rigging of the mainmast and thirty to that of the foremast. The ship had cereened over, the yards touching the water, and the fide was rising. At 5 o'clock the fog lifted. The survivors shouted but their cries were unavailing, and at 7 clock the mainmast and at a quarter to 8 the foremast, both of iron, fell. Then two of the St. Agnes' boats came and rescued a few who had man-

aged to keep afloat.
It was reported yesterday that there were one hundred and three women on board. The survivors were taken to-day from the Perseverance to Peymouth, whence they will be sent forward to Hamburg, where the greatest excitement prevails. It is asserted that life saving belts were issued to the women. It is certain that most of the passengers found houe.
